A PROCLAMATION,

Declaring His Majesty's Pleasure touching His Royal Coronation, and the Solemnity thereof.

GEORGE R.

HEREAS We have refolved; by the Fayour and Bleffing of Almighty God, to celebrate the Solemnity of Our Royal Coronation upon Tuekday the Twenty Second Day of September next, at Our Palace at Westminfter : And forasmuch as by antient Customs and Ulages, as also in regard of divers Tenures of fundry Manors, Lands, and other Heredi-taments, many of Our loving Subjects do claim, and are bound to do and perform divers feveral Services on the faid Day, and at the Time of the Coronation, as, in Times precedent, their Anceftors, and those from whom they claim, have done and per-formed at the Coronation of Our famous Progenitors and Predeceffors : We therefore, out of Our Princely Care for the Prefervation of the lawful Rights and Inheritances of Our loving Subjects, whom it may concern, have thought fit to give Notice of, and publish Our Refolutions therein'; and do hereby give Notice of, and publish the fame accordingly: And We do hereby further fignify, That, by Our Commiflion under Our Great Seal of Great Britain, We have appointed and authorized Our moft Dearly beloved Brother and Counfellor Edward Duke of York ; Our Dearly-beloved Uncle and Counfellor William Duke of Cumberland; the most Reverend Father in God, Our Right Trufty and Right' entirely beloved Counfellor Thomas Archbilhop of Canterbury, Primate of all England, and Metropolitan; Our Right Trufty and Well-beloved Counfellor Robert Lord Henley, Baron of Grainge, Our Chancellor of Great Britain ; Our Right Trufty and Right Well-beloved Coufins and Counfellors John Earl Granville, Prefident of Our Council ; Richard Earl Temple, Keeper of Our Privy Seal; Our Right. Our faid Commissioners, for that Purpose, to fit in the Painted Chamber of Our Palace at Weltminster, upon Tuesday the Twenty First Day of this Instant July, at Ten of the Clock in the Forenoon of the fame Day, and, from Time to Time, to adjourn, 25 to them shall feem meet, for the Execution of Our faid Commission, which We do thus Publish, to the Intent that all fuch Perfons, whom it may any ways concern, may know when and where to give their Attendance for the Exhibiting of their Petitions and Claims concerning the Services before-mentioned to be done and performed unto Us at Our faid Coronation : And We do hereby fignify unto all and every Our Subjects, whom it may concern, That Our Will and Pleafure is, and We do hereby firicily charge all Perfons, of what Rank or Quality foever they be, who either upon Our Letters to them directed, or by Reafon of their Offices or Tenures, or otherwife, are to do any Service at the faid Day or Time of Our Coronation, that they do duly give their Attendance accordingly, in all Refpects furnished and appointed as to fo great a Solemnity appertaineth, and anfwer-able to the Dignities and Places which every one of them respectively holdeth and enjoyeth; and of this they, or any of them, are not to fail, as they will answer the contrary at their Perils, unless upon special Reasons by Ourself, under Our Hand, to be allowed, We shall dispense with any of their Services or Attendances.

GOD Save the KING,

Peteribourg, June 9. On Saturday laft, about Eleven o'Clock in the Forenoon, a Fire broke out here, and burned with great Violence till between Seven and Eight in the Evening; when it was happily extinguished, after having confumed a Church and about forty Houfes; amongft which were feveral handfome Brick Buildings. The Emprefs went Yesterday to Czarikezelo, but

is to return to Town on Friday.

Berlin, July 2. Prince Henry still occupies the Camp of Schlettau, and Marshal Daun remains inactive in that of Plauen near Drefden. The Army of the Empire are encamped at Reichenbach. Every Thing is quiet in Silefia, on the Side of the Auftrians. General Loudon continues at Hauptmanfdorff, and the King of Prussia at Kuntzendorff. At Landshut the Austrians lately surprized, with superior Force, a Detachment of four hundred Horfe, of which they made eighty-five Prisoners; but the Prussians im-mediately re-occupied that Post. The King of Prussia has detached Lieutenant-General Ziethen, with a confiderable Body of Men, to reinforce the Army against the Russians, of which he will take the Command, as General Goltz died at Glogau on the 30th of June. The Grand Ruffian Army, which was affembled at Pofen the 13th, decamped from thence on the 26th of June, and feem to be marching towards Silefia. General Ziethen, in order to watch their Motions, is advanced into Poland; fo that we are in daily Expectation of fome important General Tottleben follows with his Corps Event. the great Ruffian Army. General Romanzow, who is encamped at Kollin in Pomerania, with a Corps of 25,000 Men, waits only for the Arrival of the Rhifian Fleet, to begin the Siege of Colberg, under the Cannon of which Place the Prince of Wurtemberg is entrenched, with a confiderable Body of The Swedes have not yet begun to move : Men. Colonel Belling watches them with a few Squadrons of Huffars, and fome Batalhons of Militia. General Ehrenschwurdt, who is to command the Swedish Army, is not as yet fet out from Stockholm ; however, the Government of Sweden have ordered fix Men of War to be equipped at Carlfcroon, which are to join the Ruflian Fleer before Colberg.

Hague, July 3. We have the following Account from the Allied Army, dated at Lunderen near Unna, June 30, 1761. The Hereditary Prince, after hav-ing left Count Kielmanfegge at Ham, marched to Kirckdenkern, and from thence, on the 28th Instant, to Sundern, where he encamped on the Right Wing of the Grand Army, which had advanced towards Werle, the Cattle whereof, in which Major Raal, a Hessian, commanded, with a Garrison of 200 Men in it, was attacked the Day before by the Enemy, who could not take it, though they cannonaded it for fome Time. Yefterday our whole Army, in Se-ven Columns, (befides the Two, which composed the Body under the Command of the Hereditary Prince) marched directly on the Enemy. The Referve, commanded by the Prince de Condé, retired towards their Grand Army, and was harraffed, all. the Time of their Retreat, by the Head of our Co-lumns. Part of the Right Wing was ordered to fall back; and the Grand Army took an advantageous Pofition between Unna and the Roer. The Firing on the Van continued all Yesterday, and was not over this Morning. Our Right Wing lies before the Village, in which our Head Quarters are, and our Left reaches behind the Village of Kefeburen, which the French burnt Yeflerday, as far as to a Fall of Trees, which covers the Enemy's Right. We are very near them : Nothing but a Ravin separates our Right from their Left. They have strengthened the Front of their Left by fome Redoubts.

Kielmansegge's Corps is posted at Kamen. Hague, July 7. We have just received an Ac-count of the Electress Palatine's having been brought to bed of a Son, but that he lived only Time enough to be baptized.

From Paderborn we hear, that General Sporken had been obliged to abandon Warbourg upon the

Approach of Marihal Broglio's Army, and had loft, in his Retreat, some Pieces of Cannon, and a very small Number of Men. The Marshal had thereupon fent a Detachment by Brakel to Steinheim, on the Road to Hamelen; and had likewife posted Troops at Hoxter and Corvey on the Wefer; but the Light Troops of the Allies were in Possession of Holizminden.

General Sporken was retiring from Paderborn to Bielefeldt.

Hague, July 10. The Allied Army was got on the 8th to Hulbeck, Prince Ferdinand having made a further Attempt to bring the Enemy to Action on the 7th, but the Prince of Soubize again d clined it, marching towards Soeff; at which Place Marshal Broglio, after having taken Possession of Warbourg and Padderborn, was faid to be arrived on the 5th.

The fame Accounts fay, that General Sporcken, after having retired from Warbourg, had marc cd-round by Blomberg, Detmold, Bielefeldt, and Rieberg, where he was fuppoled to be on the 3d, on the Way to join Prince Ferdinand.

Camp at Hemmerden, July 6. On the 1ft Inftant, at Eleven at Night, our Army decamped from Lunderen, and torned the Enemy's Left Flank with a Defign to attack them in the Rear; but it being exceffively rainy, and the Country full of Moraffes, it was found impossible to bring up the Cannon, and we were forced to lay that Attempt aside; upon which we continued our March along the Enemy's Rear, and without any Interruption, or Lofs, took Post on their other Flank; Prince Ferdinand placing his Head Quarters at Dortmuad,

On the 2d the Enemy began to attack our Piquets, under Lieutenant General Watgenau, with a Corps of 10,000 Men; but feeing that four Battalions of the Corps under Lord Granby advanced to support them, they retired, but loft upon that Occasion M. de Pedemont, Brigadier, who commanded the At-tack, befides a Colonel and Major killed, and a Lieutenant Colonel wounded and taken. On our Side we loft two Heffian Officers, and two or three private Men.

On the 3d our whole Army advanced again upon the Enemy, who retired immediately behind Werle, placing the Caffle of that Place, which full continues in our Possellion, before their Right Flank; and occupied the very fame Camp where we had been a few Days before; and our Army then encamped at this Place, in the Face of the Enemy.

Yesterday Prince Ferdinand reconnoitred the Eremy's Army, with an Intention of attacking them, but found them fituated too firongly for fuch an Attempt.

July 13, 1761.

By Virtue of an Order from the Earl Marihal, in Pursuance of His Majefly's Order of Council, this Day the Heralds made Proclamation of His Majefly's Coronation, and the First Meeting of the Court of Claims, at the usual Time and Places, and with the ufual Solemnity.

Between Eleven and Twelve o'Clock, the Officers of Arms, Serjeant at Arms, and others, mounted their Hories, and, at Westminster Hall Gate, Windfor Herald (after the Trampets had thrice founded) read His Majefty's Proclamation aloud; which be-ing done, a Procession was made to Temple Bar where the Constables of the City and Liberty of Westminster retired, and were replaced by those of the City of London, the City Marshal attending) in the following Order.

A Party of Conflubles, with their Staves, to clear the Way.

High Conftable of Westminster with his Staff.

Knight Marshal's Men two and two.

Drums two and two.

Trumpets two and two. Serjeant Trumpeter in his Collar, bearing his Mace.

Bluemaple and Rouge Dragon Purfuivants, ia their Coats of His Majefty's Arms.

Rouge Croix Perfoivant, in his Coat of His Majefty's Arms, having a Serjeant at Arms on his Left Hand.

Lancafter Herald, in his Coat and Collar, having a Serjeant at Arms on his Left Hand.

Windfor Herald, in his Coat and Collar, between two Serjeants at Arms.

A Party of Conftables to close the Procession.

At the End of Chancery Lane Lancaster Herald made Proclamation; and laftly at the Royal Ex-change (in 'Change Time) Rouge Croix Purfuivant proclaimed it a third Time, which ended with loud Acclamations of Multitudes of People prefent.

Afterwards, upon an Invitation from the Lord Mayor, the Officers of Arms dined with his Lordthip at the Manfion Houfe, where they were molt elegantly and politely entertained.
