A PROCLAMATION.
GEORGE R.

WHEREAS Our Parliament stands prorogued to Thursday the Eighteenth Day of this Instant September; We, with the Advice of Our Privy Council, do hereby publish and declare, that the said Parliament shall be further prorogued, on the said Eighteenth Day of September, to Thursday the Thirteenth Day of November next; and We have given Order to Our Keeper of Our Great Seal of Great Britain, to prepare a Commission for proroguing the same accordingly. And we do hereby further declare Our Royal Will and Pleasure, That the said Parliament shall, on the said Thirteenth Day of November next, be held, and fit for the Dispatch of divers weighty and important Affairs: And the Lords Spiritual and Temporal, and the Knights, Citizens, and Burgesses, and the Commissioners for Shires and Burghs of the House of Commons, are hereby required to give their Attendance accordingly at Westminster on the said Thirteenth Day of November next.

Given at Our Court at Kensington the Twelfth Day of September 1760, in the Thirty-fourth Year of Our Reign.

GOD Save the KING.

Hague, Sept. 9. By the Letters from the Army under the Command of Prince Ferdinand of Brunswick, his Serene Highness's Head Quarters were still at Buhne, on the 5th Instant; General Wangenheim was with his Corps at Ullar; the Hereditary Prince maintained his Position between Warbourg and Stadberg; and the Body of Reserve, under the Marquis of Granby, remained at Burgholtz. Marshal Broglie continued at Immenhaufen; but was continually changing the Position of his Troops; and Prince Xavier, with 42 Battalions, as many Squadrons, and a great Corps of Light Troops, encamped still at Eisebeck in the Neighbourhood of Gottengen.

By the last Letters from Silesia of the 26th past, we learn, that the King of Prussia's Head Quarters were at Neukirch near Lissa, and that the Austrians were encamped in the Neighbourhood of Jauer; but it was not likely this Inaction would continue much longer. We have no further News of the Russians since the Confirmation of their having passed the Bartsch. The Army of the Empire crossed the Elbe, and encamped at Coldorff, making an Appearance of a Design upon Wittenberg, and the Marche of Bran-

denburg; and hoping, by that Means to oblige General Hullen to quit his Camp at Torgau: But as he was not deluded by these Motions into changing his Position, the said Army found themselves under a Necessity of repassing the Elbe on the 30th of last Month, and then encamped between Belgeren and Schilde.

General Luzinsky has fallen upon the Town of Halle, and Circle of Sale, where he has made enormous Exactions; and the Duke of Wurtemberg has made some Attempts, hitherto of no Consequence, on the Side of Lower Saxony; whilst the Reigning Duke of Brunswick is taking all proper Measures for the Defence of his Country.
