I HEREWITH enclose, for the information of the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, the copy of a letter which I received yesterday afternoon from Captain Twysden, of his Majesty's ship Revolutionnaire, giving an account of his having captured the Moucheron French brig privateer, belonging to Bourdeaux, ron French brig privatees, mounting 16 guns, and 130 men.

Extract of a Letter from the Hon. Captain Robert Stopford of his Majefly's flip: Excellent, in Quiberon Bay, to Earl St Vincent, the 23d Feb. 1801.

My LORD.

I HAVE the honour to acquaint your Lordship, that on the night of the 20th init. I fent the boats of the Excellent to endeavour to bring off a cutter and a floop which were at anchor near the point of Quiberon; unfortunately, that fame evening, after dark, a large
chaffe marce with troops on board, going to the island
of Belle-isle, had taken her station close to the above
ressel, the resistance which the boats met with was consequently much greater than there was at first reafon to expect. This circumstance did not, however,
prevent Lieutenant Church (having the command of
the boats) from making the attack upon the chasse
marce, in which he gallantly persevered, till being
wounded himself, and two men killed in his boat, he
was obliged to retire; the other boats under the command of Messes. Crawford and Manning, (midshipmen,) resolutely boarded and succeeded in bringing off
the cutter called L'Arc, an armed vessel in the service
of the Republic, commanded by an Ensigne de Vaisconfequently much greater than there was at first reaof the Republic, commanded by an Enligne de Vaiffeau, and employed as convoy to and from Belleisle; this vessel had also on board a detachment of troops, who were made prisoners, and who made the vessel's force much superior to that of the assailants.
