Brunswick, September 19.

AN Express is arrived here, with Advices from Magdebourg, dated Sept. the 18th, which say, That the King of Prussia marched forward on the 11th, in order to streighten the Enemy; and succeeded in turning the Austrian Army, by directing his March, by Striegau, Hohenfriedberg, and Baumgarten: That his Prussian Majesty, in his Way, on the 12th, had gained a considerable Advantage over the Corps commanded by General Beck; and, in this Affair, made two Battalions of Croats Prisoners, took their Cannon, and entirely dispersed upwards of Thirty Squadrons. Marshal Daun, who had lately his Head Quarters at Furfenstein, has thought proper to retire, with great Precipitation, into the Mountains of Landshut; so that there was Reason to hope, that the Austrians would be soon obliged to evacuate Silesia.

Prince Ferdinand's Head Quarters at Giesmar Wells, Sept. 20.

Marshal Broglio having quitted his Camp at Immenhausen, and fallen back to Cassel, has taken Possession of the Strong Camp there, having his Right to that Place, and his Left to Westenstein. Upon these Motions of the Enemy, Prince Ferdinand advanced General Gilsoe's Corps to Sababourg towards Minden; and the Reserve, under Lord Granby's Command, to Giesmar, his Serene Highness's Head Quarters being fixed here, at the Landgrave of Hesse Cassel's House.

Major Bulow, having happily succeeded in his Expedition against Marburg, in which he took two Standards, and two Companies of the Regiment of Rougrave at Butzback; destroyed at Grunberg and Lungengons, between two and three Hundred Wagons of Flour; and took at Marburg 73 Men; as likewise the Uniforms of several Regiments, some Hundreds of Fuses, and a large Booty for the Troops; he marched on the 11th to join Colonel Fersen, then at Franckenberg. They made on the 12th, a Movement towards Franckenau, which obliged M. de Stainville to quit his Position at Merdenhagen, and to march against them. He came up with their Rear near Munden, upon the River Orcke, and in the Passage thereof, Colonel Fersen, and some Cavalry, were made Prisoners, but not before he had bravely charged the Enemy. Major Bulow having most difficult Defiles to pass, was obliged to abandon a few Pieces of Cannon. This Affair was scarce over, when the Hereditary Prince (who had made a forced March of above five German Miles)

came up, but as it was then Night, and his Men were greatly fatigued, his Highness thought it better to delay his attacking the Enemy till early in the Morning; but M. de Stainville did not think proper to wait, and retired in the Night towards Franckenberg.

General Wangenheim had succeeded on the 15th in obliging the Enemy to retire from the Defiles of Sebede, so that Munden is now the only Place in the Hanoverian Dominions of which they are in Possession: But that General, with his four Battalions, and six Squadrons, was forced from his Camp at Lawenthagen, by thirty Battalions, and eighteen Squadrons, of the Enemy. His Retreat was as well conducted, as the Nature of the Ground, and the Numbers against him, would admit of. His Loss in Men was very inconsiderable; but, for Want of Horses, he was obliged to leave behind four Pieces of Cannon.

Hague, Sept. 23. It is positively said here, that the Russians have given over the Siege of Colberg, upon the Approach of General Werner, with Six Thousand Prussians, who were detached from Prince Henry's Army in Silesia; so that that Place seems again to be freed from Danger. General Werner has not confined his Views to the raising of the Siege of Colberg; after which, he marched immediately to join General Stutterheim, who is opposed to the Swedes, and with whom it was reckoned he would be upon the 22d of this Month. The Swedes, who had advanced as far as Templin, were already retired to Prentzlow.

Lieutenant Anningson, Commander of the Alarm Armed Cutter, has taken and brought into the Downes, a French Privatier Curter, called the Countess D'Ayen, of Dunkirk, carrying eight 3 Pounders, and eight Swivel Guns, with 62 Men.
