Paris, Nov. 18. Almeloe, Hengle, Gramsberg, and Ven-nebrug and now more lately Wiefchoe, with the Fort of Bruggen Scana, the Castle of Wedde, and the Cloy ster of Appel, out of which a party of his had some time before been forced by the Hollanders. And it is confirmed to us by leveral good hands from Bruffe ls, that lie has taken the strong Fort of Bourtaigne, and Reid, a Sea-port, scituate near Dramme and De pfs-Isle, in divers of which places his Highness has left very considerable Garri fons, besides his Field-Army, which consists of 1800 Foot, and 6000 Horse effective,

Norwich, Nov. 8. Haward Commander (the same that some months since, in a small Welt countrey Vessel, with 8 Men and a Boy, so bravely master d the Turks man of War) to whomseveral Merchant Ships, to the number of i6, or 17. had joyned themselves; parting with the Fox Frigat, and a Merchant man, bound for Sally, on a particular defign, & at the expence of a private Merchant, off of Care Sparta, the Merchant-men (as their cuitom is) faluting thole 2 at their going off for Sally, gave notice to y Dutch men of War already under Sail before the Bay of Catiq, the Admiral of 56 Guns, one of 45, one of 40, and two of 3 each, who having the wind at N. W. were presently up with ours. The Merlin was the headmost & perceived not the Dutch, who came in the stern (it seems) till they had possessed themselves of two Victualers, and one Merchant-man bound for Legern, Capt. Allen Commandder. He immediately tacked about, & so mawled them for 4 hours that our whole Fleet had time to escape into the Bay of Tangier. Having received several shots under water, his masts and tackling much maimed, and perceiving the headmost of the Dutch Ships the Charles a Ship of 45 guns, who had done him the most mischief, to be making after our Fleet, and that she would inevitably take them all, he frankly run himfelf aboard her, where he fought a full hour board and board rill at length the Captain being that through the shoulder with the Musker Bullet, and grazed cross the forehead with another, having now seen all his Men save eight, fall dead, or desperately wounded by his fide, he was at last brought to yield, and was carried into cadiz, where he is faid to be in a hope-
