**D**EEPLY affected with the severe Loss we, in common with our Fellow-Subjects, have sustained by the Death of our late most Excellent King, of happy Memory, whose paternal Care the Inhabitants of these Colonies have, in the amplest Manner, experienced in the Course of His long, mild, just, and glorious Reign; favourably permit us, most Gracious Sovereign, to condole with your Majesty that melancholy Event: But we should not approve ourselves in any Respect worthy of the indulgent Protection of Providence, did we not derive and most thankfully acknowledge the strongest Consolation, from a Contemplation on the Eminent and Royal Virtues, which constitute and embellish the Character of a good King; and give the best Assurance of a Continuance, under your Majesty's Reign, of the invaluable Blessings we have so long enjoyed during that of your Illustrious Grandfather. With this Assurance, we join in the general Joy which hath been diffused through all the extensive Dominions of Great Britain; and, with the greatest Humility and purest Sincerity of Heart, beg Leave to congratulate your Majesty upon your Accession to the Throne of your Ancestors.

May your Majesty be rendered happy by the Prosperity of a Free People, flourishing under the benign Influence of your auspicious Government; by a grateful and adequate Retribution in their zealous Affection, and firm Attachment to your Sacred Person, and by every Solace of human Nature; and we most fervently pray, that your Majesty's Reign may be distinguished as well by its Length as its Felicity.
