Capt. Ogle, of His Majetry's Ship Aquilon, gives an Account, in his Letter of the 18th Insta-t, That he had taken and carried into Cork the Sainte Terese, a French Privatier, of 10 Carriage Guns, and 75 Men: Ana also another Privatier of smaller Force, called the Royal Cantabre.

Admiralty Office, January 30. Captain Angel, of His Majesty's Ship the Stag, gives an Account in his Letter of the 27th Instant, of his having taken and brought to Plymouth, a French Privatier Cutter, of 10 Guns and 70 Men, called le Comte de Valence, belonging to Boulogne. She had been out ten Days, and taken nothing but

a small Sloop belonging to Falmouth, which was ransomed. The Holtage was retaken in her.

Admiralty Office, January 30. Captain Elphinston, Commander of His Majesty's Ship the Richmond, of 32 Guns, and 220 Men, being on a Cruize upon the Coast of Flanders, received Intelligence the 23d Instant, of a French Frigate, which had the Day before taken and ransomed the Dorothy and Either, William Benson, Master. Capt. Elphinston immediately went in quest of her, and fell in with her about Eleven o'Clock the same Night. She bore down upon the Richmond for a short Time after being in Sight; but then sudfuddenly hauling her Wind, endeavoured to getaway. Capt. Elphinston pursued, and came up with her about Half past Ten o'Clock the next Morning, when

they began to engage, standing towards the Land; and at Half patt I welve, both Ships run ashore a Longfide of each other, still continuing the Engagemeat for a short Time, when the Enemy sled from their Quarters. The Richmond soon afterwards got their Quarters. The Richmond soon afterwards got on Float, and being drove by the I de a little to Leeward, the Enemy quitted their Ship, and escaped; but the Ship is entirely destroyed, The French Frigate was called the Felicité, and carried 32 Guns; was bound to Martinico, with a Cargo valued at 30,000 l. Sterling. Her Confort the Harmonie, another French Frigate, of the same Force and Value; was lost coming out of Dunkirk. Capt. Donell, Commander of the Felicité, was killed in the Engagement; and near 100 others of the Enemy were killed or wounded. The Richmond had only three Men killed, and 13 wounded.
