Petersbourg, May 7.

THE Great Duke Paul Petrowitz made his first Appearance this Day in the Drawing Room.

Hambourg, May 26.

Yesterday M Muslin Reskin delivered his Credentials to this Magistracy as Minister from the Empress of Russia, in the Room of M. de Soltikoff; and this Morning he was complimented by a Deputation in Form on the Part of the Senate.

Nimueghen, May 29. A great Number of Boats, loaded with Forage for the Use of Prince Soubize's Army, coming from Holland, have passed by this City within a Fortnight past, in their Way to Rees and Wesel.

Rhegu, June 2. The French Troops, that were encamped at Duffeldorff, Burich, and Rees, are said to be gone into Quarters of Cantonment along the Rhine, as they suffered by the Rains that have been lately very heavy.

Letters from Saxony say, that every Thing was quiet in the Camp of Schlettau on the 27th past: That Marshal Daun had as yet made no Movement. The last Accounts from Silesia mention, that the Russians had began to pass the Vistula: That General Goltze, who had been detached with his Corps towards Glogau, had his Quarters at Zarkau on the other Side of the Oder; and that the King of Prussia had removed his Head Quarters from Hausdorff to Kuntzendorff, between Freyburg and Schweidnitz.

Lord Granby and General Waldegrave landed at Helvoetsluys this Morning.

St. James's, June 3.

This Day Omar Effendi, lately arrived Ambassador from Algiers, had his first Audience of His Majesty, to deliver his Credentials: To which he was introduced by the Right Honourable William Pitt, Esq; one of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, and conducted by Stephen Cottrell, Esq; Assistant Master of the Ceremonies.

Dublin Castle, May 28.

Yesterday his Grace George Lord Archbishop of Armagh, Primate of all Ireland, Henry Earl of Shannon, and the Right Honourable John Ponsonby, Esq; were sworn in Council, Lords Justices of this Kingdom, in the Absence of his Excellency the Earl of Halifax, Lord Lieutenant.
