The Lords of His Majesty's most Honourable Privy-Council.

WHEREAS the Time limited by His Majesty's Proclamation of the 15th of May last, "For giving Encouragement to Seamen and able bodied Landmen to enter themselves on board His Ma-" jesty's Ships of War; for granting Rewards for discovering such Seamen as shall conceal them-" felves; for pardoning such Seamen as have deserted and shall return into the Service; and also for " taking up all stragling Seamen," hath been pro-longed and extended to the 21st of this Instant June; — And whereas it is judged expedient for His Majesty's Service, that the same should be continued for some Time longer; — It is therefore hereby ordered in Council, that the faid Time be prolonged and extended from the aforesaid 21st Day of this Instant June, to the 31st Day of July next; and that the Bounties and Rewards given and granted by His Majesty's aforementioned Proclamation, be continued to be paid until the said 31st Day of July next. — Whereof all Persons concerned are to take Notice, and govern themselves accordingly.

Landsbut, June 17. General Fouquet, who had under his Command the Major Generals Schenkendorff, Malachowski, Grant, and Colonel Rosen, having marched Yeslerday from Schweidniz, with fifteen Squadrons of Dragoons and Hussars, eight Battalions of Infantry, and three Free Battalions, arrived, at Ten o'Clock this Morning, before the Gates of Landshut. This Post was guarded by a Gates of Landshut. This Post was guarded by a considerable Body of Austrian Troops, consisting of the Regiment of Modena Cuirassiers, the Archduke Joseph's Dragoons, Palfi's Hussars, and another Regiment of Hussars; together with the Regiments of Foot of Platz, of the Archduke Joseph, of Konigsegg, of Simbschon, of Breysac, and several Regiments of Croats and Hungarian Infantry; the Whole commanded by the Generals Gaisrugg, St. We begun the Attack Ignon, Jahnus, and Gourcy. upon the Enemy on three Sides, and it lasted till Four o'Clock in the Asternoon; when the Enemy, being drove from every Redoubt one after another, were at last forced to retreat. We have repossessed ourselves of all the Heights, where most of the Redoubts have been destroyed by the Enemy.

As their Corps was much superior to ours, they covered their Retreat in such a Manner, that we have only been able to make a very fmall Number of Prisoners, confisting of fifty Men, one Captain,

and two Lieutenants.

Our Loss does not amount to more than about

twenty Men killed and wounded.

From bis Prussian Majesty's Head Quarters at Radeburg the 22d of June, 1760. The King having thought it proper to cross the Elbe, executed his Defign on the 14th in the Afternoon, at a Place opposite Zadel, without the least Opposition from the Enemy, tho' their Patroles had discovered our Motions, and their Proximity made the Attempt diffi-cult. A sufficient Body of Troops was lest to guard

AT the Council-Chamber, Whitehall, the 12th the Borders of the Tribsch, and the Bridges that Day of June, 1760, had been laid below Meissen for that Purpose. His Prustian Majesty took Possession of the Camp of Broschwitz; and Marshal Daun, after having crossed the River, came and occupied that of Reichenberg. On the 18th the King begun again to march, in order to gain the Enemy's Right Flank. The Saxon Dragoons and Hulans had advanced to Gross-Dobritz; but, on the Approach of his Prussian Majesty's Van-Guard, they threw themselves, with Precipitation, into the Wood of Steinbach, and went to join General Lascy, who after having called in General Brentano's Corps, encamped on the Heights of Bernsdorff, with the Brook of Primnitz before him. The Prussian Van-Guard continued their March towards Radeburg. The Enemy, on their Approach, evacuated the Town; a Troop of their Warrasdins, not having been quick enough in their Flight, were cut off. The Saxon Dragoons and Hulans, supported by all the Enemy's Cavalry, were then attacked by the Hussars and Dragoons of the Prussian Van-Guard; who forced the former to pass the Brook, pursuing them, Swo:d in Hand, to their Camp. After which, the Enemy's Artillery be-ginning to play upon the Prussian Van-Guard, pre-vented their further Progress. They took however some Hundreds of Horses. The Rapidity of their March, not having permitted the Army and Can-non to keep up with them, made it necessary to defer the Attack to the next Day.

The Strength of General Lascy's Corps; the advantageous Ground he occupied; the Proximity of Marshal Daun's Army, who in less than two Hours could have joined him; all these Circumstances feemed to make a Battle unavoidable: Notwithstanding which, and contrary to all Expectation, General Lascy, taking the Advantage of the Darkness of the Night, filed off to the Camp of Reichenberg, in fortifying which the Enemy have employed a great Part of the Winter Season. The Prussian Hussars, in Pursuit of General Lascy's Corps, made some

Booty, and took some Stragglers.

Hague, July 1. We have received News, by our Letters from Hesse, that the respective Armies in those Parts are in full Motion. Prince Ferdinand left his Camp at Fritzlar on the 24th; and marched to Frillingdorff. And, by our last Accounts, which are of the 28th past, we know that his Serene Highness's Head Quarters were then at Diedershausen, the Army being encamped on the Hills between Ziegentheim and Freysa; General Imhoss commanding at a small Distance on the Right, and the Hereditary Prince of Brunswick on the Left, who had marched thither from the Country of Fulde, after fome fuccefsful Skirmishes with the Enemy, particularly on the 18th at Hosenfeldt, and on the 23d at Zielbach, in which his Highness took some Officers, and feveral Men and Horses of Berchini's Corps, without any Loss on his Side. In the mean while M. de Broglio, we are informed, being joined by Prince Xavier of Saxony from his Right, and by M. de Guerchy from the Left, has affembled his Army, and encamped on the 22d between Merlan and Laubach. He has fince marched to Neufladt, where his Camp was fixed on the 28th, with a strong Post at Wassemberg. In this critical Situation of the Armies, which are now within so little Distance of each other, we are in Expectation of hearing soon of
