(No. 1.)—MEDITERRANEAN—TURKEY.

The Turkish Government has given notice that, from the 25th day of December 1869, the following four new lights would be exhibited, viz. :—

Fixed Light on Fenar Point.

A light from a lighthouse recently erected on Fenar point, east point of Kara-aghaj Bay, Roumelia.

The light is a *fixed* white light, elevated 72 feet above the level of the sea, and in clear weather should be seen from a distance of 8 miles.

The lighthouse is erected on the sight of an old tower, and its position is in lat. 40° 56' 20" N., long. 25° 8' 30" East from Greenwich.

Fixed Light at Kavala.

A light from the Castle (building) at the extremity of the town of Kavala, Roumelia.

The light is a *fixed* white light, elevated 148 feet above the sea, and in clear weather should be seen from a distance of 8 miles. Position, lat. 40° 55' 10" N., long. 24° 25' 20" East.

Fixed Light at Adalia.

A light two-thirds of a mile eastward of the small harbour of Adalia, Gulf of Adalia.

The light is a *fixed* white light, elevated 131 feet above the sea, and in clear weather should be seen from a distance of 8 miles.

Position, lat. 36° 52' N., long. 30° 45' 30" East.

Fixed Light at Tripoli (Syria).

A light from the summit of the lighthouse office, Tripoli, Syria.

The light is a *fixed red* light, elevated 39 feet above the sea, and in clear weather should be seen from a distance of 5 miles.

Position, lat. $34^{\circ} 27' 28''$ N., long. $35^{\circ} 48' 15''$ East.

Alteration in Light on Ramkine, or Bluff, Islet.

Also, that from the same date the red light on Ramkine, or Bluff, Island, Tripoli, Syria, will be changed to a fixed white light, which, in clear weather, should be seen from a distance of 8 miles.

SEA OF AZOV.

Alteration in Lights of Beglitz-Kaia.

The Russian Government has given notice that the following alteration has been made in the lights of the Beglitzkaia light vessel, Sea of Azov.

The lights are hoisted on the mizen mast, the upper or *red* light is elevated 46 feet above the sea, and in clear weather should be seen from a distance of 12 miles; the lower or *white* light is elevated 36 feet, and should be seen from a distance of 11 miles.

The mainmast of the vessel has been removed, and a red ball is hoisted on the top of the mizen mast.

The word *Beglitzkaia* is painted in white letters on the sides of the vessel.

Revolving Light on Wolf Rock.

Fog Whistle at White Head Lighthouse.

The United States Government has given Notice that a steam fog whistle has been established at White Head Lighthouse, western side of the entrance to Ponobscott, in lieu of the fog bell hitherto in use.

In foggy, thick, and snowy weather the fog whistle will be sounded *eight seconds* in every minute.

NEW YORK.

Alteration in Light on Little Gull Island.

Also, that from the 15th day of December 1869, a light would be exhibited from the new tower recently erected on Little Gull Island, eastern entrance to Long Island Sound.

The light is a *fixed* white light, elevated 92 feet above the level of the sea, and in clear weather should be seen from a distance of 15 miles.

The illuminating apparatus is dioptric, or by lenses of the second order.

The tower is 74 feet high, built of grey granite, and attached to the keeper's dwelling of red sandstone.

During thick or foggy weather a fog signal, consisting of a siren worked by steam, will be sounded for *five seconds* at intervals of *twenty-five seconds*.

In case of any derangement of the machinery of the steam fog signal, the bell formerly used will be sounded as a substitute.

Also, that the fourth order light exhibited on the island would be discontinued.

MARYLAND.

The tower is 57 feet high, of a whitish grey colour; position, lat. $52^{\circ} 4' 30''$ N., long. $10^{\circ} 40'$ west from Greenwich.
