*Board of Trade, Whitehall,

The Right Honourable the Lords of the Committee of Privy Council for Trade have received intelligence, through the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, from Her Majesty's Consul at Savannah, that the quarantine restrictions which have been in force at that Port during the past summer were removed on the 1st November instant ; but that all vessels arriving at Savannah from infected ports, or with sickness on board, or having had sickness during the voyage, must anchor at the quarantine ground until relieved by the health officer.

The Right Honourable the Lords of the Committee of Privy Council for Trade have received, through the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, from Her Majesty's Minister at Rio de Janeiro, a translation of a Decree issued by the Government of Brazil on the 20th October last, which makes the following alterations in the duties hitherto levied upon the importation of foreign merchandise :—

Sec. 1. Besides the import duties (the additional duties excepted) which foreign merchandise at present pays, on and after 1st January 1870, 40 per cent. on the amount of duties shall be recovered ; this augmentation, however, shall be collected at the rate of 30 per cent. for such goods as those on which the tax was raised in the new tariff, by virtue of the authorization given in the 5th basis of Art. IX. of the Law of 26th September 1867.

The per centage referred to shall be altered yearly by the Government in the inverse ratio of the rise in exchange beyond 18d., the alteration being published three months beforehand ; the authorization given by Sec. 1 of Art. IX. of the before-mentioned Law of collecting 15 per cent. of the import duties in gold at its lawful value ceasing on the 1st January 1870.

Sec. 2. An additional duty of 5 per cent. shall be collected from the 1st January 1870 on goods marked in Table C., which is annexed to the new tariff; the additional duty of 2 per cent. which is paid on those marked in Table B, and the "expediente" on goods which are free of import duty for home consumption being likewise raised to 5 per cent.

Sec. 3. The anchorage dues on vessels coming from foreign ports shall be raised to 500rs. per ton, the other dispositions of Decree No. 928, of 5th March 1852, and Regulation of 19th September 1860, remaining in force; and the privilege granted to the several steam companies, with the exception of the obligations imposed by international Conventions which still exist, shall be abolished. The exemption from anchorage dues enjoyed by national coasting vessels does not extend to foreign vessels employed in the same trade.

SEC. 4. The dues which merchandise at present pays, under the title of "dock" and "portage" (capatazias), will be substituted by the Government imposing and collecting a tax for the discharge and the shipment of goods in the Custom-house, and its bonded warehouses, according to the weight and size of the packages. The Government may also diminish, or do away with the days allowed for free storage of goods; in this case establishing a tax for the same, according to weight and size of each package.

These services may be effected by contract with a company, provided that it shall offer sufficient guarantee.

SEC. 5. From 1st January 1870, the re-export duty and that on the transshipment of goods from one vessel to another (baldiaçao) shall be abolished, as also that of the "dizimo" of the municipality the "expediente," of  $\frac{1}{2}$  per cent. on national goods transferred from one province to another, and that of 3 per cent. on foreign goods despatched for home consumption and shipped with a permit.

## SOLDIERS' BALANCES UNCLAIMED.

IN pursuance of the "Regimental Debts Act, 1863," Notice is Hereby Given that Her Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for the War Department has available, for distribution amongst the Next of Kin, the sum of money set opposite to the name of each of the deceased Soldiers named in the List which is published with this Notice in the "London Gazette," and the "Army List," and is also to be seen at the Quarters of the several Staff Officers for the Recruiting and Pension Service throughout the United Kingdom.

Applications from persons supposing themselves entitled as Next of Kin should be addressed by letter to the "Under Secretary of State, War Office, London, S.W.," and marked outside "Soldiers' Effects."

No application can be attended to which does not state the dates and places of the Soldier's birth, enlistment, and death, and the name of his Regiment; his regimental number should also be stated if known.

Should these particulars, furnished by the applicant, not agree with the facts recorded on the War Office documents relating to the deceased Soldier, the applicant will be so informed; but should they agree therewith, then, within three calendar months, the Secretary of State will furnish the applicant with the usual requirements needed for the proof of the alleged relationship.

The application must be authenticated by the signature of the applicant, and his name should be affixed in the presence of the Clergyman, or one of the Churchwardens of the parish, or a Justice of the Peace. The applicant's address, with the name of the post-town, must also be clearly stated. No personal application can receive attention.

Further Lists will from time to time be published, and therefore it will facilitate the applicant's inquiries to give the number and date of the Notice in which the deceased Soldier's name appeared.
