The KING's most Excellent Majesty in Council.

HEREAS the Time limited by His Majesty's Proclamation of the 15th of May last, "For giving Encouragement to Seamen and able bodied Landmen to enter themselves on board His Maiesty's Ships of War; for granting Rewards for " discovering such Seamen as shall conceal them-" selves; for pardoning such Seamen as have deserted and shall return into the Service; and also for taking up all stragling Seamen," hath been prolonged and extended to the 10th of this Instant May; - And whereas it is judged expedient for His Majesty's Service, that the same should be continued for some Time longer; - His Majesty doth therefore, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby order, that the faid Time be prolonged and extended from the aforesaid 10th Day of this Instant May, to the 21st Day of June next; and that the Bounties and Rewards given and granted by His Majesty's aforementioned Proclamation, be continued to be paid until the faid 21st Day of June next. - Whereof all Persons concerned are to take Notice, and govern themselves accordingly. Hague, May 16.
