It gives us satisfaction to think, that your Majesty's ancient and loyal city of Edinburgh seconded, to the best of its power, your Majesty's ge erous efforts in desence of the nation; and we trust, and venture to assure your Majesty, that your faithful subjects of this city will endeavour, by liabits of industry and good order, to improve to the best advantage the tranquility which your Majesty has restored.

We congratulate your Majesty on the bravery and conduct exhibited by your forces by sea and land, and on that determination with which your subjects armed themselves at home, to defend their country from foreign and domestic foes. In this spirit we recognise the blest pledge of the permanency of that invaluable Constitution, under which this nation enjoys that liberty which others have in vain endeavoured to find in other forms of Government.
