Newcastle, October 26.

Vessel belonging to Bruges, called the Crown'd Charity of that place in Flanders, by the owner, freighted for France, and returning laden with Wines and other Commodities, was lately near Daufingbrough-Castle split in pieces, and great spoil made by the people before any order could be given for the security of her Freight, the Tackle is most of Punshoes and Hogsheads of Wine, ir Gyed, and about 200 which are to be brought hither.

Vienna, October 9. The Count Sinsendorff, a Counfellor in the Imperial Court, is dispatcht from hence to the Elector of Brandenburgh, about the Affaires of Bremen, to impower him to Treat and Negotiate with General Wrangle, to withdraw his forces from that City, and if possible to compose those differences in an amicable way, to prevent on all fides any further inconveniencies that may follows if the Empire should be forc'd to appear in desence of the Bremens, to which purpose his Imperial Majesty has written a long letter to the King of Swedeland, wherein having given that City the Title of Imperial, the Sieur Ballitski has refuted to receive it, pretending the City to have an Immediate dependance upon the Dakedom.

General Wrangle has not yet so closely approacht to the Town, as to make it a formal siege, nor is it thought that he intends any fareher attempt at present, considering the strangth of the place, and the posture of the neighbor Princes,

which is like to give much difficulty to his design. - .

Letters from the Rhine inform us, that the Commissioners from France and Swedeland, are arrived at Hailbrun, in order to the composure of the differences between the two Electors, but the Hostilities still continue, and the Lorrainers according to their old Custom plunder both sides without any diffinction.

Dantzick, October 12. Our Letters from Warfaw inform us, that the Soldiers of the Confederacy not receiving their pay according to the lare agreement, after feveral complaints made, are now grown to very licentious, as to plunder all they can, not confide ing whither it belong to the King or the Nobility; the Kings Soldiers are also very insolent, and commit many violences, and are suspected to have entred into a confederacy, being infinitely disgusted, that no care is token-to diffinguish them from those that were formerly Enemies to the Crown, who by the Amnifty are equally priviledged and rewarded with them, that freely hexarded their lives in the service of their Prince and County. but they have some hopes that the Diet that is suddenly to be held, will take some speedy course in their affaires.

The Treaty between the Swedes and Muscovites, having been much advanced, and great topes given of a full compofure of all differences, upon a late meeting of the Commissioners, one of the Moscovites falling into a warm discourte with a Commissioner of the swedes, the contest grew to so great height, that some blowes past between them, which put an end to the meeting, and ris seared may tetard the full conclution of the Treaty.

Naples, October 12. Here are lately arrived three Genouese Gallies, which are to be added to the Royal Squadron, and with them to fail for Spain, and on them are to Inbarque 800 Soldiers that have been here railed for the Spanish leivice, and are ready to fet fail, to affift in the Warrs against Portugal.

The Vessuvius having for seme weeks blown up a great thick smeak, has lately covered the Mountains near it with

ashes, which are likewise scattered into several parts of this Kingdom, at a very considerable distance from it.

Signior Don Vincenzo Tuttavilla, having by the last Courrier from Spain, received Letters Patents for Camp-Master-General over the Forces of this Kingdom, this day took possession of that charge, the Vice-roy presenting him with the Baston, as he did likewise to his two Adjutants. Don Alfonzo Cabrera, and Don Geronomo de Letitia, who executed the same employments under his Predecessor the late Don Pietro Gongales; which done, he presently in executions of his command, mustred the Spanish and Neoplitan Forces, making choice of a company for his Guards, and afterwards giving a liberal and noble Treate to all his

Rome, Odober 16. On the 11 instant, was held a Config story by his Holiness in the Quirina, in which Cardinal Francis Barberin was, according to his right, admitted to the quality of Dean of the Sacred Colledge, with the Title usually annexed to it of Bishop of Hostia and Vellettri. Several Bishopricks were also conferred upon other Cardinals, particularly that of Porto and Santia Ruffina upon Cardinal Genesti, who, by his Senicrity, is now Sub-dean of the Colledge. Freseati upon Cardinal Pallotta. Sabina upon Cardinal Brancaccio, formerly chief of the Order of Cardinal Priests. Albano upon Cardinal Carpegna. The Title of St. Lorenzo in Lucina upon Cardinal Duraggo, now cheif of the Cardinal Priests. Sanota Maria in Trastevere upon Cardinal Ludovisia. Sanota Maria degl' Angeli upon Cardinal Orfino, heretofore cheif of the Order of Cardinal Descons, and now entred into that of the Priests. And Sancts Maria in Vialets upon Cardinal Maidalchine, at present chief of the Cardinal Deacons: After which, divers Archbishopricks and Bishopricks in Italy, Germany, Spain and France, were proposed by the several Cardinal Protectors of those Countries; but continued not long in Debates for fear of giving the Pope too long a trouble after his great indisposition.

His H linels is this morning carried to Caftel Gondolpho, hoping the change of Air may contribute to his recovery. He was carried in a close Chair, and staid two hours by the way to rest himself at Torre de Mesania, two Leagues from Romo; and from thence went on a League Turther to a houle of the Connestable Colonna, whe esby the Abbot his brother (him-self being at Milan) be was Treated with all his Train with much magnificence; and after three hours Repose there, went to Castel Gendolpho, a League from thence; the Care dinals Chify, Rospigliofi and Nini, attending him in this Retirement.

The Spaniards in their Council at Madrid, seeming fully latisfied of the Realons offered by Cardinal Chify, for quirting his otherwise intended Legation to Milan, have certified the Empress thereof, who has admitted into her presence, the Sciencus Turrians Bishop of Como, introduced by the Duke d' Albuquerque : and received from him the Popes Brief, and the Gardinal Nephews Letter of Excuse: Though the Governor, Don Louis Ponce de Leon, seems not yet wholly farisfied, interpreting this as an effect of the Cardinals partiality, and fecret devotion for the French interest. 'Tis confilently faid, that the Emprels is gone from Milan onwords towards Germany. The Cardinal d' Harach, and the Prince Dietrichstein, with the other Officers appointed for her Train, attend her arrival at Trent.

France, where were present the Cardinals Anthonio, Orfini, Maidalchini, and Mancini, the French Ambassador, and a great number of other Personages of the highest Quality.

Legorn, Octob. 18. The 14 instant, arrived here a ship of this Town in 17 dayes from Algier, who tells us, that 16 of thole Corfairs were abroad, and leveral others making ready to follow.

On the 16 arrived here the Prince of Orange, 1 great Durch thip empty from Genoua, to lade Com for Lubon.

Yesterday came in a French Barque from Algier in 12 dayes, telling us, that 36 Corfairs were gone out to Sea; and that there would be an Embargo put upon all Merchan:s fhips for some time.

The Merchants here in consi leration of the Losses sustained in London by the late Fire, have, out of their Charity, railed near 300 i. towards their Relief; which they intend

speedily to Return, to be distributed as His Majesty pleases.

Genouz, Offob. 20. Yesterday arrived here two Durch Merchant men from Cadiz and Alicant, with about a million of peeces of Eight incontanti, besides some Bars of silver, for Marfeilles, this place, and Legorn; and tis said are to lade Corn back again for Cadiz. Two other Durch ships are now going off from hence for Sicily upon the fame Errand. The Infurance upon our Convoy to the Levant is very high, no Letters being yet arrived with certain News from thence.

The Empress much satisfied with her Reception in the City of Milan, where the spent many dayes with great variery of Divertisements; on the 10 inftant left the City, in order to her journey to Vienna, attended by the Duke d' Albaquerque, and the rest of her own Court; and waited on by all the Nobility of those parts, who intend to conduct her as far as the Venetian Territories, through which she is to

Venice, Octob. 22. Letters from the Armada this week arrived, inform us of their good condition under the Admirals General Cornaro, and Marquels Villa, that a part of them are with them in the Archipelago, and another part divided into several Squadrons are cruling about those Seas, to prevent the Tu ks in their design of transporting Men and Victuals into Cunea, who are as eager in lending them, as ours are to hinder them. Several Saichs and great Barques intended thither, have faln into our hands, which has made the Turks very sensible of the wants in Canea. We have no other news of their Gallies, but onely that a Squadron of them chaced by some of ours, had the good fortune to save themselves by their nimbleness, being also savored by the coming on of the night.

Some parties of Tuiks lately got into a body, appeared before Candia Nova, but rather to shew themselves, then to make any attempt confiderable, being content onely to look upon the Town at some distance, where dissuarging tome Guns, they retired again to their Quarters, That Garison being too well fortified and supplied with Men and Provisions, to fear any force can be brought against it.

From Conffantinople we are advised, that the Divan have been in great confultation, what answer to return the Grand Seignior about the Affairs of Asia, and the Wars in Dama. tia, which he feems very earnest to profecute with all pessible diligence.

The Grand Visier continues still his Residence at Tebe in Morea with his whole Atmy, which lies quartered at a distance, by reason of the great Mortality amongst them: His late fending for our Amballador, the Secretary Ballarino from Constantinople, gives us reason to believe he has entertain'd some thoughts of peace: Which if true, will foon difcover it falf upon his arrival there.

Our late Letters from Dalmetia tell us, that the Turks have had lately a defign upon Gradan, a strong Fort, not far diffant from Marcases, and in process ion of it, had suddenly begitt it, and planted several Batteries; from whence, with their Cannon, they began furiously to batter the Towers of the Fort, and the Gallies which lay near it for its afliftance, but were so well ply'd from both places, that they were fain to quit their l'osts, and leave the siege, with the loss of at least 400 of their men.

Hague, Novemb. 1. The Fishers from most parts are gone cut, and several Busses; but the season of the year being so much advanced, they have but little encouragement for the work.

The presecution of Buats Accomplices, as they stile them here, is at present at a stand; but 't s also believed will fuddenly again be put into motion with greater vigour then before.

The East-India fhip put into Gluckftade upon the Elbe, ftill continues there, and about 20 Merchants lufty thips from Hamburgh lie ready about the Malls richly laden, with two Convoys of 40 Guns apiece, which are with the fieft fair wind to fet fail for spain, but with great apprehension of danger in paffing through the Channel

Tis given out, that the French King hath acquainted the Spanish Ambasiador of Orders given out by him for the feizing of all ships belonging to Flanders which have been bought of the English lince his D. claration of War with them, suspecting that the English drive on a Trade under their

covert and protection.

Prince Charles, brother to the King of Smeden, is lately arrived here incognito, as is likewife the Marquels de Monta pillan from France.

On Monday last, was concluded the Treaty between the States, the King of Denmark Elector of Brandenburgh and Duke of Lunenburgh; which was accordingly figned by their respective Deputies and Envoyes, and is to be lent to the Elector of Erandenburgh to be perused, during his abode at Cleves.

We have here advice of several of our Merchants cast away by storm about the height of Hamburgh, but the particulars of the lofs we yet know not.

Paris, November 5. The Council for that Government has propoled the fetting of Forty Courts of Guards in leveral Streets of this City, for the publick security thereof, and to add 300 to the Guard of Archery, under the Provost of the Ist., and Captain of the Watch, who are to be answerable for any Robberies committed in the night. They propose likewise the building of fixteen Conduits for Water in leveral quarters of the City, and to take away the private ones that belong to particular persons, which shall be thought prejudicial to those of publick use.

The Baron de Rede, a Hollander. coming yesterday to Town, speaks publickly of the death of de Ruyter, which we give not much credit to, it contradicting our late Letters from Amsterdam.

Malaga, Odob. 2. The Garilon of Tangier is in a sery good condition, and much courted both by Taffalets and Gayland, who daily furnish the Town with all sorts of Provisions, Some prizes have been of late brought in there by the Velkels belonging to that Ga ison, viz. Three Sayles and a Tartane, all laden with Corn.

Hull, Offober 28. A Dantgicker arriving here this day from Northbergen with Deales and Oyle, telle us that at his departure thence, there were neither Dutch Men of Warr nor Merchants in that Fort, meither did he in his passage hither, meet with any Men of Warr, only upon the Dogger Sands he discovered two Galliots standing over for Holland.

London, Officher 29. This day Sir William Bellen Lord Mayor for the year Enfuing, came in his Coach to Westminster, attended by the Aldermen his Brethren, the Sheriffs, and several Eminent Citizens in their Corches, where he was Sworn with the usual! Ceremonies.

Whitehal, Offob 30. Sir George Moore, with some other Proprietors of Houses lately demolishe by the Fire in Fleetfireet, having prayed liberty to rebuild the same, according to such Model, form and scantling as should be set them by the Committee appointed by His Majesty for the advancement of that great work, (to which they offered with all willingness to submit and conform themselves. ) It was this day ordered by His Majesty in Council, That the said Proprietors should have liberty to re-edifie their Buildings accordingly.
