Hague, October 6.

YESTERDAY Evening, we received the News from Cleves, that the Castle thereof had capitulated on the 3d Instant; and that M. de Barral, the Commanding Officer there, with the Garrison consisting of about 500 Men, had surrendered Prisoners of War. And we hear likewise from the same Place, that the heavy Artillery arrived at the Hereditary Prince's Camp before Wesel, on the Evening of this Day: And it is said, that the two Swiss Regiments of Lochman and Planta, which were on their March to reinforce the Garrison of that Place, had been prevented in that Design. We have Letters from Prince Ferdinand's Army of the 3d Instant; but it don't appear, that any Thing material had then passed there.

An Account is received from Capt. Colby, of His Majesty's Ship the Thames, that on the 26th of last Month, fifty Leagues to the Westward of Tory Island, he took the Bien Aimée, a French Privateer Snow, belonging to Dunkirk, of 160 Tons, 12 nine Pounder Guns, 14 Swivels, and 112 Men, after a Chace of Eleven Hours.
