A Letter, of which the following is an extract, has been received by the Right Honourable Henry Dundas, one of his Majefty's Principal Secretaries of State, from Licutenant Colonel Frazer, Commandant of the garrison of Gorce, on the coast of Africa, dated off Senegal, 5th January 1801.

N the 3d instant, the weather being very fayourable, and the furf unufually low, it was determined by Sir Charles Hamilton and myself to attack an armed brig and schooner lying at anchor in the river.

The party deflined for this fervice, confifting of fifty-five volunteers from the Melpomene, under the command of Lieutenant Dick, five from the crew of the transport, and thirty-fix, commanded by Lieutenant Christie, from the African corps, left the frigate at half past nine ofclock, in five boats, and having passed the bar without accident, and the batteries at the point without being discovered, arrived at a quarter before eleven o'clock within a few yards of the brig, when the enemy commenced a very heavy fire, through which our people boarded, and, after a fevere contest, which lasted twenty minutes, carried the vessel.

It appears she was called the Senegal, commanded by M. Renou, mounted eighteen guns, with about fixty men, eighteen of whom are pri-

Two of the best boats having been destroyed by the enemy's shot, Lieutenant Dick judged it better to turn the guns of the brig upon the schooner than to attempt boarding her, and kept up a well-directed fire for fome time; but she was fo well protected by the batteries on shore, and by small arms from the southern bank, that he found it necessary to desist; and cutting the brig's cable, made fail with her down the river.

After two hours possession she unfortunately grounded, and he was obliged to relinquish his and two batteries, must have rendered any far-

The retreat was conducted with the greatest order, and the whole of the priloners and wounded brought off notwithstanding the surf upon the bar, and under a fire of grape and finall arms from the adjoining batteries.

I enclose a return of the killed and wounded * and have to regret the loss of two very gallant officers, Lieutenants Palmer of the navy, and Vyvian of the marines.

Copy of a Letter from Sir Charles Hamilton, Bart. Captain of his Majesty's ship Melpomene, to Evan Nepean, Esq. dated at Goree, 8th Jan. 1801.

You will be pleased to inform their Lordthips, that being off the bar of Senegal, on the 3d inft, the weather moderate, and the furf low, with the concurrence of Colonel Frazier, I conceived it possible, if we could surprise a brig corvette and an armed schooner, anchored within the bar, to possess ourselves of the battery commanding the entrance, and, by the means of their own veilels, as I had none under my command fit for the purpose, to have finally reduced Senegal; I therefore detached Lieutenant Dick, with 96 officers and men from the Melpomene, and African corps, in five boats, who left the thip at nine P. M. were fortunate enough to pals the heavy furf on the bar with the flood tide without accident, and unobserved by the point battery; but on their approaching within hail of the brig the alarm was given, and the two bow guns discharged, by which Lieut: Palmer, with 7 feamen, were killed, and two boats funk. Notwithstanding this unfortunate accident, the brig was carried after an oblimate defence of twenty minutes, but which gave the schooner time to cut her cable : Lieutenant Dick finding that the lofs of his two belt boars, and many of his belt men, added to a constant fire from the schooner

prize, after rendering her unfit for further service. ther attempt abortive, he judged it right to make every attempt to get her over the bar, but the ebb tide having made, and being totally unacquainted with the navigation of the river, she got a-ground; and feeing it impossible ever to get her off, and being hulled by every shot from the point battery, he found it absolutely necesfary to retreat; and, under the many obstacles he had to furmount across a tremendous furf, under a heavy fire of grape and musketry, excites my admiration even more, if possible, than the gallant manner in which the brig was carried. I therefore feel it my duty to recommend Lieutenant Dick to their Lordship's notice, who speaks highly of the officers and men employed under him, both from this ship and the African corps; and we had the fatisfaction at day-light to perceive the brig had funk up to her gunwales in a quick fand. It appears the was called the Senegal; had been fitted out there at the expence of the Republic; and was commanded by Citizen Renou, who was on board at the time, and of whose fare we are uncertain. She mounted 18 guns, twelve and nine-pourders, and had nearly 60 men on board, fome of which escaped in a boat, the rest were killed in boarding, except five whites and 13 blacks, who are now on board this hip. It was chiefly owing to the alacrity and courage of the latter that we met fuch ressittance.

Enclosed I have the honour to transmit a lift of killed and wounded.
