A PROCLAMATION,

For the Encouragement of Piety and Virtue, and for Preventing and Punishing of Vice, Profaneness, and Immorality.

GEORGE R.

WE most Seriously and Religiously considering, that it is an indispenfible Duty on Us to be careful, above all other Things, to prelerve and advance the Honour and Service of Almighty God, and to discourage and fupprefs all Vice, Profaneness, Debauchery, and Immorality, which are fo highly difpleafing to God, fo great a Reproach to Our Religion and Government, and (by Means of the frequent ill Examples of the PraCtices thereof) have fo fatal a Tendency to the Corruption of many of Our loving Subjects, otherwife Religioufly and Virtuoufly difpofed, and which (if not timely remedied) may juftly draw down the Divine Vengeance on Us and Our Kingdoms: We alfo humbly acknowledging, that We cannot expect the Bleffing and Goodnefs of Almighty God, (by whom Kings reign, and on which We entirely rely) to make Our Reign happy and prosperous to Our Self and Our People, without a Religious Obfervance of God's Holy Laws: To the Intent therefore that Religion, Piety, and good Manners may (according to Our moft hearty Defire) flourish and increafe under Our Administration and Government, We have thought fit, by the Advice of Our Privy Council, to iflue this Our Royal Proclamation, and do hereby declare Our Royal Purpose and Refolution to difcountenance and punifh all Manner of Vice, Profaneness, and Immorality, in all Perfons of whatsoever Degree or Quality, within this Our Realm, and particularly in fuch as are employed near Our Royal Perfon; and that for the Encouragement of Religion and Morality, We will, upon all Occafions, diftinguifh Perfons of Piety and Virtue, by Marks of Our Royal Favour. And We do expect and require, that all Perfons of Honour, or in Place of Authority, will give good Example by their own Virtue and Piety, and to their utmoft contribute to the Difcountenancing Perfons of difolute and debauched Lives, that they, being reduced by that Means to Shame and Contempt, for their loofe and evil Actions and Behaviour, may be thereby alfo enforced the fooner to reform their ill Habits and PraCtices, and that the vifible Difpleafure of Good Men towards them may, (as far as it is poffible) fupply what the Laws (probably) cannot altogether prevent. And We do hereby ftrictly enjoyn and prohibit, all Our loving Subjects, of what Degree or Quality foever, from playing on the Lord's Day at Dice, Cards, or any other Game whatsoever, either in Public or Private Houfes, or other Place or Places whatsoever; and We do hereby require and command them, and every of them, decently and reverently to attend the Worfhip of God on every Lord's Day, on Pain of Our higheft Difpleafure, and of being proceeded againft with the utmoft Rigour that may be by Law. And for the more effectual reforming all fuch Perfons, who, by reason of their difolute Lives and Conversations, are a Scandal to Our Kingdom, Our further Pleafure is, and We do hereby ftrictly charge and command all Our

Judges, Mayors, Sheriffs, Juftices of the Peace, and all other Our Officers and Minifters, both Ecclefiaftical and Civil, and all other Our Subjects, whom it may concern, to be very vigilant and ftrict in the Difcovery, and the effectual Profecution and Punifhment of all Perfons, who fhall be guilty of exceffive Drinking, Blafphemy, Profane Swearing and Curfing, Lewdnefs, Prophanation of the Lord's Day, or other difolute, immoral, or diforderly PraCtices; and that they take Care alfo effectually to fupprefs all Public Gaming Houfes and Places, and other lewd and diforderly Houfes, and to put in Execution the Statute made in the Twenty-ninth Year of the Reign of the late King Charles the Second, intituled, "An Act for the better Obfervation of the Lord's Day, commonly called Sunday." And alfo an Act of Parliament made in the Ninth Year of the Reign of the late King William the Third, intituled, "An Act for the more effectual Suppreffing of Blafphemy and Profaneness;" and all other Laws now in Force for the Punifhing and Suppreffing any of the Vices aforefaid; and alfo to fupprefs and prevent all Gaming whatsoever in Public or Private Houfes on the Lord's Day; and likewife, that they take effectual Care to prevent all Perfons keeping Taverns, Chocolate-houfes, Coffee-houfes, or other Public Houfes whatsoever, from felling Wine, Chocolate, Coffee, Ale, Beer, or other Liquors, or receiving or permitting Guefts to be or remain in fuch their Houfes in the Time of Divine Service on the Lord's Day, as they will answer it to Almighty God, and upon Pain of Our higheft Difpleafure. And for the more effectual Proceeding herein, We do hereby direct and command all Our Judges of Affize, and Juftices of the Peace, to give ftrict Charges at their refpective Affizes and Seflions, for the due Profecution and Punifhment of all Perfons that fhall prefume to offend in any of the Kinds aforefaid; and alfo of all Perfons that, contrary to their Duty, fhall be remifs or negligent in putting the faid Laws in Execution; and that they do, at their refpective Affizes and Quarter Seflions of the Peace, caufe this Our Royal Proclamation to be publickly read in open Court immediately before the Charge is given. And We do hereby further charge and command every Minifter in his refpective Parifh-Church or Chapel to read, or caufe to be read, this Our Proclamation, at leaft four Times in every Year, immediately after Divine Service, and to incite and fir up their refpective Auditors to the PraCtice of Piety and Virtue, and the Avoiding of all Immorality and Profaneness. And to the End that all Vice and Debauchery may be prevented, and Religion and Virtue praCtised by all Officers, private Soldiers, Mariners, and others, who are employed in Our Service by Sea and Land, We do hereby ftrictly charge and command all Our Commanders and Officers whatsoever, that they do take Care to avoid all Profaneness, Debauchery, and other Immoralities, and that by their own good and virtuous Lives and Conversations, they do fet good Examples to all fuch as are under their Care and Authority; and likewife take Care of and infpect the Behaviour of all fuch as are under them; and punifh all thofe who fhall be guilty of any the Offences aforefaid, as they will be answerable for the ill Confequences of their Neglect herein.

The KING's most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS the Time limited by His late Majesty's Order in Council of the 25th of April last, for prohibiting the Exporting out of this Kingdom, or carrying Coastwise, Gunpowder, Salt Petre, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition, will expire upon the 29th Day of this Instant October—And whereas it is judged expedient for His Majesty's Service; and the Safety of this Kingdom, that the said Prohibition should be continued for some longer Time—His Majesty doth therefore, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby Order, Require, Prohibit and Command, That no Person or Persons whatsoever (except the Master General, Lieutenant General, or Principal Officers of the Ordnance for His Majesty's Service) do, at any Time during the Space of Six Months, to commence from the said 29th Day of this Instant October, presume to transport into any Parts out of this Kingdom, or carry Coastwise, any Gunpowder, Salt Petre, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition, or ship or lade any Gunpowder, Salt Petre, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition, on Board any Ship or Vessel, in order to transporting the same into any Parts beyond the Seas, or carrying the same Coastwise, without Leave or Permission in that Behalf first obtained from His Majesty, or His Privy Council, upon Pain of incurring and suffering the respective Forfeitures and Penalties inflicted by an Act passed in the Twenty Ninth Year of His late Majesty's Reign, entituled, "An Act to impower His Majesty to prohibit the Exportation of Salt Petre, and to enforce the Law for empowering His Majesty to prohibit the Exportation of Gunpowder, or any Sort of Arms and Ammunition; and also to impower His Majesty to restrain the carrying Coastwise of Salt Petre, Gunpowder, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition."—And the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, the Commissioners for Executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, the Master General of the Ordnance, and His Majesty's Secretary at War, are to give the necessary Directions herein, as to them may respectively appertain.

WE the Lord Mayor, Aldermen, and Commons, of the City of London, in Common Council assembled, humbly beg Leave to present to your Royal Highness our most respectful Compliments of Condoleance on the Death of our late most Gracious Sovereign; and at the same Time to congratulate your Royal Highness upon your Illustrious Son's most happy Accession to the Crown of these Realms, amidst the joyful Acclamations of his faithful Subjects.

To your Royal Highness's wife and tender Care of His Majesty's early Years, we stand indebted for the Cultivation of the innate Virtues of his princely Mind, and for the Foundation of all those Blessings which we trust to enjoy under his auspicious Reign.

Long may your Royal Highness taste the maternal Satisfaction of seeing the Royal Object of your Affection and Solitude; the Darling of this his native Country, the Protector of our Trade, the

Defender of our Religion, Laws and Liberties, and the Ornament and Delight of human Kind.

To which her Royal Highness was pleased to return the following Answer.

My Lord and Gentlemen,

I Return you my hearty Thanks for this fresh Mark of your Attention to me. My warmest Wishes have ever attended this great City; and the Joy and Happiness of my Life will consist in the King my Son exceeding in every Thing your most sanguine Expectations.

They all had the Honour to kiss her Royal Highness's Hand.

The following Act was passed in the Parliament of Ireland in the First Year of His late Majesty's Reign, Viz.

An Act to continue the Parliament for the Time being on the Demise of His present most gracious Majesty, or on any of His Heirs or Successors, for the Term of Six Months from the Day of the said Demise; And likewise to prevent the Publick Funds from expiring during the said Term.

FOR the better Security of the Protestant Interest in this Kingdom of Ireland, and of the Succession to the Crown of Great Britain and Ireland, in the Protestant Line; Be it Enacted by the King's most Excellent Majesty, by and with the Advice and Consent of the Lords Spiritual and Temporal, and Commons in this present Parliament assembled, and by the Authority of the same, That this present Parliament, or any other Parliament which shall hereafter be summoned and called by His present Majesty, His Heirs or Successors, shall not be determined or dissolved by the Death or Demise of His said Majesty, His Heirs or Successors; but such Parliament shall and is hereby Enacted to continue, and is hereby impowered and required, if sitting at the Time of such Demise, immediately to proceed to act, notwithstanding such Death or Demise, for and during the Time of Six Calendar Months and no longer, unless the same shall be sooner prorogued or dissolved by such Person to whom the Crown of Great Britain and Ireland shall descend, remain, and be, according to the several Acts made in Great Britain for limiting and settling the Succession thereof in the Protestant Line: And if the said Parliament shall be so prorogued, then it shall meet and sit upon the Day unto which it shall be prorogued, and continue for the Residue of the same Time of Six Calendar Months, unless sooner prorogued or dissolved as aforesaid.

And be it further Enacted by the Authority aforesaid, That if there be a Parliament in Being at the Time of the Death of His Majesty, His Heirs or Successors, but the same happens to be separated by Adjournment, such Parliament shall immediately after such Demise, meet, convene, and sit, and shall act notwithstanding such Death or Demise, for and during the Time of Six Calendar Months and no longer, unless the same shall be sooner prorogued or dissolved as aforesaid.

And be it further Enacted by the Authority aforesaid, That if there be a Parliament in Being at the Time of the Death of His Majesty, His Heirs or Successors, but the same happens to be separated by Prorogation, such Parliament may, notwithstanding such Death or Demise, meet and convene at such Time within the said Six Calendar Months, and at such Place as the Person to whom the Crown of Great Britain and Ireland shall descend, remain, and be as aforesaid, shall appoint by Proclamation, and may act during the Residue of the said Six Calendar Months, next after such Death or Demise, and no longer, unless the same be sooner prorogued or dissolved as aforesaid.

And be it further Enacted by the Authority aforesaid, That in Case there is no Parliament in Being at the Time of such Death, or Demise, that has met, and sat, then the last preceding Parliament may convene and sit at such Time, within Six Calendar Months, and at such Place as the Person to whom the Crown of Great Britain and Ireland shall descend, remain, and be as aforesaid, shall

shall appoint by Proclamation, and shall be a Parliament, to continue as aforesaid, to all Intents and Purposes, as if the same Parliament had never been dissolved; subject nevertheless to be prorogued and dissolved as aforesaid. Provided always, and it is hereby declared, that nothing in this Act contained, shall extend, or be construed to extend, to alter or abridge the Power of the King, His Heirs, or Successors, to prorogue, or dissolve Parliaments.

And whereas it may happen that the Act or Acts for granting an Aid or Aids to His Majesty, by the several Rates, Duties, and Impositions therein mentioned, or which hereafter shall be made for granting an Aid or Aids to His Majesty, His Heirs, or Successors, by any Rates, Duties, or Impositions whatsoever, may, at the Time of the Death or Demise of His Majesty, or of His Heirs or Successors, be expired, or near expiring, so as His Majesty's loyal Subjects of this His Kingdom of Ireland, in case of any Exigency, may for want of such Funds be disabled from contributing to the Support of the Succession of the Crown of Great Britain and Ireland, in the Protestant Line, and the Defence of their Rights and Liberties; Be it enacted by the Authority aforesaid, that if any Act or Acts for granting any Aid or Aids to His Majesty, or to any of His Heirs or Successors, or any Rates, Duties, or Impositions thereby granted or imposed, shall expire within Six Months after such Death or Demise, that the same Rates, Duties, and Impositions, as by such Act or Acts were granted or imposed, shall be and continue, and shall be levied, collected, and paid for the Space of Six Calendar Months, from the Time of such Death or Demise, in such Manner and Form, and according to such Rules and Directions, as are or shall be appointed by such Act or Acts, for levying, collecting, and paying the same, during the Time for which they are, and shall be severally granted by such Act or Acts, unless the same shall be altered by any Act of Parliament to be made within such Time of Six Months as aforesaid; and if such Act or Acts for granting any Aid or Aids to His Majesty, His Heirs or Successors, or any Rates, Duties, or Impositions thereby granted or imposed, shall expire at the Time of such Death or Demise of His Majesty, His Heirs or Successors, or within Two Calendar Months before such Death or Demise, that then, and in such Case, the same Rates, Duties, and Impositions, as by such Act or Acts were granted or imposed, shall be and continue, and shall be levied, collected, and paid as aforesaid, from the Time that the same did or should have expired, if this Act had not been made, until the End of the Six Calendar Months from such Death or Demise, unless the same shall be altered by any Act of Parliament, to be made within such Time of Six Months as aforesaid.
