to leave My own Hereditary Revenues to fuch Dif position of Parliament, as might best conduce to the Utility and Satisfaction of the Publick, as for what more immediately concerns Myfelf.

In making My Acknowledgements for the large and extensive Supplies which you have granted Me this Seffion, I am at a Lofs whether most to applaud your Chearfulnels in giving, or your Wifdom in proportioning them to the extraordinary Occa-fions of the Publick, notwithstanding those uncommon Burthens, which I heartily regret. No Care shall be wanting, on my Part, to see them duly applied to the National Ends for which you intended them

My Lords, and Gentlemen,

The Expiration of this Parliament now drawing very near, I will forthwith give the necessary Orders for calling a new one. But I cannot take My Leave of you, without returning My Thanks for the many eminent Proofs you have given of your Fidelity and Affection to My Family and Government, and of your Zeal for this happy and excellent Conflitution.

During this Parliament, the Flame of War was kindled by the injurious Encroachments and Ufurpations of Our Enemies; and therefore it became just and necessary on Our Part. In the Profecution of it you have given fuch Support to My Royal Grandfather and Myfelf, and fuch Affistance to Our Allies, as have manifested your Publick-spirited Concern for the Honour of the Nation, and the Maintenance of it's undoubted Rights and Poffeffions, and been attended with glorious Succeffes, and great Acquisitions, in various Parts of the World; particu-larly the entire Reduction of Canada, a Conquest of the utmost Importance to the Security of Our Colonies in North America, and to the Extension of the Commerce and Navigation of My Subjects.

May God Almighty grant Continuance to thefe Succeffes! The Ufe which I propose to make of them is, to secure and promote the Welfare of my Kingdoms, and to carry on the War with Vigour, in order to procure to them the Bleffings of Peace, on fafe and honourable Conditions for Me and My Allies;

to which I have been always ready to hearken. Firm in these Resolutions, I do, with entire Con-fidence, rely on the good Dispositions of my faithful Subjects in the Choice of their Representatives ; and I make no Doubt but they will thereby demonstrate the Sincerity of those Affurances, which have been to cordially and univerfally given Me, in the loyal, affectionate, and unanimous Addresses of My People.

WHEREAS We have thought fit, by and with the Advice of Our Privy Council, to diffolve this present Parliament, which now stands prorogued to Tuefday the Seventh Day of April next. We do for that End publish this Our Royal Proclamation; and do hereby diffolve the faid Par-liament accordingly: And the Lords Spiritual and Temporal, and the Knights, Citizens, and Burgeffes, and the Commiffioners for Shires and Burghs of the House of Commons, are discharged from their Meeting and Attendance on Tuesday the said Seventh Day of April next. And We being defirous and refolved, as foon as may be, to meet Our People, and have their Advice in Parliament, do hereby make known to all Our loving Subjects our Royal Will and Pleasure to call a new Parliament; and do hereby further declare, That, with the Advice of Our Privy Council, We have this Day given Order to Our Chancellor of Great Britain, to iffue out Writs in due Form, for calling a new Parliament ; which Writs are to bear Tefte on Saturday the Twenty-first Day of this Instant March, and to be returnable on Tuesday the Nineteenth Day of May next.

PROCLAMATION. А In Order to the Electing and Summoning the Sixteen Peers of Scotland.

GEORGE R.

HEREAS We have in Our Council thought fit to declare Our Pleasure for fummoning and holding a Parliament of Great Britain, on Tuesday the Nineteenth Day of May next enfuing the Date hereof: In order therefore to the electing and fummoning the Sixteen Peers of Scotland, who are to fit in the Houfe of Peers in the faid Parliament; We do, by the Advice of Our Privy Council, islue forth this Our Royal Proclamation, strictly charging and commanding all the Peers of Scotland to assemble and meet at Holy Rood House in Edinburgh, on Tuesday the Fifth Day of May next enfuing, between the Hours of Twelve and Two in the Afternoon, to nominate and choofe the Sixteen Peers to fit and vote in the Houle of Peers in the faid enfuing Parliament, by open Election and Plurality of Voices of the Peers that thall be then prefent, and of the Proxies of fuch as shall be abfent (fuch Proxies being Peers) and producing a Mandate in Writing, duly figned before Witneffes, and both the Conflituent and Proxy being qualified according to Law. And the Lord Clerk Register, or such Two of the Principal Clerks of the Session, as shall be appointed by him to officiate in his Mame, are hereby respectively required to attend such Meeting, and to administer the Oaths required by Law to be taken there by the faid Peers, and to take their Votes; and immediately after fuch Election made, and duly examined, to certify the Names of the Sixteen Peers fo elected, and fign and attest the fame, in the Prefence of the faid Peers the Electors, and return fuch Certificate into Our High Court of Chancery of Great Britain. And We do, by this Our Proclamation, strictly command and require the Provost of Edinburgh, and all other the Magistrates of the faid City, to take especial Care to preferve the Peace thereof, during the Time of the faid Election; and to prevent all Manner of Riote, Tumults, Dif-orders, and Violence what loever. And we firstly charge and command, That this Our Royal Proclamation be duly published at the Market Crofs at Edinburgh, and in all the County Towns of Scotland, Twenty five Days at least before the Time hereby
