For the Interrment of His late most Excellent Majesty King GEORGE the Second of Blessed Memory, from the Prince's Chamber to Westminster Abbey, on Tuesday the 11th Day of November 1760.

THE Royal Body being convey'd from Kensington to the Prince's Chamber near the House of Peers the Night before the Funeral, is to continue there until the Time appointed for the Interrment, and then to be carried from the said Prince's Chamber to the Abbey of Westminster in Manner following, viz.

N. B. The Knights of the Garter, Thistle, and Bath, who walk in this Procession, are to wear the Collars of their respective Orders.

The Procession to be from the Prince's Chamber through the Old Palace Yard on Foot, to the great North Door of the Abby, and the Way to be railed in on both Sides, and Floored, Twenty Feet Wide, and to be covered with an Awning, with Black Bays on the Floor, and under the Awning, and the whole Way to the Abby, and in the Abby, to the Steps leading to King Henry the Seventh's Chappel, to be lined on each Side with the Foot Guards.

The Procession being entered the Church, are to pass along down to the End of the North Isle, and then cross to the South Isle, and from thence to the said Steps, and there to fall off on each Side, until the Judges, the Knights of the Bath, the Privy Councillors, the Peers, the Body, and Chief Mourner, &c. are placed in King Henry the VIIth's Chappel.

At the Entrance within the Church, the Dean and Prebendaries in their Copes, attended by the Choir, all having Wax Tapers in their Hands, are to receive the Royal Body, and are to fall into the Procession just before Clarenceux King of Arms, and so are to proceed singing into King Henry the VIIth's Chappel, where the Body is to be deposited on Tressels (the Crown and Cushion being laid at the Head) and the Canopy held over it by the Gentlemen of the Privy Chamber, while the Service, according to the Liturgy of the Church of England, is read by the Bishop of Rochester, Dean of Westminster, and the Chief Mourner and his Two Supporters are seated on Chairs placed for them at the Head of the Corps, and the Lords Assitants seated on Stools on each Side, and the Lords of the Bed-Chamber, &c. are seated, and the Peers and others take their Seats in the Stalls on each Side of the Choir.

When the Part of the Service before the Interrment is read, the Royal Corps is to be carried to the Vault, preceded by the Lord Chamberlain of the Household, the Chief Mourner, his Supporters and Assitants following, Garter going before them, and the White Staff Officers of His late Majesty's Household, and place themselves near the Vault.

The Royal Corps being interred, the Dean of Westminster is to go on with the Office of Burial; which ended, and an Anthem sung in the Choir, Garter King of Arms proclaims His late Majesty's Stile as followeth.

Thus it hath pleased Almighty GOD, to take out of this transitory Life unto His Divine Mercy, the late most High, most Mighty, and most Excellent Monarch, GEORGE the Second, by the Grace of GOD, King of Great Britain, France and Ireland, Defender of the Faith, and Sovereign of the most Noble Order of the Garter, Duke of Brunswick and Lunenburgh, Arch-Treasurer and Elector of the Holy Roman Empire.

Let us beseech Almighty GOD to bless and preserve with long Life, Health and Honour, and all worldly Happinets, the most High, most Mighty, and most Excellent Monarch, Our Sovereign Lord GEORGE the Third, now by the Grace of GOD, King of Great Britain, France and Ireland, Defender of the Faith, and Sovereign of the most Noble Order of the Garter, Duke of Brunswick and Lunenburgh, Arch-Treasurer and Elector of the Holy Roman Empire.

Hague, October 28. Our last Letters from the Country of Hesse, which are of the 25th Instant, bring no News of Consequence from thence. Prince Ferdinand remained in his Head Quarters at Ovelgunne, as Marshal Broglie did in his near Cassel: And his Serene Highness had reinforced the Troop, commanded by General Wangenheim; and Marshal Broglie those under the Prince of Saxony: Both which Corps are on the other Side of the Weser.

The Hereditary Prince of Brunswick has left Brunyenen, and marched on the 26th to Schernbeck, and on the 27th to Limbeck. In the mean While, the French Troops, under M. de Castries, continue on the Left Side of the Rhine, and the Garrison of Wesel is considerably reinforced.

The Russians, it is said, are on their March towards Posen, in order to take up their Winter Quarters there: And the Swedes have repassed the River Peenc.
