Himburgh, June 28. The 21 instant, the El. of Brandenburgh arrived at Maegdeburgh with his whole Army, which is to pass the Elbe in two several places, together with the Artillery, and foradvance against the Suedes. In our last we told you, of 700 Suedes having been furprized and destroyed in Stargard, which proves not so; but we have certain advice, that 2000 Brandenburghs, commanded out for that purpose, have fallen upon the Regiment of Dragovons commanded by Collonel Wangelin consisting in 7 or 800 Men, who were quartered at Rotenaw, and have cut them all off, except the Collonel who was the only Person of that whole Regiment that escaped alive, and was together with his Lady taken Prisoners; and it is said, that the Suedes have thereupon quitted Hanelant. Many people are very much concerned to fee the parties act with fo much sharpness, but it feems, the Brandenburghs are somewhat incensed at the Suedes having burnt a House belonging to the Elector in Oranienburgh. It is faid, that the Emperors Troops are marching from Silefis to affift the Elector. The King of Denmark is arrived at Gottorp in Holftein, to be present at the Rendezvous of his Army.

Strasburgh, fune 24. The two Armies continue still very near, the Imperialists are quartered about the Abby of Schutterne, and Monsieur de Turennes Army is encamped along the River Schutterne, which divides his and the Germans Camp. . We are told that Monsieur de Turenne expects a reinforcement of Foot, and that three Regiments are expected to arrive the 26 instant at Sa-

tion of an Engagement between the two Armies, who begin to be somewhat incommoded for want of several We are told, that General Montegueuli. two or three days fince, fent to delire a Pass of Monsieur de Turenne, for himself to go to Strasburgh, for that he was not well; to which, Monsieur de Turenne replyed, That there were several good Imperial Towns behind him, but yet if his Excellency was very ill, he would willingly grant him a Poss; whereupon General Montecuculi the next day returned him thanks for his civility, and let. him know, that being pretty well again, he needed it not.

Co'ogne, June, 28. On Suncay latt, as we wild you, parred hence the Duke of Larrain, with intentions, as was faid, to join the Prince of Orange and the Duke ide VIlla Hermola, but being gone about three Leagues, he had advice of a French party of 200 Horse being jabroad, to waylay him, upon which his Highnels returned hither again the same evening. The Lorrain, Luneaburgh, and Ofnabrugh Troops are likewife coming back this way, and yesterday the Infantry and the Osticers of the Artillery which remained on the other fide of the Rhine received orders to pass the River (which they have accordingly done this day) and to march to meet the faid Troops, who according to our last advices were arrived at Erkelens. Here is a report, as if these Lunenburgh, Osnabrugh and Lorrain Forces, being uniced into a Body, would march towards Limburgh, and attempt, if they may with any probability of success, the retaking of that City, where we hear the French are very hard at work about repairing the Fortifications that have been ruined during the Siege. The 24 inflant, the Troops of the Bishop of Munster held a Rendezvous at Warendorp, and we are affored, that 3000 of them, are already on their march towards the Rhine to join with the other Confederates abovementioned, and that the rest of the Troops of that Bishop are to affist the Elector of Erandenburgh.

Bruffels, July 2. The Erench Army hath for feveral dayes layen between Judoigne and Tillemont, the parties that have been fent out, having ruined and plundered the Countrey round about, bringing in all the Cornand Cattle, they meet with. On Saturday last, the Most Christian King dined at Tilment, and in the evening returned again to his Camp, having given orders for the blowing up the gates of the Town, and demolishing part of its fortifications; the Fren hlikewise carried away all the Cattle and Corn they found there. It is reported that the Most Christian King is gone with a Convoy of 4000 Horse to Charleroy, in order to his return to Paris; and that his Army, which is left under the Command of the Prince of Conde, is likewife on its march towards Charleroy. What was faid in our last concerning delign of the Mareschol d' Humieres upon Dix-* u) de, and of his being suddenly dead proves a mi-Pake, the faid Mareschal being very well at Tournay, according to our last advices saom thence. Yesterday the Prince of Oranger Army was encamped about half a League on the other file of Aerfehot, where it is to reft, this way, and to morrow continues its march towards Malines; we are told, that these Troops are very much harraffed with their march, and it will be necessary they go some day's into quarters for their refreshment. have just now advice, that Collonel Massiett i being abroad with a party, hath recountted five Squadrous of Fren b Horse and descated them, taking several Officers Prisoners, &c. of which we expect the more certain particulars.

Hagne, faly 2. We have, by our Letters arrived this day from Co, enhagen, the confirmation of a Marriage being concluded between the King of Sveden, and the Princels of Denmark, which hath a little surprized ma-

werne; in the mean time we continue in great expecta finy people here, for they experted to have heard rather of a Declaration of War made there against the Sucdes However our Letters say, That his Majesly had assured the Ministers of the Allies residing at his Courtsthat the faid Marriage should not in the least hinder him from performing his engagements with the Allies. not any thing of moment from the Prince of Oranges Army; the last Letters from his Highness were dated the 29 path, from his quarters at Sichem, being on his march towards Ma'ines. The French Army, as we are informed, marches towards Charlesoy, and it's believed, the Most Christian King will return to Paris. Some Detters speak, as it the French had still an eye upon Namur, and that they are at present building a Fort nearlis, for the facilitating their delign. The Lirrain and Lunenburgh Cavalry having made some difficulty to pass the Meufe, are marched back to join their Infantry which remairred at Cologne, and that done, will act jointly according to the first design on the side of fuxemburgh, yet so, as to join with the Prince of Orange in case of need. Our Letters from Strasburgh tell us, i hat the two Armies begin to be in want of feveral necessaries, and that they will not be able to subsit much longer in the stations they now are.

Paris, July 3. Our last Letters from the Kings Army are dated the 23 past, and tell us, that his Majesty was then encamped not far from Tilmous, in Brabans, but give us not any account of his Majesties farther designs. The Armies in Germany, according to our advices of the 26 past from Strasburgh continuaed in the fame posture, and so near, that their Out-guards might almost discourse with each other. Ey an extraordinary Courser arrived from Reme, we have advice of the arrival of the French Gallies at Messina; the said Courier reporting farther, That at his departure from Rome, he had heard, that the Duke de Visonne, after the arrival of the said Gallies had made as attack upon the Scaletta, one of the most considerable Posts the Squiards have about Missina, and that he had made himself Master of it; of which we expect the confirmation. We are told, that the grand Dutchels of Tofcany is arrived at Lyons.
