Hamburg, May 22. The Body of Prussian Troops, under the Command of the Prince of Wurtemberg, which has been for some Time in the Dutchy of Mecklembourg, is now marched towards Stettin, in order to draw nearer to General Werner, and to prevent the Russians, who are assembling themselves near Dirschau, from advancing towards Prussian Pomerania. Colonel Belling remains in the mean while in Mecklembourg, with a Corps of between 2 and 3000 Men, to observe the Motions of the Swedes.

His Royal Highness Prince Ferdinand of Prussia is set out from Berlin for Magdebourg.

M. de Puschkin, who has been named some Time ago to reside here, as Minister from the Court of Russia, in the room of M. de Soltikoff, arrived in Town this Morning.

Leipzig, May 23. We hear from Silesia, that the King of Prussia's Head Quarter, on the 14th instant, was at Hawidorf, between Strigaw and Hohenfriedberg.

Aix la Chapelle, May 24. This Day the Regiment of Trefignies Cavalry, with that of Alsace, and some Companies of Militia, marched hence towards the Lower Rhine. To-morrow Conti Cavalry will arrive here in their Way to join the Army commanded by the Prince of Soubize. The Cavalry, in general, are very ill mounted; and very incomplete.

Liege, May 25. The Regiments of Chartres and Vogué marched hence this Morning, to join the Army on the Lower Rhine. The Desertion has been very great in the Cavalry that was quartered in this Bishoprick.

Cologne, May 26. The Regiments of Cavalry, Royal, Damas, and Orleans, who made Part of Marshal Broglie's Army, have been detached from Hesse to join the Prince of Soubize's Army; but as they have been continually in the Field for near 12 Months, they are put into Quarters of Refreshment near Kerpen.

Hague, May 29. We hear that a considerable Number of Battalions, belonging to the Prince of Soubize's Army, are ordered home, to replace the Troops which have marched from the Neighbouring Provinces into Bretagne. They add, that the Prince of Soubize was at Cologne, and was going to meet Marshal Broglie at Coblentz.

Letters from the Army on the Rhine say, that all was quiet in those Parts; and that Marshal Broglie was endeavouring to establish new Magazines at Cassel, Ziegenhain, and Hirschfeldt.
