May 26, 1761.

THIS Day being appointed for the Installation of the Knights Elect of the most Honourable Order of the Bath, the Knights Companions in the full Habit of the Order, and the Knights Elect in their Sur-coats and Mantles, met in the Prince's Chamber at Westminster, from whence they went in Procession to the South-East Door of the Abbey, and from thence to King Henry the Seventh's Chapel, in the following Order :

- Drums of His Majesty's Household
- The Drum Major
- Kettle-Drums and Trumpets
- The Serjeant Trumpeter with his Mace
- Twelve Alms-Men of the Church of Westminster, two and two, in their Gowns
- The Messenger of the Order
- The Esquires of the Knights Elect, three and three, their Caps in their Hands
- Prebendaries of Westminster, two and two Officers of Arms
- The Knights Elect and Proxies; the Knights carrying their Hats and Feathers in their Hands; the Proxies girt with the Sword of the Order, and bearing the Mantles on their Right Arms.
- The Knights Companions in the full Habit of the Order
 - The Gentleman Usher—Register—Secretary
 - Bath King of Arms—Garter—Genealogist
 - The Dean, carrying in his Hand the Form of the Oath and Admonition
 - The Senior Knight Companion Sir William Stanhope, as Great Master.
 - The Alms-Men, entering the Chapel, made a joint Reverence to the Altar and the Sovereign's Stall, and then, dividing, stood on either Side above the Stalls.
 - The Messenger, with like Reverences, next below them.
 - The Esquires, with like Reverences together, stood before their Seats.
 - The Prebendaries the like, and went to the Altar.
 - The Officers of Arms the like, and stood before their Forms under the Duke's Stall.
 - The Knights Elect, in their Order, made the like Reverences, and went under their Banners.
 - The Knights Companions the like.
 - The Register, Secretary, and Usher, the like, and stood before their Bench under the Sovereign's Stall.
 - Garter, with the Genealogist and Bath King, the like.
 - The Dean in like Manner before his Chair, at the Foot of the Sovereign's Stall.
 - The Senior Knight Companion, as Great Master, in like Manner under his Banner.
 - Bath King of Arms made his double Reverences in the Middle of the Choir, and then bowed to the Great Master, who thereupon made his double Reverences, ascended into his Stall, repeated his Reverences there, and sat down covered.
 - Bath then bowed to Lord Grantham, and afterwards to Sir Edward Hawke, who in the same Manner, severally made their Reverences, ascended into their Stalls, and sat down covered, Lord Pollington and Sir Edward Walpole, the two junior Knights Companions present, remaining under their Banners to offer the Hatchments of the deceased Knights.

The Knights Installed likewise continuing under their Banners.

Then Bath taking up the Banner of Sir Coniers Darcy, the Senior deceased Knight, held it almost rolled up; upon which Two Officers of Arms, with the usual Reverences, repaired to the Two Knight Companions, who thereupon joined, and, receiving the Banner from Bath with two Reverences, preceded by the Officers of Arms, carried it between them, Point forwards, to the Step of the Altar, where with one Reverence they delivered it to the Prebends, repeating the like Reverences in the Return as in their coming up.

The Banners of Sir Paul Methuen, the Earl of Buckinghamshire, Sir William Yonge, the Earl of Leicester, Viscount Tyrconnel, Sir John Cope, and Sir Charles Hanbury Williams, were severally offered in the same Manner; which being done, the two Knights Companions ascended into their Stalls, making their usual Reverences.

Bath then bowed to the Knights Elect in their Order, who thereupon, each with his Companion, making their Reverences together, took their Stalls, standing therein, and holding their Hats and Feathers in their Hands; and Bath returned to his Bench.

Then Bath carrying the Great Collar and Book of Statutes on a Cushion, having the Usher on his Left Hand, and being followed by the Dean, they made their Reverences together in the Middle of the Choir; whereupon the Great Master descended from his Stall with the usual Reverences, and entering into the Stall of Lord Blakeney, Installed his Proxy, Sir William Stevenson, Knt. in the same Manner as his Lordship would have been, had he been present, except investing with the Collar, and putting on the Hat and Feather.

The Great Master then entered into the Stall of Lord Carysfort, where First Bath presented the Book of Statues to the Great Master, who delivered it to the Knight: Then the Dean administered the Oath, Bath holding the Book: Next, the Great Collar was delivered, the Great Master investing him therewith: Lastly, the Great Master placed the Cap and Feather upon his Head, and seated him in his Stall, who thereupon rising up, made his double Reverences; and the Great Master, having saluted him, descended, making his Reverences in the Middle of the Choir.

In like Manner, the honourable Sir Joseph Yorke—Sir James Gray, Baronet (by his Proxy, Sir William Hart, Knt.)—Sir William Beauchamp Proctor, Baronet (by his Proxy, Sir William Burnaby, Knight)—Sir John Gibbons, Baronet—Sir George Pocock—Sir Jeffery Amherst (by his Proxy, Sir Charles Cotterel Dormer, Knt.)—Sir John Griffin Griffin (by his Proxy, Sir Francis Gosling, Knt.)—Sir Francis Delaval—Sir George Frederick—Sir George Warren, and Sir Charles Saunders (by his Proxy, Sir John Bentley, Knt.) were severally installed.

All the Knights being Installed, the Great Master returns to his Stall, the Dean is conducted to the Altar, the Officers return to their Seats, and Divine Service begins; during which, the Knights place their Hats and Feathers on the Cushions before them.

Upon the Sentence of the Offertory, *Let your Light so shine, &c.* Bath goes into the Middle of the Choir, makes his double Reverences, and then summons all the Knights under their Banners, by bowing to

to them, Juniors first; whereupon each Knight with his Companion, at the same Instant, make their double Reverences in their Stalls, and being under their Banners repeat the same.

All being under their Banners, Bath, with an Officer of Arms, repairs to the Great Master, and they conduct him, with the usual Reverences, to the Rails of the Altar, where taking off his Hat, and kneeling down, he makes his Offering of Gold and Silver; then rising up, and putting on his Hat, he returns, with like Reverences, to his Stall.

The rest of the Knights and Proxies, severally or with their Companions, were in like Manner conducted to the Altar, and, after making their Offering, returned to their Stalls.

Divine Service being ended, the Knights put on their Hats, and Bath Summoned them under their Banners as before; and the Companions then Installed, attended by Bath and an Officer of Arms, were conducted to the Altar, as at the first Offering,

where each Knight with his Companion, standing, drew his Sword, and offered it to the Dean, who restored it with the proper Admonition; which done, they returned under their Banners.

A Procession was then made back to the Prince's Chamber, in the same Order it came from thence, except that the New-installed Knights and their Elquires are now covered, and that the Proxies and Prebends go no farther than the Abbey-Door; and without the Door, the King's Master-Cook made the usual Admonition.

His Royal Highness the Duke of York, Prince William, and Prince Henry, were present to see the Ceremony and Procession; and at Night there was a magnificent Ball and Supper at the Opera-House in the Hay-market, at the Expence of the new Knights, at which his Royal Highness the Duke of York was likewise present, all the foreign Ministers, and a great Number of the Nobility and Persons of Distinction of both sexes.

AT the Council-Chamber, *Whitehall*, the 28th Day of *May*, 1761,

P R E S E N T,

The Lords of His Majesty's most Honourable Privy-Council.

This Day the Right Honourable John Earl Poulett, Lord Lieutenant of the County of Somerset, took the Oaths appointed to be taken, instead of the Oaths of Allegiance and Supremacy.

Liege, May 23. This Day the Battalion of Militia, that came here to guard the French Magazines, marched forward, and were replaced by six other Companies of Militia. To-morrow the Regiments of Cavalry, who had their Winter-Quarters in this Bishopric, begin their March to the Lower Rhine.

Petersburgh, April 17. We have at present here a Georgian Prince, who is lodged and defrayed at the

Expence of the Court, and receives other great Marks of Distinction: He had his Audience, on Palm-Sunday, of the Empress and the Imperial Family, and made considerable Presents. He is Father to the Heraclius, who is now actually reigning Prince at Teflis. Since his Arrival in this Place, he has received a Courier from his Son, with the Account of some considerable Advantages he has lately gained on the Side of Persia.

Hamburg, May 19. Letters from Berlin, of the 16th Instant, received here Yesterday, inform us, That, upon the King of Prussia's Approach, the Austrians seemed preparing to abandon Silesia. That his Majesty had been joined by the Corps of Troops under the Command of General Goltze, and was with his Army between Jauer and Schweidnitz.

By the late Advices from Saxony, it appears, that neither Prince Henry nor Marshal Daun had as yet made any Motion.

Hague, May 22. The Prince de Soubize arrived, as we hear, the 16th at Wesel, and reviewed the Troops there; and our Accounts farther mention, That his whole Army was to encamp the 25th, except the Household Troops.

The King of Prussia was on the 9th at Gorrilitz, and on the 10th continued his March in order to pass the Queifs, and enter Silesia.

Hague, May 25. It is now said, that the Army of Prince Soubize will not be formed before the 4th or 5th of June; and that even then Part of the Cavalry must be left behind.

The Light Troops of the Army under the Hereditary Prince, have attacked and routed some of the advanced Posts of the two French Camps at Rees and Wesel, which caused great Alarms in those Camps, where the Desertion is very considerable.

Letters from Leipzig say, That the last Accounts from Silesia, of the 12th Instant, confirm the News, that, upon the King of Prussia's Approach near to Jauer, General Laudon had retired into Bohemia.

Colonel Kleist, of the Prussian Hussars, attacked on the 17th Part of the Corps commanded by General Guasco, which was assembled at Schellenberg, and made 3 Officers and 118 Men Prisoners.

Whitehall, May 30.

The King has been pleased to order a Congé d'Elire to the Dean and Chapter of the Cathedral Church of Salisbury, empowering them to elect a Bishop of that See, the same being void by the translation of the Right Reverend Father in God Doctor John Thomas, late Bishop thereof, to the See of Winchester; and also a Letter, recommending to the said Dean and Chapter the Right Reverend Father in God Doctor Robert Drummond, Bishop of St. Asaph, to be by them elected Bishop of the said See of Salisbury.

The King has been pleased to grant unto Francis Aycough, Doctor in Divinity, the Place and Dignity of Dean of the Cathedral Church of Bristol, void by the Promotion of Dr. Samuel Squire, late Dean thereof, to the See of St. David's.

Admiralty Office, May, 29.

His Majesty's Sloop Jamaica, commanded by Capt. George Burdon, on the 14th Instant, on the Coast of Portugal, fell in with a French Snow Privateer, and a Row-boat, which last was towing an English Brig. Capt. Burdon gave Chace to the Snow, which, after receiving several Shot, struck to him; and proved to be the Francois, a Privateer of 8 Guns, and 61 Men, and was returning to St. Maloes. He then stood for the Brig and Rowboat, the latter of which escaped, but he retook the former, being the Two Brothers of Irvine, bound to Oporto, Part laden with Coal, and has carried her and the Privateer into Vigo.
