Berwick, October 28.

Light Swedes ship bound for Scotland, was on Monday last forc'd through ignorance or mittake of her Pilot, to put to shoare at the Spittle, on the Southfide of our River, and on Friday last a Vessel belonging to the Sheelds, coming for this

Port, was by the tempestuous weather cast away.

Portsmouth, Novemb. 1. Yesterday arrived here two Swedes ships laden with Deales for a Market, one of them oft Newgastle was haled by 18 Datch Men of Warr, and the next day by three or four Privateers, who difinist him The other meeting with a French Privateer without injury. off from Dover belonging to Calice, carrying English Colors, was by them plundred with all the company in his ship, of all their Clearns and Provisions : but meeting afterwards with the Swallow Ketch, who had been crufing upon the Coasts of France, was by him relieved with what he wanted, and conducted to this Port. The Caprain of the Swallow in Crusing, discovered 18 soil as he supposed of French thips, others in his company believe rather Durch Merchants ontward baund, fome of them great thips passing Westward, haling close along the French Aware.

Norwich, October 31. Oir Bill of Mortality for this last week runs thus, buried of all Diseases 67. whereof of

the Plague 58.

Malaga, Ottob. 5. This morning arrived at this Port five Genouz ships, with two Men of War their Convoyers, bound for Cales: The Merchants are richly laden with Silks, and other things of great value, which are to be put aboard the Gallions intended for the Indies. The Armado of Spain is returned to Cales, where they have fet on shoar above 1000 of their men, difebled from prefent fervice by fickness.

Seville, Offob. 12. Our Armado, as is given out, intend speedily to return again to Sea, to wait for the arrival of the Persuguesse Pleet from Brazil; they intend to go out in two Budies, whereof twelve are to lie about the Streights, and ten upon the Coalls of Portugal: But 'dis believed by others, that they are not in a condition to go out again this year.

The Marquess de Caracena has lately made an inroad into some part of Portugal, but the loss he has sustained both in his Men and Horse through want of water, is thought to be much more confiderable than the Booty they returned with.

The Duke de Medina Cali is with 300 Stulliers, and all his Domesticks, gone from Puebla to Ayamonte.

The Gillions, though much forwarded by the Court,

will scarcely be ready to fail till the end of November.

Disso, Octob. 21. Five Spanish Vellels riding on the Chafts of Portugal, have by the villence of fform been broken in pieces about the mouth of the Taze, many of the men cast away with the Vessels, and those that escapec, made Prinners by the Pertugais.

Copenhagen, O. 90b. 15. On the Ninth instant, was the P.ince Elector of Saxony's marriage confummated here with freat pomp and folemnity, the whole Night spent in Divertilements, and Expressions of joy, all the Guns of the Town discharged. The P ince Elector, a Man of War so called, that lies before this Town, making many handred thors.

Vienna, OSob. 18. The Baffa of Offen hath fent hither Everal persons with 30 brave Horses, and its many Waggons r chlv laden with several things of great value, intended for Pelents to his Imperia Majafty, and his principal Ministers. This Town is already falled with Strangers, who out of Curionly refer thither from all parts, to fee the great Selemnitics and Gallantry of the Enperors Marriage. The Bide Wag gon is intended to be extraordinary rich, all over covered with Embroidery of Gold, and drawn by Horles of great value with rich Trappings, with treble accourrements for their heads of beaten Gold, weighing each of them five pound.

l'is faid, the French Resident Monsieur Gremonville, hath order from his King to prepare himself to appear as Ambassador at the arrival of the Spanish Ambassador, Extraordinary, the Marquels de la Malago, who is expected here by the first from Inspruch by water. The Turkish Chaymason of Offen hath yet had no Audience. All is very quiet in the Upper and Lower Hungary, and the Christians and Turks live in good Friendship and Neighborhood.

Umstadt, Offob. 19. The Elector of Brandenburgh has received a Commission from the Emperor, by which he is to command the Forcesof the Empire designed for the relief of the City of Breme; but is obliged to act conjointy with the Circles of Saxony and Westphalia. The four Dukes of Brunfwick met lately in person to take order for the match of the Army; but 'tis faid the Constable of Swedeland Field Here Wrangle, is so strongly fortified, that a small Force will not oblige him to leave his Trenches.

The Elector of Mayence has been long expected at Afchaffenburgh, but as yet he is not removed from Koenie shoven, where he finds fecurity for himfelf, and all his Train f.om the

Infection.

Hamburgh, Offob. 20. On Thursday last about five in the Evening, the Swedes Rigiment of Foot passed within half a Mile of this place towards the Elbe, where 64 Boats and two Gilliots attending, transported them to Stoads. The Galliots of en firing their Guns, gave an occasion for a Report that the Lunenburghers had fellen upon them in their passage 3 which way the three Regiments of Horse are to march, is yet unknown. We hear as yet nothing more of the motion either of the Emperors, or Elector of Brandenburghs Forces towards Breme; but only that the command of the former is certainly committed for the present to the General Field Mir-The Lunenburgh Forces are in readinels, Rial de Souches. but 'sis hoped ail things may yet end peaceab'y.

On the 15 instant, the Bremers made a lufty Sally with 1000 men upon the Warnturn, which they hoped to recover; but finding it fortified and defended, were forced to retire

with some loss.

Ditto, Offob. 23. The Swedish Regiment past lately over the River Eibe near Blankennesse unmolested, though some 30 Ho se, and about 40 Danish Foot appeared at Blankenneffe, where an Imperial Mandate was publick'y affixed, as it is likewise in many other places, not to permit the Swedes farther Levies, to diffolve those that are already raised, and to hinder the conveyance of all forts of provisions to their

A Report is blown abroad of a Cellation of Arms between the Swedes and Bremers for ten dayes, and that they make mutual visits to one another; the certainty whereof we here-

Letters even now arrived from Pomeren, tell us, That a Swedish Regiment of Horse being drawn from their quarters in order to their march for Bremen, had received Orders to

return again to their quarters.

Madrid, Octob. 21. Though our Treaty with Portugal, goes not on so effectually as was defired, yet some probability there is that it may at the long run take good eff. A; no considerable Action has been done of late between them, the posture on both files amounting to a tacite cellation of A mes. Much discourse there is here of a severe Pasquil given privately about against her Majesties, Confessour, which carties with it much wit, but mixed with too much bitternels,

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and is by feverall persons conjectured to proceed from a Dominican, by reason of the great opposition he has met with from that Order, which in all points has been observed to be severe against the Jesuites: The Paper is however commanded to

be suppressed, and the Anthor farther enquired of

Danizick, Octob. 23. Out late Letters from several parts of Poland informus, that in all places they builty prepare matters for the Great Parliament, which is to commence at Warfam the beginning of November; that the Little Diets held preparatively in the feveral Provinces, proceed regularly and quietly, and Land-days in most places ended, especially n if ale paris that are of most considerable power with good ff a, which gives them much hopes of as happy Islue in the beneral meeting; vet the discourse continues still of a Con-coercey, and rew League in the Army, in which his Ma-sessies so, cas are likewise concerned: And tis confidently said, that they have cholen for their Marshal, the Signior Jaskouky, Brother to the Starofte of Onefne, which gives the King too much occasion to be di-fati-fied with that City. The Nobility, especially those of Little Poland, are much discontented at the infolencies of the Soldiery, and have often made their complaints to his Majeffy, in which they will furdenly receive satisfaction; for the Coffation between the Poles and Mussovites being ended, a general Rendezvous was appointed the 15 instant at Kupno, from whence a ve y cor si leral le part of the Army was ordered to march towards Ukraine, for the detence of the Countrey.

At the late Diet held for Prusia at Thorne, great complaints were made against the Min:-Master of Erambourg, Andrew Timpt, who was thereupon ordered to pril nowhere he is to continue, till he has made ample fatisfaction for the great injuries done the State in his Minning of fix Greshe and Gilder pieces, the first being 20, the latter 40 per Cent.

worle in Allay then they ought to be.

Oldenbourg, Offob. 24. Two days fince 22 Troops of Horse, Finlanders, in all 3000, arrived at the Swedes Leaguer, upon whole coming, the Field-Here Wrangel caused all his Cavalry, with his greatest Cannon, to pass over the River of Weser, leaving Warnturne, Catterturne, and Lankenomer Fores, each of them garrison'd with 500 Foot: The rest of the Army betwin: Bremen and Ackernage drawn into abody, with intention to give battle to those that shall endeavor to succor the City.

The Dukes of Brunswick and Lunenburghave ordered all their forces to be drawn together into a body, confiding of 14 or 15000 men. In the mean time, they cerfe not to ule all means possible of comp sing the difference, but with what

success a thorr time will manifest.

Cleves, Octob. 24. The Court de Zintzendorff has lately been employed hither to offer to his Electoral Highness of Brandenburgh the command of 12000, with the supream command of all the forces of the Empire, defigned for the relief of Bremen. Whereupon his Highness immediately dispatche away Monsieur Ledebourg to the Field-Here Wrangle to make some Overtures for the friendly composure of the differences between the Crown of Sweden, and that City.

Nembourg, Offober 31. Confident reports are now spread abroad, that the Treaty which hath been so long in aghation between the Swedes and Muscovites, was on the 15 instant fully concluded, and were to be figured the 18 following, by

the Ministers on both sides.

The Bremers are on all sides closely blockt up, but want neither Men, Provisions, nor courage to defend themselves; they have within the Town 3400 Foot, and 1000 Horse in pay, besides the Militia of the Town, which consist effectually of 5000 Men, besides 1200 Auxiliaries, all stout resolved Men, which they frequently demonstrate by their brisque Sallies, in one of which some few cases since they brought into Town great store of Provisions, salling it seems upon a quarter not well guarded by the Swedes.

The swedes are not backwards in using all their skills to

make themselves Masters of that place ; p sying very suricusly with their Guns and Morter pieces upon them, but as yet with little effect; the Towns Men are on all occasions ready in armes, to prevent all furpriles, and have ordered that each house shall be previded of a large quantity of water,

to quench any fire that shall be thrown into the Tewn, and in seturn have by their Fireworks done much hurt to the swedes in their Leaguer.

There are little or no hopes of an Accommodation between them, the Swedes infilting upon three points, to which the City cannot be induced to conceiverd, viz. 1. Upon the swearing of the Governor, 2. The Right of superiority; and 3. Their Treaty with the King of Smeden, about demolishing their Bulwark upon the Swedes ground.

Hazve, Novemb 6. The Commissioners for the several A imiralties are butily employed, with the D. puties from the S ates about our Sea affaires, which feem of late to be profecuted with more vigor then ever, the States baving ozdered 24 fl ips more of 80 Guns apiece, to be fet on the Stecks, over and above the other twelve, which are in hand of our last years Proportion. The King of Englands letter, though suppr fled with all industry, yet beth (it seems) stellen out of the press, even here amengst eur ielves, but immediate order was given underhand to buy up all the Copies, and to to flifte all the hopes we could have from The business of Buat begins to be more rarrowly that fide. looked into now by the soberer part of the Provinces, and its fail, the sentence it self is found faulty, so as some new one is to be formed and given abread in lieu of it: certain it is, all the printed Copies of the first have been bought up on a sudden, so es scarce one is to be had at any rate.

Order is likewife taken for the affishance of Fremen, in case that bufiness be not brought to a si eedy competing. The Forces under the command of the Colonels Kirpatrick, Dolman, and Wolderen, being designed to march specify for East-Friesland, and amount in the whole to feven Regiments of toot, and four of horle, their Commissions lying

ready for them.

The Drums are beating at Amsterdam for Men, which are intended to be Embarqued on a Merchant Veller belonging to the Clamber of Zealand, designed for the East-Indies.

On the f. cond instant was executed a Sentence pronounced against Cap. Pelau, for his ill behavior in the l to Dutch Exploit upon the English before Hamburgh for which his Sword was broken before his face, by the Hongman under the gallows.

Bruges, Novemb. 8. Several Men of War are of lase fet our f.cm Zealand, both publick and private Vessels, but the de fign not faid.

Six or feven Privatiers are now tiding before this Port,

where they have plied these sour cays.

Middleburgh, Novemb. 9. I wo ships are set cut from hence, intended for the East-Indies, whereast one was formerly a prize called the Charity, and three others are intended to sellow as seon as they can be fitted out. A Direction ship belonging to this place of 36 Guns, is to be of their Convoy, with whom are to go several Merchants ships bound for

Eight Men of War that lay for fome time hovering upon the English Coast, attending the Ceal fleet, were by the violence of a fform forced to leave their station, and are returned much damn fied, whereof one commanded by Captain Scagerto is come int Camputere. Tobias Toliats stip much shattered to Amsterdam. The others scattered and di.ordered to other paris.
