And further, We do hereby Will and Command all and fingular Our loving Subjects, of what Estate or Degree they, or any of them, be, to be aiding and assisting, at the Commandment of the said Officers, in the Performance and Execution of the said Offices, Places, and Employments, as they tender Our Displeasure, and will answer the Contrary at their utmost Perils.

Given at Our Court at St. James's the Twentyfifth Day of June, 1761, in the First Year of Our Reign.

## GOD Save the KING.

Liege, June 22. The Burghers of this Town having refused to lett their Granaries to the French for their Flour, they asked for the Granaries of the Convents, which were granted: But those not being fufficient for the vast Quantities they have here, they demanded the Cloisters of the Canons of St. Paul, but were refused; on which, this Morning they broke open the Doors, and carried in their Sacks by

Hague, June 26. We have no Letters from the Allied Army: But what we hear from Westphalia is, that the Prince of Soubize was still at Dortmond on the 23d; but had pushed a Vanguard forward to Unna, Camen, and Luymen. Those Accounts mention besides, that the Hereditary Prince had fent away his heavy Baggage; and Prince Perdinand had advanced from Paderborn to Geseke, so as to support his Serene Highness. It is supposed, that the French Army is delayed for Want of Subfiftance, which the late Rains have made it difficult to procure from Wesel. Marshal Broglio is said to

be marching on his Side towards Westphalia.

Letters from Magdebourg say, that the King of Prussia and Prince Henry still remained in their former Position.

Prince Frederick Eugene of Wurtemberg is entrenched before Colberg for the Defence of that Place. And the Russian Army had advanced to Landsberg and Driesen.

The Army of the Empire are moving flowly towards the Frontiers of Saxony and Franconia.

This Day His Excellency M. Boreel, Ambassador from the States General, had a private Audience of His Majesty to deliver his Credential Letters.
