The Lords of His Majesty's most Honourable Privy-Council.

WHEREAS the Time limited by His Majesty's Proclamation of the 15th of May last, "For giving Encouragement to Seamen and able bodied Landmen to enter themselves on board His Mai jesty's Ships of War; for granting Rewards for " discovering such Seamen as shall conceal them-" felves; for pardoning such Seamen as have desertde and shall return into the Service; and also for taking up all stragling Seamen," hath been pro-longed and extended to the 21st of this Instant June; — And whereas it is judged expedient for His Majesty's Service, that the same should be continued for some Time longer; — It is therefore hereby ordered in Council, that the said Time be prolonged and extended from the aforesaid 21st Day of this Instant June, to the 31st Day of July next; and that the Bounties and Rewards given and granted by His Majesty's aforementioned Proclamation, be continued to be paid until the faid 31st Day of July next. — Whereof all Persons concerned are to take Notice, and govern themselves accordingly.

Hague, June 20. The last Accounts, received here from the Allied Army, are of the 16th Instant, when Prince Ferdinand's Head Quarters were still at Wavern. The Main Army of the French under Marshal Broglio, remained in Cantonments on the 15th, and no Day fixed for its encamping. A very confiderable Corps, under the Command of Count de Lusace, was encamped at Lohr; and another of the same Force at Gelnhausen, under M. de St. Pern; both which are upon Marshal Broglio's Right. Upon his Left, M. de Guerchy, who was advanced to Hachenbourg, is fallen back upon Limburg, and has joined Prince Camille; the rest of the French Army is canton'd along the Lahn, and round Friedberg.

Since the Skirmish at Meyerick, where the British Legion surprized a Party of the Fischers, M. de St. Germain thought proper to cross the Rhine; which he did on the 16th, and encamped between Doef-bourg and Keyserswaert, with the Head Quarters at Winckelhausen. General Sporcken's Corps remain-

ed about Dulmen.
