Board of Trade, Whitehall, May 30, 1870.

The Right Honourable the Lords of the Committee of Privy Council for Trade have received, from the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, a copy of a Despatch from Her Majesty's Minister at Brussels, enclosing a copy of a Law published in the "Moniteur Belge" of the 17th instant.

In accordance with the provisions of this Law the excise duty on raw salt and sea salt, the import duty upon refined salt, upon sulphate, sulphite, and carbonate of soda, as well as upon fish of all kinds, is abolished; the rate of postage upon single letters, forwarded from one part of the kingdom to another, is fixed at 10 centimes; and the rate for books, bound or in boards, will be 1 centime per 30 grammes or fraction of 30 grammes.

The Law also increases the excise duty upon the manufacture of brandy, and fixes the minimum quantity to be exported at 5 hectolitre instead of 10, as heretofore.

Article 12 alters the import duty leviable upon distilled spirits, and fixes it as follows:—

This Law will come into operation on the 1st of June of the present year, so far as distillation, and the postage of books and letters are concerned, and on the 1st June 1871 for all the other provisions; except that an import duty will be levied upon carbonate of soda of 2 francs during the year 1871, and of one franc during the year 1872.

TREASURY WARRANT.

We, the undersigned, being two of the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, in pursuance of the power enabling us in this behalf, direct as follows:—

On and from the date hereof the several rates of postage and regulations now in force applicable to letters and packets consisting of British, Colonial, or Foreign newspapers, of books, publications, or works of literature or art, of printed votes or proceedings of the Imperial Parliament or the Colonial Legislatures, or of patterns or samples of merchandize, posted in or passing in transit through the United Kingdom, transmitted by the post from the United Kingdom to New Zealand or Australia, by British packet-boat, viâ Southampton and Suez, shall be chargeable upon and applicable to letters and packets of a like description posted in or passing in transit through the United Kingdom, transmitted by the post from the United Kingdom to New Zealand or Australia, viâ the United States, the sea conveyance from the United Kingdom to the United States being by British packet-boat, and from the United States to New Zealand and Australia being by Colon packet-boat.

(No. 61.)—SPAIN.—NORTH COAST.—SANTANDAR.

Fixed Green Light on Point Puerto.

The Spanish Government has given Notice that, from the 15th day of May 1870, a light would be exhibited from a lighthouse on Point Puerto, west entrance of Port Santandar.

The light is a *fixed green* light, with a sector of five degrees of white light covering Horadada Islet, elevated 79 feet above the level of the sea, and in clear weather should be seen from a distance of 4 miles. It is obscured landward from S. $\frac{1}{2}$ W. to E. by N. $\frac{1}{4}$ N.

The illuminating apparatus is dioptric or by lenses of the fifth order.

The lighthouse is 45 feet high, square, brick colour, and is attached to the keeper's dwelling; it is situated N.N.E., 110 yards from Castello de la Cerda; position, lat. 43° 28' 13" N., long. 3° 46' 10" West from Greenwich.

Vessels from the westward will not sight the light on Point Puerto until it bears S. $\frac{1}{2}$ W., on which bearing the shoal water off Cabo Menor will be cleared.

Sunken Rocks near Ilha Grande.

The French Government has given Notice that two sunken rocks have been recently dis-

covered to the southward of Acaya Point, west extreme of Ilha Grande, by Captain R. de Coligny, I.F.N.

The first, with 3 $\frac{3}{4}$ fathoms on it, lies S. $\frac{3}{4}$ W., one mile from the extremity of Acaya Point, and the other with 4 $\frac{3}{4}$ fathoms on it, S.S.W. one and a half miles from the same point.

These sunken rocks have from 16 to 19 fathoms around them, and it is stated there is a safe passage between them and Acaya Point.

RIVER PLATE.

Harbour Light on Breakwater, Monte Video.

Information has been received that a *red* light, elevated 16 feet, is exhibited at the end of the breakwater running out from San José Point, Monte Video, and also that a buoy marks the extremity of the reef, which extends N.W. $\frac{1}{4}$ W. one cable from the light.
