His Majesty in Council was this Day pleased to order the Right Honourable the Lord High Chancellor to issue Writs for proroguing the Parliament which was appointed to meet on Tuesday the Nineteenth of this Instant, to Thursday the Second Day of July next—And also for proroguing the Convocations of Canterbury and York, which were appointed to meet on Friday the Twenty Second of this Instant, to Friday the Third Day of the said Month of July.

P R E S E N T,

The KING's most Excellent Majesty in Council.

**W**HEREAS the Time limited by His Majesty's Order in Council of the 27th of October last, for prohibiting the Exporting out of this Kingdom, or carrying Coastwise, Gunpowder, Salt Petre, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition, expired upon the 29th Day of this Instant April—And whereas it is judged expedient for His Majesty's Service, and the Safety of this Kingdom, that the said Prohibition should be continued for some longer Time: His Majesty doth therefore, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby Order, Require, Prohibit and Command, That no Person or Persons whatsoever (except the Master General, Lieutenant General, or Principal Officers of the Ordnance for His Majesty's Service) do, at any Time, during the Space of Six Months, to commence from the said 29th Day of this Instant April, presume to transport into any Parts out of this Kingdom, or carry Coastwise, any Gunpowder, Salt Petre, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition, or ship or lade any Gunpowder, Salt Petre, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition, on Board any Ship or Vessel, in order to transporting the same into any Parts beyond the Seas, or carrying the same Coastwise, without Leave or Permission in that Behalf first obtained from His Majesty, or His Privy Council, upon Pain of incurring and suffering the respective Forfeitures and Penalties inflicted by an Act passed in the Twenty Ninth Year of His late Majesty's Reign, entitled, "An Act to empower His Majesty to prohibit the Exportation of Salt Petre, and to enforce the Law for empowering His Majesty to prohibit the Exportation of Gunpowder, or any Sort of Arms and Ammunition; and also to empower His Majesty to restrain the carrying Coastwise of Salt Petre, Gunpowder, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition." And the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, the Commissioners for Executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, the Master

General of the Ordnance, and His Majesty's Secretary at War, are to give the necessary Directions herein, as to them may respectively appertain.

The two following Addresses having been transmitted to his Excellency the Earl of Halifax, Lord Lieutenant of the Kingdom of Ireland, has by him been presented to His Majesty: Which Addresses His Majesty was pleased to receive very graciously.

To the King's most Excellent Majesty,

The humble Address of the Grand Jury, Gentlemen and Freeholders of the County of Westmeath, Lent Assizes, 1761.

**W**E your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects of the County of Westmeath, do take this first Opportunity of being assembled, to lay before you a Tender of Duty and Allegiance arising from Hearts most firmly attached to your Majesty's Person and Government; and we cannot represent our real Sentiments by Words of stronger Import, than that, we know and feel, that what the Laws of these Realms and our Sovereign's just Rights make our Duty, our inseparable Affection to your Royal Person makes our Choice.

We truly condole with you, August Sir, on the Death of our late Sovereign of glorious Memory, your Royal Grandfather, who left this Life full of Days and Honors; and for whom Gratitude to the Memory of a most gracious Monarch, causes us to lament, even while we behold the Loss fully compensated by your Majesty's ascending the Throne of your Ancestors, in whose Royal Breast all those Virtues are concentrated, which have ever made good Kings the Boast of their own Times, and the Objects of Veneration to future Generations.

When therefore we contemplate your Majesty—happy in the Frame and Temper of your Mind—blessed with superior Talents, all tending to a legal and gentle Administration of Government—successful in the Prosecution of a just and necessary War against the natural Enemies of your Dominions—and above all, by an early and endearing Attention to the Religion and Liberties of these Nations, uniting in your Royal Person the Admiration and Affection of your whole People; we draw the surest Omens of the Glories of your Reign, and Date an Era of good Fortune to the Subject from the present Time, unknown before in any State or Nation.

Your Majesty's declared Resolution to adhere to, and strengthen our excellent Constitution, and to maintain the Rights of your People, has sunk deep into our Hearts. And we are full of Confidence that your Majesty will ever approve yourself the common Father of all your People. And although we be unhappily (by Situation) removed from your Royal Presence, we shall not want a just Portion of your paternal Care, which we shall be always studious

dious to merit by the firmest Allegiance, most zealous Duty and warmest Affection to your Majesty's Person and Government. We are farther persuaded, that to make any of our just Desires known to your Majesty, is (in Sense) equivalent to the Attainment of them. And in this Conviction, we lay before you our Apprehension of many ill Consequences derived to this Kingdom from the long Duration of the same Parliament; and we rely on your Majesty's auspicious Reign to produce to us the like Limitation of Parliaments our Sister Country enjoys.

Now, most gracious Sovereign, we fervently pray the King of Kings to grant your Majesty a long and prosperous Life, and that you may have an ample Return into your own Bosom of that Happiness which you are prepared to sow plentifully for all your People.

To the King's most Excellent Majesty,  
The humble Address of the High Sheriff, Grand Jury, Justices of the Peace, and other Gentlemen of the County of Antrim, in your Majesty's Kingdom of Ireland, met at a General Assizes holden for said County the Nineteenth Day of March, One thousand seven hundred and sixty-one.

*May it please your Majesty,*

**W**E your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects, the High Sheriff, Grand Jury, Justices of the Peace, and other Gentlemen of the County of Antrim, humbly beg Leave to condole with your Majesty on the Death of your Royal Grandfather, of glorious Memory; and to congratulate you on your happy and auspicious Accession to the Crown of these Realms.

When we consider your Majesty's exemplary Piety, your prudent, wise, and early Care for the Encouragement of our Religion, and the Morals of your People, as expressed in your Royal Declaration, we cannot but anticipate our Happiness on Hopes so well grounded, that your Majesty's Reign will surpass whatever may be found in the Annals of Great Britain.

Permit us, most Gracious Sovereign, at the same Time, most humbly to express our Wishes for a Limitation of Parliaments in this Kingdom; Wishes occasioned by the happy Effects resulting from such Limitation in your Majesty's Kingdom of Great Britain.

The unanimous and well-known Attachment of the Protestants of this Kingdom to your Royal House, may render Professions of Loyalty from us unnecessary on this Occasion; but the Sentiments of our Hearts are too strong to be restrained from breaking out, on every Opportunity, in the warmest Expressions of Duty and Obedience to your Majesty's most Sacred Person and Government, and to the Protestant Succession in your Illustrious House; upon which alone, under Heaven, depends the Preservation of our Religion, Laws, and Liberties.

The King has been pleased to appoint the Right Honourable Charles Earl of Northampton His Majesty's Ambassador Extraordinary and Plenipotentiary to the Republic of Venice.

The King has been pleased to fill up the vacant Stall at Westminster, of the most Honourable Order of the Bath, by conferring the Honour of Knighthood of that Order on Charles Saunders, Esq; Vice Admiral of the Blue Squadron of His Majesty's Fleet.

His Majesty's Ship the Bideford, commanded by Captain William Howe, fell in with two Cutter Privateers on the 3d Instant, on the North Side of the Dogger Bank, and took one of them, called the Marquis de Beringhen, of 8 Carriage and 6 Swivel Guns, with 60 Men.

His Majesty's Ship the Arethusa, commanded by Captain Keeler, fell in with two French Cutter Privateers on the 6th Instant, 45 Leagues W. by N. of Flamborough Head; and, after a Chace of three Hours, took one of them, called the Quemper, of 8 Carriage and 8 Swivel Guns, with 65 Men. As soon as the Men were shifted, Captain Keeler gave Chace to the other, but lost her in the Night. They came both from Dnnkirk the Day before, and had not taken any Thing.

Whereas it has been humbly represented to the King, That the Magistrate and Council of the Islands of Scilly have transmitted to the Earl of Godolphin, Governor of the said Islands, several Letters and Depositions relative to the Murder of one John Spence, by some of the Crew of His Majesty's Sloop Speedwell: And whereas a Jury, that were summoned on that Account, have found, That the said John Spence was murdered by Persons unknown; but, the Sloop sailing away with all her People, prevented the said Magistrate and Council of Scilly from proceeding any further in the Discovery of them; His Majesty, for the better discovering and bringing to Justice the Persons concerned in the said Murder, is, hereby, pleased to promise His most gracious Pardon to any one of them, who shall discover his Accomplice or Accomplices therein; so that he, or they, may be apprehended and convicted thereof; and also a Reward of One Hundred Pounds, to be paid by the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, upon the Conviction of one or more of the Criminals.
