Whereas it has been humbly represented to the King, That, on Thursday, the 4th Day of December last past, in the Morning, a Threatening Letter, directed to the Reverend Mr. Brooke, of Over-Arely, in the County of Worcester, was found at the Door of the said Mr. Brooke's House, at Over-Areley, aforesaid, of which the following is an Extract, viz.

"If the Lord Lyttelton had sent the Devil among Us, We could not have a worse Enemy than We have of You. For, what Business had You to go to Stafford for a Levy, when it was to be a Turnpike Road, but to run the Parishioners to Charges: And if You do not turn up the Office to another Man next Spring, or behave better in it amongst the poor Labourers than You have done, — there will come a blue Plumb (that is, I suppose, a Bullet,) out of some Hedge between Arely and Churchill, and take Care that it does not lay hold of You; For it is a good Thing to destroy Our Enemy; For Somebody shall not pass that Way but a very little while longer, if He does not behave better than He has done. — All that You want is to have a Bowling-Green between Arely and Churchill, but You will never live to see it. The Parishioners are bound to curse the Time that You came into it; But hoping to hear of some ill End or other betiding You soon, take Notice of it, and not forget it."

His Majesty, for the better discovering and bringing to Justice, the Persons concerned in Writing the said Threatening Letter, and in laying it, or causing it to be laid, at the Door of the said Mr. Brooke's House, as aforesaid, is, hereby, pleased to promise His most gracious Pardon to any one of them, (except the Person principally concerned therein,) who shall discover his, or her, Accomplice, or

Accomplices, in the said Facts, so as one, or more, of them, may be apprehended and convicted thereof.
