**T**HE following Address of the Nobility, Gentlemen, Clergy, and Freeholders of the County of Suffex, has been presented to His Majesty by Thomas Pelham and John Butler, Esqrs. their Representatives in Parliament, accompanied by the Dukes of Richmond and Newcastle; the Earl of Egremont; the Bishop of Chichester; the Lord Abergavenny; and several of the Principal Gentlemen of the said County; who had all the Honour to kiss His Majesty's Hand; being introduced by the Lord of His Majesty's Bed-Chamber in Waiting: Which Address His Majesty was pleased to receive very graciously.

To the King's most Excellent Majesty,

The humble Address of the Nobility, Gentlemen, Clergy, and Freeholders of the County of Suffex.

Most Gracious Sovereign,

**W**E your Majesty's ever dutiful and loyal Subjects, truly sensible of the many Blessings, which we enjoyed under the just and well-ordered Government of our late most gracious Sovereign, your Majesty's Royal Grandfather, beg Leave to offer this Tribute of our Sorrow, on the Occasion of His sudden and unexpected Death: And, at the same Time, to congratulate your Majesty on your Accession to the Throne, and to testify our Joy in having a King to rule over us, who is not only descended from the Blood of so illustrious an Ancestor, but who, from His earliest Age, has given the most convincing Testimonies of being the Inheritor of all His Royal Virtues.

From those Virtues, wisely exerted by your Royal Grandfather, resulted Consequences of the greatest Importance both to Himself and to His People: The Trade and Commerce of the latter were extended, His own Dominions were enlarged, and the Glory of the Kingdom was raised to a greater Height than had been known before, in any the most flourishing Times of the British Nation. And the Prospect of like Virtues in your Majesty's Royal Person, gives us the strongest Grounds to hope for a Continuance of the same Blessings under your Majesty's most auspicious Reign.

Your Majesty's most Gracious Declaration from the Throne has confirmed us in these our Hopes, and added to these Hopes a firm Confidence in your Concern for the Interest and Welfare of your Subjects. And your Majesty may be assured, that, with the greatest Cheerfulness, we shall hazard our Lives and Fortunes for the Support of that Prince, who makes it His Care to protect our Religion, our Laws, and our Liberties; Blessings, in the Opinion of Britons, of higher Estimation than even Life itself.

And happy from our Confidence in your Majesty's Affection, we shall zealously concur in the Promoting of those Measures which may tend to advance the Happiness of your Majesty; and shall never cease to pray, that you may long continue to reign over a dutiful and loyal People; and speedily obtain the wished-for Satisfaction, of seeing your Kingdoms in full Peace.
