Whitehall, August 26.

BY Letters received Yesterday from Brunswick of the 19th Instant it appears, That the following Account had, by Order of his Prussian Majesty, been transmitted, on the 16th Instant, to the Queen of Prussia at Magdebourg, by the Commandant of Glogau; all other Methods of Conveyance being rendered precarious, by the flying Parties of the Austrians, viz. That the King of Prussia had on the 15th attacked the Austrians under General Laudohn in their March between Lignitz and Parchwitz in Silesia: That the Action lasted above two Hours: That the Particulars of it were not then exactly known; but that it was said, that the Loss of the Austrians in Killed and Wounded amounted to Seven Thousand Men; that Four Thousand of them had been made Prisoners, and Ninety Pieces of Cannon taken from them; and that the Loss of the Prussians did not exceed a Thousand Men.

According to the last Letters from Prince Ferdinand's Head Quarters, which are of the 20th, the respective grand Armies remained encamped upon the Dymel, and nothing of Consequence had lately passed between them.
