Hague, February 13. The News of the Elector of Cologne's Death is confirmed from feveral Parts, and particularly from Munster. His Electoral Highness was feized, on the 6th Inftant, with a fudden Diforder at Ehrenbreistein, (where he was passing on his Road to Munich) and died that Night.

A fresh Invasion having been made by the Ruffians, under General Tottleben, into Pomerania, the Prince of Bevern has been appointed to command against them; and was affembling all the Force he could, in those Parts, to oppose them.

# Whiteball, February 21.

By Accounts, received this Day from Prince Ferdinand's Head Quarters at Uflar, dated the 8th In-flant, it appears, That the Army under his Serene Highnefs's Command was in Motion, and that he himfelf intended paffing the Wefer the next Day; after which the Troops would be all affembled, in order to march forward. We hear from Corvey, That the Detachment under Major General Howard, confifting of ten Battalions and twelve Squadrons, (of which Force there are only four British Regipaents) was expected to arrive at Gelecke, and in the Neighbourhood thereof, on the 4th Inflant, according to their Defination.

The Accounts from Uflar farther fay, That Operations are now carrying on towards the Upper Werra by General Sporcken, who will be affifted therein by a Corps of Pruffians, under the Command of General Sibourg, which is to be reinforced by three Battalions of Grenadiers, and five Squadrons, under Colonel Lolhoffel, and to advance towards Gotha and Eyfenach.

Whitehall, February 21. The King has been pleafed to confer the Honour of Knighthood on Thomas Thorrowgood, Efq; High Sheriff of the County of Suffolk.

Schomberg. House, February 17. This Day the Baron de Cramm, Envoy Extraordinary from the Duke of Brunswick, had his Audience of Leave of his Royal Highnels the Duke of Cumberland.

To which he was introduced by Sir Charles Cottrell Dormer, Knt. Master of the Ceremonies.

Admiralty Office, February 18. Capt. Johnstone, of His Majesty's Sloop the Hornet, gives an Account, by Letter dated at Lisbon the 29th of January, That he had taken and carried into that Port, a French Privatier called the Society of St. Malo's, of 6 Guns and 60 Men.
