Most Gracious Sovereign.

WE your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects, the President and Council of your Majesty's Island of Nevis, most humbly pray to be permitted to express our deepest Sorrow and hearty Condoleance for the Loss of his late Majesty, our most gracious King and Father of his People, of blessed and glorious Memory: And at the same Time to assure your Majesty, that nothing could so truly and effectually alleviate our unfeigned Grief, as your Majesty's happy Accession to the Crown and Dignity of your Royal and renowned Ancestors; and although we are so far remote from your Majesty's native Country, and Seat of Government, yet being a Part of your Majesty's Dominions, we most humbly hope, from a constant, zealous, and loyal Deportment, as faithful and affectionate Subjects, to partake of the benign Influence of your Majesty's auspicious Reign.

We pray God to bless your Majesty with Health, long Life, and Success to your Majesty's Arms.

Most Gracious Sovereign,

WE your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects, the High Sheriff, Nobility, Gentry and Clergy of the County of Longford in the Kingdom of Ireland, most humbly intreat your Majesty to accept our Congratulations upon your Accession to the Throne of your Ancestors, and to pay our just Tribute of Sorrow for the Decease of your Royal Grandfather, our much honoured and much loved King, whose Memory will be held in Reverence as long as just and equal Government, and a constant uniform Care of the Laws and Liberties of the Subject, can endear a Sovereign to his People.

Hague, April 26. By the Letters from Wesel, an Account has been received here, that on Monday last, the 21st Instant, a large Magazine of Hay, which the French had collected at that Place, had taken Fire, and that there were consumed Twelve Hundred and Fifty Thousand Rations. The Loss is computed at Two Millions of Livres. Thirty-three Soldiers of the Regiment of Normandy perished in the Flames. And the Number of Boats burnt and sunk, is said to amount to Sixty. When the Post left Wesel on the 21st, the Danger was not thought to be quite over; and it was feared that the Flames would reach another Magazine above the Town.
