Scheme under the Educational Endowments (Scotland) Act, 1882, for the Administration of the Endowment in the Burgh of Leith, and County of Midlothian, bequeathed by the late Mrs. Anne Kellie for the purpose of an Infant School in Leith, by her Testament dated 1st May 1841, and recorded in.

Preamble.

1. Transference of Property and Administration to New Governing Body.—As soon as conveniently may be after the date of this Scheme, the executors of the said Mrs. Anne Kellie shall pay and make over to the School Board of the Burgh of Leith, the whole of the sum bequeathed by her for the purposes of an Infant School in Leith, together with all interest that may have accrued on the same, but under deduction of any Government duties or other charges due upon the said sum, to be held and administered by the said School Board under the conditions and provisions of this Scheme, and the said School Board shall be the governing body of the Endowment. On such payment or transference the governing body shall, after satisfactory examination and audit of the accounts of the said executors, grant them a discharge for their intromissions with the said bequest.

2-7. Business Arrangements; Power of Sale and Investment; Casual Profits; Accounts;

and Audit.

8. Application of Iucome. Free Scholarships.—The governing body, after paying the necessary expenses of management and the burdens and taxes affecting the Endowment, shall apply a sum not exceeding two-thirds of their free annual income in paying, in whole or in part, as they may think fit, the fees of scholars, with books and stationery, at public or State-aided schools in the Burgh of Leith, for elementary education as defined in the Educational Endowments (Scotland) Act, 1882. The free scholars shall be children whose parents or guardians, not being in receipt of parochial relief, are in such circumstances as to require aid for providing elementary education, and are persons who, in the opinion of the governing body, ought not to be required to apply to the Parochial Board for such aid.

In the case of children under ten years of age, the selection of free scholars shall be made with due regard to merit, as ascertained by such examination, suited to the age of the candidates, as the governing body may from time to time prescribe; or, in the case of children for whom such examination is unsuitable, by evidence that the children possess such qualifications as to justify their selection; and in the case of children who have been in attendance at school during one or more school years, the governing body shall, in

making their selection, give special weight to good conduct, attendance, and progress at school during the previous year. The fees in respect of children under ten years of age shall not be paid for more than one school year without re-appointment, and the amount to be expended in paying fees for such children shall not exceed one-third of the amount to be applied under this section.

In the case of children of ten years of age and upwards, the free scholars shall be selected by competitive examinations, which shall be open to all of the same age who are eligible in terms hereof, whether they have or have not previously been beneficiaries; and for such children the school fees may continue to be paid for such period, not exceeding three years, as the governing body may determine

determine.

The governing body, at the end of every school year, shall obtain from the teacher or teachers a special report as to the conduct, regularity of attendance, and progress of all scholars whose school fees are paid, in whole or in part, under this section, and no scholar in regard to whom such report is not satisfactory shall continue to receive any benefit under the terms of this section.

The governing body shall spend the residue of their free annual income in providing clothing or boots or shoes for the more necessitous of the

free scholars.

last Will and Testament of William Scott, dated 8th January 1836, and Deed of Endowment by James Johnstone Grieve and others, dated 31st October 1867; the Fairrie Trust, in so far as applicable to educational purposes, hitherto held and administered under Trust Disposition and Settlement by Thomas Fairrie, dated 3rd February 1854, with Codicil thereto, dated 24th March 1856, both registered in the Books of Council and Session 21st September 1858; the Bog Trust, hitherto held and administered under Trust Disposition by Mrs. Isobel Bog or Cameron, dated 14th October 1814; the Watt Bequest, hitherto held and administered under Deed of Settlement by James Watt, dated 13th September 1826; the Chambers Mortification, at present held and administered under a Mortification by Archibald Chambers, Feuar, of Flowerbank, dated 26th April 1860; Patten's Bequests, at present held and administered under a Deed of Settlement, with Codicils, by Henry Tower Patten, Writer, Greenock, dated respectively 5th January 1860, 12th April 1870, and 18th October 1871, and all recorded in the Books of Council and Session 14th November 1871; Currie's Bequest, at present held and administered under the Settlement of Miss Margaret Chrrie, dated 22nd July, with Codicil thereto, dated 9th December, both in the year 1836; Park's Legacy, at present held and administered under the Trust Disposition and Settlement of Mrs. Margaret M'Cunn or Park, dated 23rd April 1874; Fairrie's Bequest, at present held and administered under the Settlement of Thomas Fairrie, dated 3rd February 1854; and invested in the funds of the Board of Police of Greenock; and the Charity School Managers Funds, at present held and administered by the Managers and Treasurer of the Charity School, invested in the funds of the Corporation of Greenock, with the balance of Cash Account at credit of the said Treasurer in the Commercial Bank of Scotland (Limited), at Greenock.

Preamble.

1, 2. Future Administration; Transference of Property.

3. Constitution and Election of Governing Body.—The governing body, hereinafter called the governors, shall consist of seven persons,

Three shall be elected by the Magistrates and Town Council of Greenock.

Two shall be elected by the School Board of Greenock;

One shall be elected by the Trustees for the time being of the said Thomas Fairrie;

Greenock from among the Ministers officiating in Greenock.

The governors may be elected by the several electing bodies either out of their own number or otherwise. The governors elected by the Magistrates and Town Council of Greenock and the Presbytery of Greenock shall, in the case of the first election, hold office for a period of five years, and thereafter until the first day of August after the expiry of that period. The governors elected by the School Board of Greenock and Thomas Fairrie's trustees shall, in the case of the first election, hold office for a period of three. years, and thereafter until the first day of August after the expiry of that period. The governors shall, in the case of all elections subsequent to the first, hold office for a period of five years from and after the expiry of the term of office of their predecessors, except as hereinafter provided. election shall be made at a meeting convened and conducted according to the ordinary rules and practice of the electing body. Any governor may be re-elected. The first governors shall be elected as soon as conveniently may be after the date of this Scheme. The clerk or other officer of the governors shall, at least one month before the expiry of the term of office of any governor, give notice to the proper electing body, who shall, as soon as conveniently may be after such notice, elect a governor to hold office from the expiry of said term. Any election not made as aforesaid within three months from the date of this Scheme, or from the date of the notice of expiry of a term of office, or from the date of the notice of a vacancy, as hereinafter prescribed, shall in that case be made by the then existing governors.

4-12. Vacancies; Meetings; Chairman: Quorum and Execution of Deeds; Minutes; Power to appoint Committees; Accounts.

13-17. Business Arrangements; Casual Profits; Powers of Sale and Investment; and Audit.

18. First Meeting .- Within two months from the date of this Scheme, a meeting of the governors shall be held, upon the summons of the Provost Greenock. At this meeting they shall: make arrangements for the conduct of business, and shall elect a chairman; but they shall not at this, or any subsequent meeting, transact any business that is not necessary for the immediate administration of the Endowment until the whole of the first governors are elected.

19-21. Clauses relating to Transference of Administration, and Discharge of Governing Body.

22. Discontinuance of Schools.—The trustees of the said Thomas Fairrie shall discontinue the schools hitherto maintained by them within twelve months after the date of this Scheme.

23. Vested Interests.

Application of Income.

24. Application of Income.-The governors. after paying the necessary expenses of management and the burdens and taxes affecting the, Endowment, shall apply the free income of the Endowment in the manner hereinafter provided.

25. Funds to be applied to Scott Institution .-The governors shall keep a separate account of the funds and estate belonging to the Scott Trust transferred to them under this Scheme, and shall, after deducting the burdens and taxes One shall be elected by the Presbytery of attaching thereto, and the proportionate share of the general expenses of management, apply the free income arising therefrom in the manner directed in the immediately following sections.

26. Maintenance of Institution.—The governors

shall maintain as at present the institution called the Scott Institution, either in the present buildings belonging thereto, or in such other buildings as they may acquire or erect in place thereof. They shall maintain in the said buildings as many foundationers as the funds of the said Institution enable them to maintain, clothe, and educate.

27. Selection of Foundationers.—The founda-

tioners shall be indigent orphans or fatherless children. They shall not be less than seven nor more than ten years of age, at the time of their They shall be of good conduct and admission. sound health, and the children of persons who for two years before the date of application have not been in receipt of parochial aid. On the occurrence of vacancies the governors shall take such means to obtain suitable candidates, by advertisement or otherwise as they shall think fit. In the event of there being more candidates than vacancies the selection shall be made with due regard to merit as ascertained by such examination suited to the age of the candidates as the governors may from time to time prescribe; or in the case of children for whom such examination is unsuitable, by evidence that the children possess such qualifications as to justify their selection; and in the case of children who have been in attendance at school during one or more school years, the governors shall, in making their selection, give special weight to good conduct, attendance, and progress at school during the previous year. No foundationers shall remain on the foundation longer than the close of the year during which he or she has attained the age of fifteen years. The governors shall at any time have the power of dismissing a foundationer on such grounds as may appear to them sufficient.

· 28. Education of Foundationers.—The governors shall cause the foundationers to be educated at any public or State-aided school they think fit.

29. Superintendent and Matron.—The governors may appoint a superintendent and matron to manage the domestic work of the institution and to superintend the education and conduct of the children out of school hours. The governors shall define the work of the superintendent and matron in such manner as they may see fit. They may also appoint a medical man, at such allowance or salary as they may fix, to attend the children.

30. Power to close Institution.—It shall at any time be in the power of the governors, by a resolution carried at a special meeting called for the purpose, and supported by not less than two-thirds of the governors for the time being, to close the institution, to sell or let the buildings thereof, and to board out the foundationers. The governors shall in that case have it in their power to determine the annual sum to be paid for the maintenance and clothing of the foundationers, and the person to whom and the conditions under which it shall be paid. The foundationers shall continue to be selected and educated in the same manner and under the same conditions as before the closing of the institution.

31. Scholarships.—The governors shall apply an annual sum not exceeding £100 in paying, in whole or in part as they may think fit, the fees of scholars, with books and stationery, at public or State-aided schools in the burgh of Greenock, for

elementary education as defined in the Educational Endowments (Scotland) Act, 1882. The free scholars shall be children whose parents of guardians, not being in receipt of parochial relief, are in such circumstances as to require aid for providing elementary education, and are persons who, in the opinion of the governors, ought not to be required to apply to the Parochial Board for such aid. The governors shall have power to expend an additional annual sum, not exceeding £15, in providing or assisting to provide clothing for the most needy of these children.

In the case of children under ten years of age, the selection of free scholars shall be made with due regard to merit as ascertained by such examination, suited to the age of the candidates, as the governors may from time to time prescribe; or in the case of children for whom such examination is unsuitable, by evidence that the children possess such qualifications as to justify their selection; and in the case of children who have been in attendance at school during one or more school years, the governors shall, in making their selection, give special weight to good conduct, attendance, and progress at school during the previous year. The fees in respect of children under ten years of age shall not be paid for more than one school year without re-appointment, and the amount to be expended in paying fees for such children shall not exceed one-third of the amount to be applied under this section.

In the case of children of ten years of age and upwards, the free scholars shall be selected by competitive examinations, which shall be open to all of the same age who are eligible in terms hereof, whether they have or have not previously been beneficiaries; and for such children the school fees may continue to be paid for such period, not exceeding three years, as the governors may determine. If any scholar gain a school bursary his school fees shall no longer be paid under this section.

The governors, at the end of every school year, shall obtain from the teacher or teachers a special report as to the conduct, regularity of attendance, and progress of all scholars whose school fees are paid in whole or in part under this section, and the fees of no scholar shall continue to be paid in regard to whom such report is not satisfactory.

regard to whom such report is not satisfactory.

32. School Bursaries.—The governors shall apply an annual sum of not less than £100 in establishing school bursaries, which shall be called the Fairrie School Bursaries, each of the yearly value of not less than £5 nor more than £10. These bursaries shall be awarded by competitive examination among pupils attending public or State-aided schools in the burgh of Greenock, who have passed the fifth standard of the present Scotch Code, or such standard as may from time to time be fixed by the Scotch Education Department, pursuant to the Education (Scotland) Acts, as that entitling children to total exemption from the obligation to attend school, and whose parents or guardians are in such circumstances as to require aid for giving them higher education; these bursaries shall be tenable for two years at public or State-aided schools in which efficient instruction is given in the higher branches.

33. Bursaries for Higher or Technical Education.—The governors shall apply the residue of the free income of the endowment in either or both of the following ways, viz:—

(a) They may apply an annual sum in establishing bursaries for higher education,

each of the yearly value of not less than £10 nor more than £15. These bursaries shall be awarded by competitive examination among pupils attend-ing public or State-aided schools in the burgh of Greenock, whose parents or guardians require aid in giving them higher education, and whose age at the date of the competition shall not exceed fourteen years; they shall be tenable for such period, not exceeding three years, as the governors may determine, at such schools or classes for higher education or technical instruction as they may approve.

(b) University or Technical School Bursaries. -They may apply an annual sum in establishing bursaries for university or technical education, each of the yearly value of not less than £15 or more than £20. These bursaries shall be awarded by competitive examination among those who have been pupils in public or State-aided schools in the burgh of Greenock for at least six months before the date of examination; they shall be tenable for such period not exceeding four years as the governors may determine, at a university or technical school to be approved by the governors.

34. Forfeiture of Bursaries .- If, in the judgment of the governors, the holder of any bursary shall be guilty of serious misconduct, or fail to make reasonable progress, they may withdraw such bursary, and their determination in such case shall be final.

35. Annual Distribution of Bursaries.—The governors shall establish the bursaries herein provided for in such manner as to secure that they shall be awarded in as nearly as possible equal numbers in each year.
