AT the Court at *Kensington*, the 2d Day of *May*, 1760,

P R E S E N T,

The KING's most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS the Time limited by His Majesty's Proclamation of the 15th of May last, "For giving Encouragement to Seamen and able bodied Landmen to enter themselves on board His Majesty's Ships of War; for granting Rewards for discovering such Seamen as shall conceal themselves; for pardoning such Seamen as have deserted and shall return into the Service; and also for taking up all stragling Seamen," hath been prolonged and extended to the 10th of this Instant May; — And whereas it is judged expedient for His Majesty's Service, that the same should be continued for some Time longer; — His Majesty doth therefore, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby order, that the said Time be prolonged and extended from the aforesaid 10th Day of this Instant May, to the 21st Day of June next; and that the Bounties and Rewards given and granted by His Majesty's aforementioned Proclamation, be continued to be paid until the said 21st Day of June next. — Whereof all Persons concerned are to take Notice, and govern themselves accordingly.

Hague, June 3. In Consequence of the Alarm given by a Detachment of the Allied Army under Colonel Luckner, who was for some Time in Possession of the French Post at Butzbach, the whole Army of Marshal Broglie was, we hear, in Motion towards Friedberg, from the 24th to the 27th past. Since that Time, they have been cantoned in the Villages of Weteravia, where they are so much crouded, that, it is supposed, they will not remain long in that Situation: It is given out, that they are to encamp between the 10th and 16th.

We are now confidently assured, that the Wurtembergers, under the Duke their Sovereign, computed at Nine Thousand Men, have separated themselves entirely from the French.

We are yet without News of any important Operation being begun by the respective Armies in Germany: And our last Letters from Dantzick, which are of the 21st past, mention, That the Russians, which have been quartered in that Neighbourhood, remain still in a State of Inaction.

By Letters from Magdebourg of the 27th past, we find, that the King of Prussia continued in his strong Camp near Meissen; and that his Royal Highness Prince Henry was still at Sagan; that General Salomon, by Means of a Reinforcement sent him by his Prussian Majesty, had been able to stop the farther

Progress of General Klefeldt, who had advanced as far as Naumbourg, with a Part of the Army of the Empire; and that the Austrian Generals Laudohn and Beck, who had reached Zittau, had on a sudden retreated to Reichenberg in Bohemia; but that their Designs and Motives for this unexpected Retreat, did not yet appear.

The States General came to a Resolution, Yesterday, upon the Coinage of Gold; and several other Regulations relating to their Money: And Twelve Millions of Florins, in Ryders and Half Ryders, are to be issued immediately. All Ducats not milled, to be declared Bullion; and no Ducats whatever are to be received in Payment, but with the mutual Consent of both Parties.

The King has been pleased to present the Hon. and Rev. Mr. Allen Bathurst, Clerk, to the Rectory of Beverston, with the Chapel of Kingscot thereunto annexed, in the County and Diocese of Gloucester, void by the Death of Thomas Savage the last Incumbent.
