A PROCLAMATION;

For the Encouragement of Piety and Virtue, and for Preventing and Punishing of Vice, Profaneness, and Immorality.

GEORGE R.

E most Seriously and Religiously confidering, that it is an indispensible Duty on Us to be careful, above all other Things, to preferve and advance the Honour and Service of Almighty God, and to discourage and suppress all Vice, Profanences, Debauchery, and Immorality, which are so highly displeasing to God, so great a Reproach to Our Religion and Government, and (by Means of the frequent ill Examples of the Practices thereof) have so fatal a Tendency to the Tractices interest, have so fatal a Tendency to the Corruption of many of Our loving Subjects, otherwise Religiously and Virtuously disposed, and which (if not timely remedied) may justly draw down the Divine Vengeance on Us and Our Kingdoms: We also have bleen and the New State acknowledging, that We cannot expect the Blesling and Goodness of Almighty God, (by whom Kings reign, and on which We entirely rely) to make Our Reign happy and proferous to Our Self and Our People, without a Religious Observance of God's Holy Laws: To the Intent therefore that Religion, Piety, and good Manners may (according to Our most hearty Desire) flourish and increase un der Our Administration and Government, We have thought fit, by the Advice of Our Privy Council, to iffue this Our Royal Proclamation, and do hereby declare Our Royal Purpose and Resolution to discountenance and punish all Manner of Vice, Prophaneness, and Immorality, in all Persons of whatfoever Degree or Quality, within this Our Realm, and particularly in fuch as are employed near Our Royal Person; and that for the Encourage-ment of Religion and Morality, We will, upon all Occasions, distinguish Persons of Piety and Virtue, by Marks of Our Royal Favour. And We do expect and require, that all Persons of Honour, or in Place of Authority, will give good Example by their own Virtue and Piety, and to their utmost contribute to the Discountenancing Persons of dissolute and debauched Lives, that they, being reduced by that Means to Shame and Contempt, for their loose and evil Actions and Behaviour, may be thereby also enforced the fooner to reform their ill Habits and Practices, and that the visible Displeasure of Good Men towards them may, (as far as it is possible) supply what the Laws (probably) cannot altogether prevent. And We do hereby strictly enjoyn and prohibit, all Our loving Subjects, of what Degree or Quality soever, from playing on the Lord's Day at Dice, Cards, or any other Game whatsoever, either in Public or Private Houses, or other Place or Places whatsoever; and We do hereby require and com-mand them, and every of them, decently and re-verently to attend the Worship of God on every Lord's Day, on Pain of Our highest Displeasure, and of being proceeded against with the utmost Rigour that may be by Law. Judges, Mayors, Sheriffs, Justices of the Peace, and all other Our Officers and Ministers, both Ecclesisaftical and Civil, and all other Our Subjects, whom it may concern, to be very vigilant and strict in the Discovery, and the effectual Prosecution and Punishment of all Persons, who shall be guilty of excessive Drinking, Blasphemy, Prophane Swearing and Cursing, Lewdness, Prophanation of the Lord's Day, or other dissolute, immoral, or disorderly Practices; and that they take Care also effectually to suppress all Public Gaming Houses and Places, and other lewd and disorderly Houses, and to put in Execution the Statute made in the Twenty-ninth Year of the Reign of the late King Charles the Second, intitled, An Act for the better Observation of the Lord's Day, commonly called Sunday." And also an "Day, commonly called Sunday:" And also an Act of Parliament made in the Ninth Year of the Reign of the late King William the Third, intitled, "An Act for the more effectual Suppressing of Blasphomy and Prophaneness;" and all other Laws now in Force for the Punishing and Suppressing any of the Vices aforesaid; and also to suppress and prevent all Gaming whatfoever in Public or Private Houses on the Lord's Day; and likewise, that they take essectional Care to prevent all Persons keeping Caverns, Chocolate houses, Coffee houses, or other Public Houses whatsoever, from selling Wine, Cho-colate, Cosee, Ale, Beer, or other Liquors, or recciving or permitting Guests to be or remain in fuch their Houses in the Time of Divine Service on the Lord's Day, as they will answer it to Almighty God, and upon Pain of Our highest Displeasure. And for the more effectual Proceeding herein, We do hereby direct and command all Our Judges of Affize, and Justices of the Peace, to give strict Charges at their respective Affizes and Sessions, for the due Profecution and Punishment of all Persons that shall presume to offend in any of the Kinds aforesaid; and also of all Persons that, contrary to their Duty, shall be remis or negligent in putting the said Laws in Execution; and that they do, at their respective Affizes and Quarter Sessions of the Peace, cause this Our Royal Proclamation to be publickly read in open Court immediately before the Charge is given. And We do hereby further charge and command every Minister in his respective Parish-Church or Chapel to read, or cause to be read, this Our Proclamation, at least four Times in every Year, immediately after Divine Service, and to incice and stir up their respective Auditors to the Practice of Piety and Virtue, and the Avoiding of all Immorality and Prophanenels. And to the End that all Vice and Debauchery may be prevented, and Religion and Virtue practifed by all Officers, private Soldiers, Mariners, and others, who are employed in Our Service by Sea and Land, We do hereby firicity charge and command all Our Commanders and Officers whatfoever, that they do take Care to avoid all Profaneness, Debauchery, and other Immoralities, and that by their own good and virtuous Lives and Conversations, they do set good Examples to all such as are under their Care and Authority; and likewise take Care of and inspect the Behaviour of all fuch as are under them, and punish all those who shall be guilty of any the Offences aforesaid, as they will be answerable for the ill Consequences of their Neglect herein.

The KING's most Excellent Majesty in Council.

7 HEREAS the Time limited by His late Majesty's Order in Council of the 25th of April last, for prohibiting the Exporting out of this Kingdom, or carrying Coastwife, Gunpowder, Salt Petre, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition, will expire upon the 29th Day of this Instant October-And whereas it is judged expedient for His Majesty's Service, and the Safety of this Kingdom, that the said Prohibition should be continued for some longer Time -His Majesty doth therefore, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby Order, Require, Prohibit and Command, That no Person or Persons whatsoever (except the Master General, Lieutenant General, or Principal Officers of the Ordnance for His Majesty's Service) do, at any Time during the Space of Six Months, to commence from the faid 29th Day of this Instant October, presume to transport into any Parts out of this Kingdom, or carry Coastwife, any Gunpowder, Salt Petre, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition. or ship or lade any Gunpowder, Salt Petre, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition, on Board any Ship or Vessel, in order to transporting the same into any Parts beyond the Seas, or carrying the fame Coaftwife, without Leave or Permission in that Behalf first obtained from His Majesty, or His Privy Council, upon Pain of incurring and suffering the respective Forfeitures and Penalties inflicted by an Act passed in the Twenty Ninth Year of His late Majesty's Reign, entituled, "An Act to impower His Majesty to pro-'" hibit the Exportation of Salt Petre, and to enforce the Law for impowering His Majesty to prohibit the Exportation of Gunpowder, or any Sort of 44 Arms and Ammunition; and also to impower His "Majefty to restrain the carrying Coastwife of Salt of Petre, Gunpowder, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition."—And the Lords Commissioners of His Ma jesty's Treasury, the Commissioners for Executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, the Master General of the Ordnance, and His Majesty's Secretary at War, are to give the necessary Directions herein, as 'to them may respectively appertain.

The following Act was passed in the Parliament of Ireland in the First Year of His late Majesty's Reign, Viz.

An Act to continue the Parliament for the Time being on the Demife of His prejent mest gracious Majesty, or on any of His Heirs or Succeffors, for the Term of Six Months from the Day of the Jaid Demijo; And like-wife to provent the Publick Funds from expiring du-

ring the faid Term. OR the better Security of the Protestant Interest OR the better Security of the Local in this Kingdom of Ireland, and of the Succession to the Crown of Great Britain and Ireland, in the Protestant Line; Be it Enacted by the King's most Excellent Majesty, by and with the Advice and Consent of the Lords Spiritual and Temporal, and Commons in this present Parliament assembled, and by the Authority of the same, That this present Parliament, or any other Parliament which shall hereafter be furnmoned and called by His prefent Majetty, His Heirs or Successors, shall not be determined or diffolved by the Death or Demise of His said Majesly, His Heirs or Successors; but such Parliament shall and is hereby Enacted to continue, and is hereby impowered and required, if fitting at the Time of such Demise, immediately to proceed to act, not withstanding such Death or Demise, for and during the Time of Six Calender Months and no longer, unless the same shall be sooner proregued or dissolved by such Person to whom the Crown of Great Britain. and Iroland shall descend, remain, and be, according to the feveral Acts made in Great Britain for limiting and fettling the Succession thereof in the Protestant Line : And if the faid Parliament shall be for prorogued, then it shall meet and fit upon the Day unto which it shall be prorogued, and continue for the Residue of the same Time of Six Calender Months, unless sooner prorogued or dissolved as aforesaid.

And be it further Enacted by the Authority aforefaid, That if there be a Parliament in Being at the Time of the Death of His Majesty, His Heirs or Successors, but the same happens to be separated by Adjournment, such Parliament shall immediately after fuch Demise, meet, convene, and sit, and shall act notwithstanding such Death or Demise, for and during the Time of Six Calender Months and no longer, unless the same shall be sooner prorogued or distolved as aforefaid.

And be it further Enacted by the Authority aforefaid, That if there be a Parliament in Being at the Time of the Death of His Majesty, His Heirs or Successors, but the same happens to be separated by Prorogation, such Parliament may, notwithstanding fuch Death or Demile, meet and convene at fuch Time within the faid Six Calender Months, and at fuch Place as the Person to whom the Crown of Great Britain and Ireland shall descend, remain, and be as aforefaid, shall appoint by Proclamation, and may act during the Residue of the said Six Calender Months, next after such Death or Demise, and no longer, unless the same be sooner prorogued or dissolved as aforesaid.

And be it further Enacted by the Authority aforesaid, That in Case there is no Parliament in Being at the Time of such Death, or Demise, that has met, and sat, then the last preceding Parliament may convene and sit at such Time, within Six Calendar Months, and at fuch illace as the Perform of Whom the Crown of Creat Britain and Indand thall descend, remain, and bears parorefold, and least a least of the final thall

And whereas it may happen that the Act or Acts for granting an Aid or Aids to his Majesty, by the several Rates, Duties, and Impositions therein mentioned, or which hereafter shall be made for granting an Aid or Aids to His Majesty, His Heirs, or Succesfors, by any Rates, Duties, or Impositions what-foever, may, at the Time of the Death or Demise of His Majesty, or of His Heirs or Successors, be expired, or near expiring, so as His Majesty's loyal Subjects of this His Kingdom of Ireland, in case of any Exigency, may for want of such Funds be difabled from contributing to the Support of the Succesfron of the Crown of Great Britain and Ireland, in the Protestant Line, and the Defence of their Rights and Liberties; Be it enacted by the Authority aforelaid, that if any Act or Acts for granting any Aid or Aids to His Majesty, or to any of His Heirs or Successors, or any Rates, Duties, or Impositions Mereby granted or imposed, shall expire within Six Months after such Death or Demise, that the same Rates, Duties, and Impositions, as by such Act or Acts were granted or imposed, shall be and continue, and shall be levied, collected, and paid for the Space of Six Calender Months, from the Time of fuch Death or Demise, in such Manner and Form, and according to such Rules and Directions, as are or shall be appointed by such Act or Acts, for levying, collecting, and paying the fame, during the Time for which they are, and shall be severally granted by such Act or Acts, unless the same shall be altered by any Act of Parliament to be made within fuch Time of Six Months as aforefuld; and if fuch Act or Acts for granting any Aid or Aids to His Majesty, His Heirs or Successors, or any Rates, Duties, or Impositions thereby Granted or Imposed, shall expire at the Time of such Death or Demise of His Majesty, His Heirs or Successors, or within Two Calender Monthe before fuch Death or Demife, that then, and in such Case, the same Rates, Duties, and Impositions, as by such Act or Acts were Granted or Imposed, shall be and continue, and shall be Levied, Collected, and paid as aforesaid, from the Time that the same did or should have expired, if this Act had not been made, until the End of the Six Calender Months from such Death or Demise, unless the same shall he altered by any Act of Parliament, to be made within such Time of Six Months as aforefaid.
