WE your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Nobility, Gentry, Clergy, and Freeholders, of your County Palatine of Lancaster, beg Leave to lament with your Majesty the Death of your Royal Grandfather, our late Sovereign, whose mild and gracious Government, whose Attention to the Civil and Religious Rights, Liberties, and Privileges of His Subjects, are too deeply imprinted in our Minds ever to be forgotten. The Concern we feel on this melancholy Occasion, nothing could alleviate, but a firm Belief, that these Rights, Liberties, and Privileges, which we value above our Lives, will be preserved to us entire by your Majesty. In full Confidence of which, we congratulate your Majesty on your happy Accession to the Throne of these Kingdoms. And we do assure your Majesty, that nothing shall be wanting, on our Part, to maintain and support you on that Throne, where it has pleased Heaven to place you; and where, we hope, you will long reign a glorious and beloved Prince, over a free, a happy, and a grateful People.
