not to be displeased at our coming to take Possellion of the Island; but in the Afternoon, when they were put on Shore, we found the People were spirited up by the Governor, Monfieur Longprie, to stand upon their Defence, and declared they had come to a Determination to defend themfelves : Upon which I ordered the Ships to anchor as close in as polfible, and the necessary Dispositions were accordingly made for landing the Troops, which was effected about Five in the Evening, under Cover of the Shipping; and notwithflanding the Enemy had four Intrenchments upon the Face of a fleep Hill, with 2 Nine Pounders in the upper one, Lord Rollo, at the Head of his Troops, and Colonel Melvill, at the Head of the Grenadiers, with a furprizing Alertnefs and Intrepidity, drove the E-nemy from their Intrenchments and Battery, with the Lofs only of about eight Men killed and wounded, and made themfelves Masters of Rofeau, and the adjacent Places of Defence, in a Time too fhort to be conceived from the Difficulty of the Undertaking. The Refitance the Enemy made, has put it in our Power to bring them to fuch Terms as we please; and they are flocking from all Parts of the Island, to take the Oath of Allegiance to His Majefty King George.

M. Lemprie is a Prisoner, with three other of the principal People.
