**W**HEREAS the Time limited by His Majesty's Proclamation of the 15th of May last, "For giving Encouragement to Seamen and able bodied Landmen to enter themselves on board His Majesty's Ships of War; for granting Rewards for discovering such Seamen as shall conceal themselves; for pardoning such Seamen as have deserted and shall return into the Service; and also for taking up all stragling Seamen," hath been prolonged and extended to the 21st of this Instant June; — And whereas it is judged expedient for His Majesty's Service, that the same should be continued for some Time longer; — It is therefore hereby ordered in Council, that the said Time be prolonged and extended from the aforefaid 21st Day of this Instant June, to the 31st Day of July next; and that the Bounties and Rewards given and granted by His Majesty's aforementioned Proclamation, be continued to be paid until the said 31st Day of July next. — Whereof all Persons concerned are to take Notice, and govern themselves accordingly.
