WESTMINSTER, JUNE 24.

This day the Lords being met, and the Commons assembled, the Royal Assent, by commission, was given to—

An act for granting 200,000. to the Commissioners for the reduction of the national debt. An act to indemnify persons, who, since the 1st of February 1793, have acted in the apprehending or detention of persons suspected of treason. An act to amend several acts for raising a militia force in Scotland. An act for repealing certain duties and drawbacks on the importation and exportation of copper, and for substituting others in lieu thereof, and to five English roads, inclosure, and private acts.

JUNE 27.

The Royal Assent, by commission, was this day given to.

An act for enabling his Majesty to raise two millions, for the purposes therein mentioned—Two acts for raising the sums of 6,500,000. & 3,000,000. for the service of the present year—An act for directing the application of several sums granted to the Dublin Society, and to the Farming Societies in Ireland—An act for granting to his Majesty certain sums out of the consolidated funds of Great Britain and Ireland, &c.—An act for extending the period of preference granted to bodies corporate and persons for the redemption of the land tax, and to amend the land tax act of the 38th of the King—An act for regulate the drawback on British Plantation sugar exported from Ireland, for allowing certain drawbacks on sugar exported from Ireland, and for allowing British Plantation sugar to be warehoused in Ireland—An act to permit the exportation of tea to Ireland, without payment of duty—Two acts for transferring the management of the duties on hair powder and armorial bearings certificates, and on licences to horse-dealers, from the Commissioners of Stamps to the Commissioners of Taxes—An act for granting letters of marque to vessels employed in the service of the Board of Customs or Excise, or other public Boards—An act for granting a bounty on the importation of fish from Newfoundland and the coast of Labrador—An act for the relief of insolvent debtors—An act for the better regulation of public notaries in England—An act to indemnify persons who have published papers, printed under the authority of Offi-

cers of State or Public Boards, without the printer's name being affixed—An act to enable Mr Koops to extend the benefit of his invention of making paper from straw, &c. to others besides those to whom the patent is limited—To four English road acts, and eleven private acts.
