To the King's most Excellent Majesty.

*Most Gracious Sovereign,*

**W**E the Mayor and Burgeses of your Ancient Borough of Newtown in the Isle of Wight, humbly approach your Royal Presence to express our Loyalty and Attachment to your Sacred Person, and our Joy on your Accession to the Throne.

We cannot at the same Time but look back to those Hours of Anguish which affected every Heart upon the Loss of our late most excellent Sovereign, who had the peculiar Happiness to see his Glories increasing at the Decline of his Life, and nothing wanting to crown that virtuous System of Measures, which under his auspicious Influence had been concerted, but a safe and honourable Peace.

As your Majesty has been graciously pleased to declare from the Throne, That to promote, in every Thing, the Glory and Happiness of these Kingdoms, will be the Business of your Life; so our Hopes are, that the same wise Measures will be still pursued; and Peace, the great Object of them, in due Time attained.

May Heaven bless your Majesty's Life, thus gloriously employed, with Increase of Honour and Length of Days; and such a continued Series of Prosperity, as may make it memorable to future Ages.
