Danizick, Octob. 23. Out late Letters from several parts of Poland informus, that in all places they builty prepare matters for the Great Parliament, which is to commence at Warfam the beginning of November; that the Little Diets held preparatively in the feveral Provinces, proceed regularly and quietly, and Land-days in most places ended, especially n if ale paris that are of most considerable power with good ff a, which gives them much hopes of as happy Islue in the beneral meeting; vet the discourse continues still of a Con-coercey, and rew League in the Army, in which his Ma-sessies so, cas are likewise concerned: And tis confidently said, that they have cholen for their Marshal, the Signior Jaskouky, Brother to the Starofte of Onefne, which gives the King too much occasion to be di-fati-fied with that City. The Nobility, especially those of Little Poland, are much discontented at the infolencies of the Soldiery, and have often made their complaints to his Majeffy, in which they will furdenly receive satisfaction; for the Coffation between the Poles and Mussovites being ended, a general Rendezvous was appointed the 15 instant at Kupno, from whence a ve y cor si leral le part of the Army was ordered to march towards Ukraine, for the detence of the Countrey.

At the late Diet held for Prusia at Thorne, great complaints were made against the Min:-Master of Erambourg, Andrew Timpt, who was thereupon ordered to pril nowhere he is to continue, till he has made ample fatisfaction for the great injuries done the State in his Minning of fix Greshe and Gilder pieces, the first being 20, the latter 40 per Cent.

Oldenbourg, Offob. 24. Two days fince 22 Troops of Horse, Finlanders, in all 3000, arrived at the Swedes Leaguer, upon whole coming, the Field-Here Wrangel caused all his Cavalry, with his greatest Cannon, to pass over the River of Weser, leaving Warnturne, Catterturne, and Lankenomer Fores, each of them garrison'd with 500 Foot: The rest of the Army betwix: Bremen and Ackernage drawn into abody, with intention to give battle to those that shall endeavor to succor the City.

The Dukes of Brunswick and Lunenburghave ordered all their forces to be drawn together into a body, confiding of 14 or 15000 men. In the mean time, they cerfe not to ule all means possible of comp sing the difference, but with what

success a thorr time will manifest.

Cleves, Octob. 24. The Court de Zintzendorff has lately been employed hither to offer to his Electoral Highness of Brandenburgh the command of 12000, with the supream command of all the forces of the Empire, defigned for the relief of Bremen. Whereupon his Highness immediately dispatche away Monsieur Ledebourg to the Field-Here Wrangle to make some Overtures for the friendly composure of the differences between the Crown of Sweden, and that City.

Nembourg, Offober 31. Confident reports are now spread abroad, that the Treaty which hath been so long in aghation between the Swedes and Muscovites, was on the 15 instant fully concluded, and were to be figured the 18 following, by

the Ministers on both sides.

The Bremers are on all sides closely blockt up, but want neither Men, Provisions, nor courage to defend themselves; they have within the Town 3400 Foot, and 1000 Horse in pay, besides the Militia of the Town, which consist effectually of 5000 Men, besides 1200 Auxiliaries, all stout resolved Men, which they frequently demonstrate by their brisque Sallies, in one of which some few cases since they brought into Town great store of Provisions, salling it seems

upon a quarter not well guarded by the Swedes.

The swedes are not backwards in using all their skills to make themselves Masters of that place ; p sying very suricusly with their Guns and Morter pieces upon them, but as yet with little effect; the Towns Men are on all occasions ready in armes, to prevent all furpriles, and have ordered that each house shall be previded of a large quantity of water,

to quench any fire that shall be thrown into the Tewn, and in seturn have by their Fireworks done much hurt to the swedes in their Leaguer.

There are little or no hopes of an Accommodation between them, the Swedes infilting upon three points, to which the City cannot be induced to conceiverd, viz. 1. Upon the swearing of the Governor, 2. The Right of superiority; and 3. Their Treaty with the King of Smeden, about demolishing their Bulwark upon the Swedes ground.

Hazve, Novemb 6. The Commissioners for the several A imiralties are butily employed, with the D. puties from the S ates about our Sea affaires, which feem of late to be profecuted with more vigor then ever, the States baving ozdered 24 fl ips more of 80 Guns apiece, to be fet on the Stecks, over and above the other twelve, which are in hand of our last years Proportion. The King of Englands letter, though suppr fled with all industry, yet beth (it seems) stellen out of the press, even here amengst eur ielves, but immediate order was given underhand to buy up all the Copies, and to to flifte all the hopes we could have from The business of Buat begins to be more rarrowly that fide. looked into now by the soberer part of the Provinces, and its fail, the sentence it self is found faulty, so as some new one is to be formed and given abread in lieu of it: certain it is, all the printed Copies of the first have been bought up on a sudden, so es scarce one is to be had at any rate.
