**T**HE following Declaration, in the Name, and on the Part of Her Majesty the Empress Apostolick Queen of Hungary and Bohemia, was made and signed at Paris the 26th of March 1761, by Her Minister at that Court, the Count of Starhemberg, and was delivered at London the 31st of March, by Prince Galitzin, Envoy Extraordinary from the Empress of all the Russias.

*DECLARATION de Sa Majesté l'Imperatrice Reine Apostolique d'Hongrie et de Boheme.*

**L**ES Dispositions à la Paix, très conformes aux Sentimens de toutes les Parties belligerantes, que les Rois d'Angleterre et de Prusse ont marquées l'Année passée, ayant éprouvé des Difficultés qui en ont éloigné le Succès; Les Cours de Vienne, de Petersbourg, de France, de Stockholm, et de Varsovie, sont convenus unanimement d'inviter celles de Londres et de Berlin à renouer une Negociation aussi salutaire au Bonheur du Monde, et qui doit intéresser l'Humanité de toutes les Puissances qui se trouvent en Guerre.

Dans cette vue, et afin que l'on puisse proceder au retablissement de la Paix, Elles proposent l'Assemblée d'un Congrès, auquel elles croient qu'il conviendrait de n'admettre, avec les Plenipotentiaires des Parties Principales belligerantes, que ceux de leurs Alliés. Si les Rois d'Angleterre et de Prusse adoptent ce Moyen, l'Emperatrice Reine, l'Emperatrice de Toutes les Russies, le Roi Très Chrétien, le Roi de Suède, et le Roi de Pologne Electeur de Saxe, proposent la Ville d'Augsbourg pour le lieu du Congrès, en observant que Leurs Majestés n'indiquent Augsbourg, que comme une Ville à Portée de toutes les Parties intéressées, qui paroît remplir, par son Emplacement, la Convenance de tous les Etats; et qu'elles ne se refuseront pas au Choix d'une autre Ville de l'Allemagne, si Leurs Majestés Britannique et Prussienne la jugent plus convenable.

L'Imperatrice Reine, l'Imperatrice de toutes les Russies, le Roi Très Chrétien, et les Rois de Suède et de Pologne, déclarent en outre, qu'ils ont choisi les Plenipotentiaires qui seront chargés de leurs Intérêts au Congrès, dans l'Espérance que le Roi d'Angleterre, le Roi de Prusse, et leurs Alliés, pour ne pas différer la Negociation, feront promptement, de leur Côté, le Choix de leurs Ministres respectifs.

La Simplicité de cette Declaration, que, pour le Bien general, les Cours de Vienne, de Petersbourg, de France, de Stockholm et de Varsovie, se sont déterminées à faire aux Cours de Londres et de Berlin, leur fait esperer, que leurs Majestés Britannique et Prussienne voudront bien notifier, par une Reponse prompte, leurs Sentimens sur un Objet aussi essentiel au Repos et au Bonheur de l'Europe.

## TRANSLATION.

*DECLARATION of Her Majesty the Empress Apostolick Queen of Hungary and Bohemia.*

**T**HE Dispositions for Peace, very agreeable to the Sentiments of all the Parties engaged in the War, which the Kings of England and Prussia shewed last Year, having met with Difficulties, which have prevented their Success, the Courts of Vienna, Petersbourg, France, Stockholm, and Warfaw, are unanimously agreed to invite those of London and Berlin to resume a Negotiation so salutary for the Happiness of the World, and which must interest the Humanity of all the Powers at War.

In this View, and in order to their being able to proceed to the Re-establishment of Peace, they propose the assembling of a Congress, to which they think it may be proper to admit only the Plenipotentiaries of the principal Belligerent Parties, with those of their Allies. If the Kings of England and Prussia adopt this Method, her Majesty the Empress Queen, the Empress of Russia, the most Christian King, the King of Sweden, and the King of Poland Elector of Saxony, propose the City of Augsbourg for the Place of the Congress, observing, that their Majesties point out Augsbourg no otherwise, than as a Town within Distance of all the Parties concerned, which, from its Situation, appears to suit with the Convenience of all the States; and that they will not reject the Choice of another City in Germany, if their Britannick and Prussian Majesties may deem it more convenient.

The Empress Queen, the Empress of Russia, the most Christian King, the King of Sweden, and the King of Poland Elector of Saxony, declare, moreover, that they have chosen the Plenipotentiaries, who will be intrusted with the Care of their Interests at the Congress, in hopes that the King of England, the King of Prussia, and their Allies, will, on their Part, speedily make Choice of their respective Ministers, that the Negotiation may not be deferred.

The Simplicity of this Declaration, which, for the general Welfare, the Courts of Vienna, Petersbourg, France, Stockholm, and Warfaw, have determined to make to the Courts of London and Berlin, gives them hopes, that their Britannick and Prussian Majesties will be pleased, by a speedy Answer, to make their Sentiments known, upon an Object so essential to the Repose and Happiness of Europe.

**T**HE following Counter-Declaration was signed at London the 3d of April Instant, and was delivered on the same Day to Prince Galitzin, Envoy Extraordinary from the Empress of all the Russias, to be transmitted by him to Paris.

**L**ES Dispositions de leurs Majestés Britannique et Prussienne, pour le Retablissement de la Tranquillité Generale de l'Europe, ayant été fermes et sincères, Elles n'ont pu éprouver aucun changement par le Cours du Temps, qui s'est écoulé depuis leur Declaration du 25 Novembre, 1759.

Leurs Majestés acceptent, donc, avec Satisfaction, l'Offre de l'Assemblée d'un Congrès dans la Ville d'Augsbourg, renfermée dans les Cinq Declarations faites à Paris le 26 de Mars dernier, et remises à Londres le 31 du même Mois, au Nom et de la Part de leurs Majestés l'Imperatrice Reine, l'Imperatrice de toutes les Russies, le Roy Très Chrétien, le Roy de Suède, et le Roy de Pologne, Electeur de Saxe.

Les Cours de Londres et de Berlin acquiescent également à la Clause de cette Declaration, qui concerne la Regle, qu'on propose d'établir, par rapport à l'Admission des Plenipotentiaires, qui auront Droit d'être reçus à ce Congrès.

Au reste, comme leur Zèle pour l'Avancement de l'Ouvrage salutaire d'une Pacification Generale, correspond parfaitement à celui qui paroît animer les Cours de Vienne, de Petersbourg, de Versailles, de Stockholm et de Varsovie, Leurs Majestés Britannique et Prussienne ne tarderont pas de nommer incessamment leurs Plenipotentiaires, étant disposées de concourir, d'un Pas commun et égal, à tout ce qui pourra accélérer l'Ouverture de Congrès qui vient de leur être offert.

#### **TRANSLATION.**

##### *Counter-Declaration.*

**T**HE Dispositions of Their Britannick and Prussian Majesties for the Re-establishment of the General Tranquility of Europe, having been steady and sincere, could not have undergone any Alteration through the Space of Time, which has elapsed since their Declaration of the 25th of November, 1759.

Their Majesties therefore, with Satisfaction, accept the Offer of the Assembling of a Congress at Augsbourg, contained in the Five Declarations made at Paris the 26th of March last, and delivered at London the 31st of the same Month, in the Name and on the Part of their Majesties, The Empress Queen, The Empress of all the Russias, The Most Christian King, The King of Sweden, and The King of Poland, Elector of Saxony.

The Courts of London and Berlin equally acquiesce in the Clause of this Declaration, which relates to the Rule, that is proposed to be laid down, in regard to the Admission of the Plenipotentiaires, who shall have a Right to be received at this Congress.

For the Rest, as their Zeal for the Advancement of the Salutary Work of a General Pacification, perfectly corresponds with that which appears to animate the Courts of Vienna, Petersbourg, Versailles, Stockholm, and Warsaw, Their Britannick and Prussian Majesties will not delay to name incessantly Their Plenipotentiaires, being disposed to concur, with one and the same Pace, in every Thing that may accelerate the Opening of the Congress, which has been offered to them.

**W**E your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Mayor, Capital Burgesses, and Freeman, of the ancient Borough of Camelford, condole with your Majesty on the Death of your Royal Grandfather, our late most gracious Sovereign.

We congratulate your Majesty upon your Accession to the Crown of these Realms; rejoicing to have seen the Day, when a British-born Prince of the House of Hanover, ascended the Throne of His Ancestors in that Illustrious Line. Your Majesty's Succession, by gathering and uniting the Sentiments of all your Subjects, hath compleated the Solidity of that happy Establishment, by which the Liberties of Great Britain were secured, and the Circumstance of your Majesty's Birth among us cannot but endear your Moral and Princely Qualities to the Hearts of your People, warming their Loyalty and Esteem into an affectionate Zeal for your Person and Government. The Opening of your Majesty's Reign hath produced such substantial Instances of a disinterested Dignity truly Royal, and of patriotic Attention to amend any Defects which the Care of former Times might have overlooked in the Frame of our Constitution, as fully justify the Prepossessions of your Subjects in your Majesty's Favour, and confirm the pleasing Expectations they had formed of every political Felicity under your upright and wise Government. And though the Conduct of publick Affairs hath fallen, in an arduous and critical Conjunction, upon your Majesty's early Age; yet, far from being discouraged by the Consideration of your Majesty's Youth, we derive from thence a new Satisfaction, in the humble Hope, that Providence will graciously vouchsafe the more lasting Duration to the Exercise of your Royal Virtues, and prolong the Blessings of your Reign to our Posterity in a very remote Period of Time.

*Lisbon, April 2.* On Tuesday last, the 31st past, about Twelve o' Clock at Noon, this City was alarmed with a Shock of an Earthquake, which lasted 4 or 5 Minutes. The Motion was horizontal, and pretty strong, but has done no other Damage than the throwing down some old Walls: This is by far the longest that has been felt since the 1st of November 1755, though not to be compared, either in Strength or Duration, to the first that happened that Day. There have been several small Shocks since. Their most Faithful Majesties, and the rest of the Royal Family, are in perfect Health. All the British Subjects are safe and well, and their Houses very little damaged. The Inhabitants, who were at first put into great Consternation, very soon recovered themselves, and Business immediately went on as usual.

*Hague, April 21.* We hear that the Troops of his Prussian Majesty have gained another Advantage over Part of the Army of the Empire. On the 6th Instant, a Detachment of the former attacked the Corps under General Gunco near Plauen in the Voigtland, took 1 Colonel, 8 other Officers, with about 150 Men, and 4 Pieces of Cannon, and all their Baggage. The Prussians lost on this Occasion, only Major Hunt of Zietzen's Hussars, a Lieutenant, and 30 Men.

*Schomberg House, April 21.*

This Day Baron Wittorff, Envoy Extraordinary from the Landgrave of Hesse Cassel, had his Audience of Leave of his Royal Highness the Duke of Cumberland.

*Admiralty Office, April 25.*

His Majesty's Ship the Blonde, commanded by Capt. Kennedy, on the 20th past, fell in with a French Privateer, of 12 Carriage Guns and 116 Men, in the Latitude of 42° 30' North, about 60 Leagues to the Westward of Cape Finisterre, and took her after a Chace of about six Hours.
