Stockholme, June 30. He Letters from Holland bringing an account of a War having been declared there against this Crown, his Majesty assembled the Senate, to confult what meafures to take, where it was refolved, that his Majesty thould make War against the States General, both by Land and Sea; in order whereunto, the Fleet is making ready with all the diligence possible, and several Privateers are fitting out, by the Nobility, and others, for the annoying the Dutch Trade. The Goods and Effects of the Dutch Merchants here, have been likewise seized, as likewise all Debts owing by the Subjects of this Crown to the Dutch, by which means, it is thought, the King will raise a sum of Two hundred thousand pound fert. though even, the Suedish Merchants will in some part suffer thereby. It hath also been intimated to the Dutch Refident nere, that the King defires he will forbear coming to Court, or making any Addresses to his Minilters for the future. In the mean time the preparations still continue for the solemnizing the Kings Marrie age with the Princels of Denmark, as likewise for the Kings Coronation, and the affembling the States of the Kingdom in order thereunto.

On Thursday last returned hicher the Count of Windi fgrais, having been fent to the Dukes of Lunenbungh, Hanouer, &c. And its faid, that from this latter, he brings great affurances of friendship and good correspondence. Strasburgh July 19. The Armies continue, as formerly, without that any thing confiderable paffes between them; the Parties have indeed frequent rencounters; and, we are told, that the 17 instant, the Count of Caprari, who was sent out with a Body of Horse towards offenburg, defeated 1000 French Honse, willed near 200, and took feveral Prisoners. The French that are on this fide the Rhine, continue to foreify themselves; and nothing is omitted on their part, to hinder the communication between this City, and the Imperial Army. We hear nothing farther of the Marelia chal de Crequi, and the general opinion is, that he remains with the Forces under his command about Metra to observe the motions of the Lorrain and Lunenburg Treope, who are coming that way.

Francfort; July 21. The Letters we receive from the Imperial Army all agree, that the French are ting mean want of Forage, and that their Horses are spreed to feed on leaves of Trees, but on the other side seem to. own, they themselves have some scarcity of Provisions. They add, that General sporke is, leaving the Army, and upon retiring to his Estate in Bohemiu; and that the Prince of Lorrain commands the Right Wing of the Imperial Cavalry. Yesterday the Baron d'Orfbee, Coadjutor of Treves, and Nephew to that Elector, was elected Bishop of Spire, to the great satisfaction of the Imperialits, who have so well made use of their interells, as to be able, within this, little while, to advance to the Bishopick of Wurtsbu g, the Electorate of Mayence, and the Bish prick of spire, Persons most acceptable to the Emperor.

Cologne, July 23. The Troops of the Dukes of Zell and Ofnabrugh advance but flowly, yesterday they had their quuters near Opdal, above Bonne, about seven Leagues from hence ; and it is fald, that this morning part of them have decamped, and continue their march towards the Mefelle, whither the rest will follow to morrow; the 3000 Monasterians who are to join them, are arrived this day at Mulheim, and to morrow they will pass the Rhine here: the Duke of Lorrain is advanced with his Forces as far as Cruetquach, having paffed the Moselle at Coblents. Our Army having, as we told you in our last, marched Sunday, Munday and Tuesday, as at present encamped in the Neighborhood of Hall, near which place it passed the Senne on Wednesday; but the day following, viz. on Thursday had a hot alfarm occasioned by the advance of the French Army under the command of the Prince of Conde, which was afterwards confirmed by the Foragers, who were beaten he me, except those that were taken Prisoners & our advices from other hands likewise assure us, that the Prince of Conde, upon the account he received of the motion of our Army, immediately decamped with his, and taking very great journeys, was yesterday encamped at Lens and the Abby of Crambron, about four Leagues from Hall, baving reinforced the Garison of seeb with 3.00 Men; hereupon the Prince of Orang hith given orders for the doubling the out-guards of his Army, and that the Forngers shall keep nearer home than before, while in the mean time, we continue in great expectation of some Action, seeing the Armies are so near each other. Six bundred Wagons have been provided at Ghent, with all forts of necessaries for a Siege, which will hardly be un-dertaken as the Armies now lie. The Advices we have from Lorrain, say, That the Mareschal de Crequi is with a Body of 10 or 12000 Men about Meiz, the Marquis de Racheforz being his Lieutenant-General; That his orders are to have an eye upon the Lorrain, Exemburgh and Ofnebrugh Troops which advance towards the Mosetle, though very flowly, and to keep them from attempting any thing on that fide; or otherwise to go and join Wonsieur de Turenne, according as his Majessies ser vice shall require.

Antworp, July 27. Our Army under the command of the Prince of Orange hath lain these two or three dayes encamped near Hall, where it on Wednesday passed the River Senze, and took its quarters on the other fide very much at large, but hath fince been forced to contract them, by reason of the approach of the French Army under the command of the Prince of Conse to Len. We are told, that the Prince made fo much halfe in his march thather from his quarters near Peruez, that the whole Army marched one day eight Leagues. People make great complaints here where the Dutch Soldiers live very diforderly, and have committed feveral; violences, notwithstanding his Highness has issued very firid orders for the restraining them. We have Letters from Sigily which speak of the French having been forcedito quit the Siege of Melazio. Our Letters, from straiburg amongst other things say, that the Magistrates of that City had prohibited the selling of all Arms and Ammunition to the French.

Hague, July 27. Our Lerens from Stockholms give us account. That our Merchants there are proceeded against with much severity, their Goods and Effects seizen, and their Persons secured. This day Lieutenant
