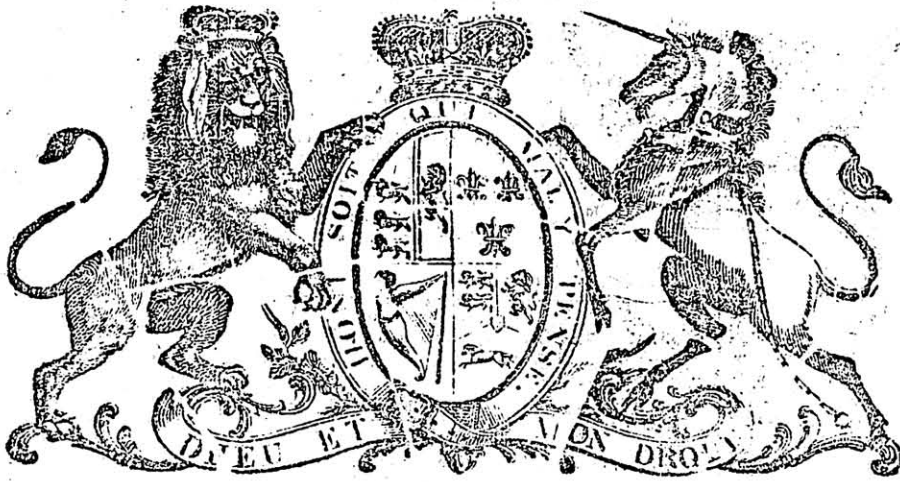

DOWNING STREET—May 14.

THE King has been pleased to appoint the Honourable George Vere Hobart to be Lieutenant-Governor of the Island of Grenada, and its dependencies, in the room of Alexander Houston, Esq. resigned.

The King has been pleased to order a Congregation to pass the Great Seal, empowering the Dean and Chapter of the Cathedral Church of Wells, to elect a Bishop of the See of Bath and Wells, void by the death of the Right Reverend Father in God Doctor Charles Mofs; and his Majesty has also been pleased to recommend the Right Reverend Father in God Doctor Richard Beadon Bishop of Gloucester, to be by them elected Bishop of that See.
