P R E S E N T,

The Lords of His Majesty's most Honourable Privy-Council.

WHEREAS the Time limited by His Majesty's Proclamation of the 15th of May last, "For giving Encouragement to Seamen and able bodied Landmen to enter themselves on board His Majesty's Ships of War; for granting Rewards for discovering such Seamen as shall conceal themselves; for pardoning such Seamen as have deserted and shall return into the Service; and also for taking up all stragling Seamen," hath been prolonged and extended to the 21st of this Instant June; — And whereas it is judged expedient for His Majesty's Service, that the same should be continued for some Time longer; — It is therefore hereby ordered in Council, that the said Time be prolonged and extended from the aforesaid 21st Day of this Instant June, to the 31st Day of July next; and that the Bounties and Rewards given and granted by His Majesty's aforementioned Proclamation, be continued to be paid until the said 31st Day of July next. — Whereof all Persons concerned are to take Notice, and govern themselves accordingly.

*Petersbourg, May 23.* Most of the General Officers, who are to make the Campaign, have left this Place successively. Field Marshal *Soltikow* is still here, but talks of setting out about the Beginning of the next Week. The Great Chancellor, who, for some Time past, had been a good deal out of Order, is now so well recovered, that he goes Abroad.

*Copenhagen, June 10.* Letters from *Ellenore* mention, That, on the 6th Instant, His Majesty's Ship the *Gosport*, Capt. *John Elliot*, arrived in the Sound with 25 Merchant-men, which have been a Month in their Passage from England.

*Hague, June 17.* Prince *Ferdinand's* Army remained, on the 14th, still encamped at *Fritzlar*, where General *Waldegrave's* Regiment of Dragoon Guards arrived the preceding Day. The Carabineers are to be at *Paderborn* on the 24th. The first Division of the Corps of Infantry, lately sent from England, was to march into Camp on this Day (the 17th) and the second Division was to follow them on the 20th.

Marshal *Broglio's* main Army, by the last Accounts, was not yet encamped. *M. de St. Germain* keeps his former Position near *Duffeldorp*, on the Left of the *Rhine*. We hear, that a Detachment of His Majesty's Troops had attacked the Village of *Myerbeck*, where a Part of *Fischer's* Corps was, and had taken Prisoners a great Number, which had spread the Alarm to *Roerort* and *Doebourg*, whith the Enemy seemed determined to abandon.

By the Letters from *Saxony*, of the 4th Instant, nothing material had happened at the King of *Prussia's* Camp near *Meissen*. There have been some

few slight Skirmishes in those Parts; particularly, a Party of *Prussian Hussars*, who had been sent on the 2d Instant, from the Post of *Coldorff* near *Torgau*, to patrol along the Right of the *Elbe* towards *Dresden*, fell into an Ambuscade, by which they lost thirty Men, and one Officer: And, about the same Time, a *Prussian Officer* of Hussars surpris'd a Party of *Saxon Horse* in the Town of *Zwickau*; made the Officer that commanded them, and the greatest Part of the Men, Prisoners; and had the good Fortune to get safe off, with a Booty of Fifty Horses.

*Dublin, June 5.*

Yesterday being the Anniversary of the Birth of his Royal Highness the Prince of Wales, the Great Guns were fired in His Majesty's Park the *Phoenix*, and answered by Volleys from the Regiments in *Garrison*, which were drawn out in the Royal Square in the Barracks: At Noon there was a very splendid Appearance of the Nobility, and other Persons of Distinction at the Castle, to compliment their Excellencies the Lords Justices upon the Occasion. In the Evening there was a Play given by their Excellencies for the Entertainment of the Ladies: And the Night concluded with every Demonstration of Joy.
