A PROCLAMATION,

For Recalling and Prohibiting Seamen from serving Foreign Princes and States: For giving Encouragement to Seamen and able-bodied Landmen to enter themselves on Board His Majesty's Ships of War; and for granting Rewards for discovering such Seamen as shall conceal themselves.

WHEREAS We are informed, that great Numbers of Mariners and Seafaring Men, Our natural-born Subjects, are in the Service of divers Foreign Princes and States, to the Prejudice of Our Kingdom: And whereas Our Service doth, at this Time, require a speedy Supply of Seamen and Seafaring Men, in such of Our Ships as are now ready to be Commissioned, We have thought fit, by and with the Advice of Our Privy-Council, to publish this Our Royal Proclamation, and do hereby strictly charge and command all Masters of Ships, Pilots, Mariners, Seamen, Shipwrights, and other Seafaring Men whatsoever and wheresoever, (being our natural-born Subjects) who are in the Pay or Service of any Foreign Prince or State, or do serve in any Foreign Ship or Vessel, that forthwith they, and every of them, do (according to their known and bounden Duty and Allegiance) withdraw themselves, depart from, and quit such Foreign Services, and return Home to their native Countries. And farther, We do hereby strictly prohibit and forbid all Masters of Ships, Pilots, Mariners, Seamen, Shipwrights, and other Seafaring Men whatsoever, (being Our natural-born Subjects) from entering, and do charge and command them, and every of them, from henceforth, to forbear to enter themselves into the Pay or Service of any Foreign Prince or State, or to serve in any Foreign Ship or Vessel whatsoever, without our special Licence first had and obtained in that Behalf; to all which We expect due Obedience, and exact Conformity. And We do hereby publish and declare, That the Offenders to the contrary shall not only incur Our just Displeasure, but be proceeded against for their Contempt, according to the utmost Severities of the Law. And We do hereby declare, That if any such Masters of Ships, Pilots, Mariners, Seamen, Shipwrights, or other Seafaring Men, (being Our Subjects) shall be taken in any Foreign Service, by the Turks, Algerines, or any others, that they shall not be reclaimed by Us, as Subjects of Great Britain. And whereas it is Our Royal Intention to give all due Encouragement to all such Seamen, Seafaring Men, and able-bodied Landmen, who shall voluntarily enter themselves in Our Service, We do hereby promise and declare, That the Bounties of Five Pounds for every Able Seaman, and of Thirty Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, be paid to every such Able and Ordinary Seaman, not above the Age of Fifty, nor under the Age of Twenty Years, who shall, on or before the Twelfth Day of September next, voluntarily enter them

elves to serve in Our Royal Navy, either with the Captains or Lieutenants of Our Ships, or the Chief Officers on Board such Tenders as shall be employed for raising Men, for the Service of Our Royal Navy; and also, that a Bounty of Thirty Shillings be paid to every Able-bodied Landman, not above the Age of Thirty-five, nor under the Age of Twenty Years, who shall, on or before the said Twelfth Day of September next, voluntarily enter themselves to serve in Our Royal Navy, either with the Captains or Lieutenants of Our Ships, or the Chief Officers on board such Tenders, as shall be employed for raising Men for the Service of Our Royal Navy; and that such respective Sums be paid to all such Seamen and Landmen, upon their being brought on Board Our Ships at any of Our Dock Yards in England, by the Clerks of the Cheque; or upon their being put on Board any Ship or Vessel, appointed to receive Men at Leith or Greenock in Scotland, or at Dublin or Corke in Ireland, by the Captains or Commanders of the Ships or Vessels, whereinto such Seamen and Landmen shall be put, or by the Sea Officer employed in raising Men on Shore. And for Prevention of any Abuses by any Persons leaving the Ships or Vessels to which they shall belong, and entering themselves on Board any other Our Ships or Vessels, in order to obtain the said Bounty-Money; We do hereby declare and command, That such Seamen or Landmen, belonging to any of Our Ships or Vessels, as shall absent themselves from any of the said Ships or Vessels to which they shall belong, and enter themselves on Board any other of Our Ships or Vessels, in order to obtain the said Bounty, shall not only lose the Wages due to them in the Ships or Vessels they shall leave, but also be severely punished according to their Demerits. And We do hereby further promise and declare, That a Reward of Two Pounds for every Able, and Thirty Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, shall be paid to any Person who shall discover any Seaman or Seamen, who may secret themselves, so that such Seaman or Seamen shall be taken for Our said Service, on or before the said Twelfth Day of September next, by any of Our Sea Officers employed for Raising Men: The said Rewards to be paid for any Seaman or Seamen so discovered and taken in and about London, by the Principal Officers and Commissioners of Our Navy; and, at the Out Ports, by the Naval Officers, where there are any; and where there are no Naval Officers, by the Collectors of Our Customs, immediately on a Certificate being produced to the said Principal Officers and Commissioners of Our Navy, Naval Officers, or Collectors of Our Customs respectively, by the Person who may make Discovery of any Seaman or Seamen as aforesaid, certifying his Name, and the Name or Names, and Number of Seamen procured in Consequence of his Discovery; and the said Certificate to be given by such Officer as may take such Seaman or Seamen for Our Service.

The following Address of the Lord Mayor, Sheriffs, Commons, and Citizens, of the City of Dublin, having been transmitted to his Excellency the Earl of Halifax, Lord Lieutenant of Ireland, has by him been presented to His Majesty: Which Address His Majesty was pleased to receive very graciously.

To the King's most Excellent Majesty,
The humble Address of the Lord Mayor, Sheriffs, Commons, and Citizens, of the City of Dublin, in Common Council assembled.

Most Gracious Sovereign,

PERMIT your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Lord Mayor, Sheriffs, Commons, and Citizens of the City of Dublin, to be Partakers of that Joy which fills your Royal Breast at this early Manifestation of the Bravery and Ardour of your Troops, so conspicuous in the Reduction of Belleisle; and, with all Humility, to congratulate your Majesty upon so happy and glorious an Occasion.

That Piety towards Almighty God, that Tenderness for your People, and Care of their just Rights, which formed those truly noble and wise Purposes of Government, so graciously declared by your Majesty to be yours, when you took upon you the mighty Charge, were so many sure Pledges to your Subjects that your Majesty's Reign would be Propitious. And that the Divine Providence would be ever present in your Councils, and go forth with your Fleets and Armies, to give Efficacy and Success to all Measures and Attempts by which such Purposes were to be executed.

From the continued Successes of your Majesty's Arms, labouring for Peace, and supported in the glorious Cause, by the united Efforts of a free, brave and generous People, do the Nations new look for their Redress, who with Sadness view their Territories laid waste by a destructive War. A War made necessary, on the Part of Great Britain, by the unjust Ambition of an Enemy, equally Foes to your Majesty's Government, and to the Repose of Europe. Whose unrelenting Obstinacy gives Continuance to those Calamities which their Injustice had occasioned. And who vainly persevere to oppose your Arms, and the general Good, when nothing but their Obstinacy is left to them unconquered.

May your Majesty long live the Terror of your Enemies, and the Kind Father and Protector of your People. By you, may other Princes be taught to reign in the Hearts of their Subjects, and to look for their own Honour, Strength and Glory, in the Freedom and Prosperity of those they are set to rule over. So that the Happiness we hope for and enjoy under your most auspicious Government, may, by your Example, be imparted to many, and extended wide. And that the Nations of the Earth may bless you.

In Testimony whereof, we have caused the Common Seal of the said City to be hereunto affixed, this Second Day of July, One thousand seven hundred and sixty one.

Petersbourg, June 30. On Wednesday last the Empress went to Peterhoff with all her Court. The Fleet sailed from Cronstadt, on Friday last, for Revel: It consisted of 14 Ships of the Line, besides a Frigate, 2 Bomb Ketches, and some Tenders; and it is to be joined at that Place by seven or eight more Ships.

The Imperial Ambassador, Count Esterhazy, is preparing for his Departure.

Warsaw, July 8. General Ziethen has entered Poland with a Body, as is said, of 24,000 Men. He was the 1st Instant at Krosnian. Marshal But-

terlin, the Russian General, as soon as he heard of the March of the Prussians, assembled all his Army, and advanced towards Silesia, in order to prevent, by a Diversion, their penetrating farther into Poland. The Head Quarters of the Russians were the 2d Instant at Jarocyn.

Cologne, July 20. Orders have been sent to provide Hospitals here for a great Number of wounded Men, and others at Wesel and Dusseldorff.

Hague, July 24. By our Letters of the 22d Instant from Westphalia, we learn, that Prince Ferdinand's Head Quarters were the 20th still at Hohe-naver. Marshal Broglio had fallen back to Erweite, since his Defeat on the 16th, and sent a large Detachment to Paderborn. Marshal Soubise lay at Haarstrang, with his Right to Soest.

There had passed several Skirmishes, in which the Allies had the Advantage. In one of them Prince Henry of Brunswick is said to have been wounded. Colonel Freytag had destroyed a great Convoy of Provisions between Cassel and Warbourg. Major General Luckner forced the Town of Neuhaus near Paderborn the 17th; but, upon the Approach of the above-mentioned large Detachment from the French Army, thought proper to abandon it. He had a very smart Action with the Enemy upon that Occasion, and took 150 Prisoners.

The Duke of Brunswick's Hussars had been upon an Expedition on the Werra, and destroyed two French Magazines at Wanfried, and Eschewege. They were afterwards united to Colonel Freytag's Corps, and set out upon some other Undertaking. The Magazine belonging to the Allies, at Hoxter upon the Weser, of which the Enemy had got Possession, had been retaken.

Admiralty-Office, July 30.

His Majesty has been pleased to appoint the Right Honourable George Lord Anson, Vice Admiral of Great Britain, and Lieutenant of the Admiralty thereof, to be Admiral and Commander in Chief of His Majesty's Fleet.

This Day his Excellency M. Boreel, Ambassador Extraordinary from the States General, had a Private Audience of his Royal Highness the Duke of Cumberland.

As had likewise M. Zuccato, Resident from Venice.

To which they were introduced by Stephen Cottrell, Esq; Assistant Master of the Ceremonies.

His Majesty's Post-Master General, for the further Improvement of Correspondence, having been pleased to order, that Letters and Packets shall for the future, be carried Six Days in every Week, instead of Three as at present, between London and the several following Towns, viz. Caxton, Hurdington, Sulston, Stamford, Coltesworth, Grantham, Newark, Tuxford, Worop, Bawtry, Doncaster, Howden, Rawcliff, Thorne, Hull, Ferrybridge, Wakefield, Leeds, Bradford, Halifax, Tadcaster, York, Easingwold, Thirsk, Northallerton, Darlington, Durham, Newcastle, Barnards-Castle, Brough, Penrith, Kewick, Cockermouth, Whitehaven, Carlisle, Daventry, Coventry, Mansfield, Chesterfield, Sheffield, Rotherham, Barnsley, Huthersfield, Wiggan, Chorley, Preston, Garfhang, Lancaster, Burton, Kendal, and Appleby.

And likewise for the further Improvement of the National Correspondence, to erect and establish the following New Cross Road Posts, namely, betwixt Newcastle upon Tyne, Whitehaven and Carlisle, through Durham, Darlington, Barnards-Castle, Brough, Appleby, Penrith, Kewick, Cockermouth, and Work-

ington, by which the Correspondence of those Towns with each other, as well as with the Great North Road, and with Cambridge, Newmarket, Bury, Thetford, Lynn, and Norwich, may be carried on six Times a Week.

Also a new Cross Road Branch betwixt York and Manchester, through Tadcaster, Wakefield, Leeds, Bradford, Halifax, and Rochdale, by which the Correspondence of that Part of the Great North Road, lying North of Ferrybridge, with all Parts of Lancashire, may likewise be carried on six Times a Week. And their Correspondence with Cheshire, Staffordshire, Birmingham, and Coventry in Warwickshire, considerably quickened and improved.

Also a new Cross Road Branch betwixt Sheffield and Doncaster, through Rotherham, by which the Correspondence of Sheffield with Hull, and all Parts of the Great North Road as well as with Cambridge, Newmarket, Bury, Thetford, Lynn, and Norwich, may be carried on six Times a Week.

Also a new Cross Road Branch from Sheffield to Rochdale, through Barnsley, Hathersfield, Elland, and Halifax, by which means the Correspondence of Sheffield, Chesterfield, Mansfield and Nottingham, with Manchester, Warrington, Liverpool, and all Parts of Lancashire, may be carried on six Times a Week; and their Correspondence with Cheshire, Staffordshire, and Birmingham in Warwickshire, considerably quickened and improved.

Also a new Cross Road and Branch from Derby, through the Peacock Inn to Chesterfield, by which the Correspondence of Derby with Chesterfield, Sheffield, Rotherham, Doncaster, and all the Great North Road (North of Doncaster) as well as with Barnsley, Hathersfield, Halifax, Rochdale, Manchester, Warrington, Liverpool, and all Parts of Lancashire, will be considerably quickened and improved.

Also new Cross Road Stages from Ferrybridge to Wakefield, from Wakefield to Leeds, and from Ferrybridge to Leeds, by which the Correspondence betwixt all Parts of the North Road, South of Ferrybridge, as well as Cambridge, Newmarket, Bury, Thetford, Lynn, and Norwich, with Wakefield, Leeds, Bradford, Halifax, Rochdale, Manchester, Warrington, Liverpool, and all Parts of Lancashire, may be carried on six Times a Week. And the Correspondence of all Parts of the North Road, North of Newark, with Cheshire, Staffordshire, Birmingham, and Coventry in Warwickshire, will be considerably quickened and improved.

Also a new Cross Road Stage betwixt Cambridge and Caxton, by which Means the Correspondence of the Great North Road, as well as all Parts of Lancashire, with Cambridge, Newmarket, Bury, Thetford, Lynn, and Norwich, may also be carried on six Times a Week.

Also a new Cross Road Stage betwixt Nottingham and Newark, by which the Correspondence of Nottingham, Mansfield, Chesterfield, Loughborough, Leicester, Harborough, and Northampton, with the great North Road, and with Cambridge, Newmarket, Bury, Thetford, Lynn, and Norwich, may likewise be carried on Six Times a Week.

Also a new Cross Road Stage betwixt Appleby and Kendall, by which the Correspondence of Whitehaven, Cockermouth, Carlisle, Penrith, Appleby, and all Parts of Cumberland and Westmorland, with all Parts of Lancashire, may be carried on Six Times a Week; and their Correspondence with Cheshire, Staffordshire, and Warwickshire, considerably quickened and improved.

Also a new Cross Road Stage betwixt Birmingham and Coventry, by which the Correspondence of Coventry and Daventry, with Birmingham, Wolverhampton, Sheffnal, Shrewsbury, Stone, Namptwich, Chester, Warrington, Liverpool, Manchester, and all Parts of Lancashire, Westmorland, and Cumberland, may be carried on Six Times a Week; and their Correspondence with Northampton, Harborough, Leicester

Loughborough, Derby, and Nottingham, considerably quickened and improved.

Also a new Cross Road Branch betwixt Salisbury, Portsmouth, and Gosport, through Stockbridge, and Winchester, by which the Correspondence of Portsmouth, Gosport, Winchester, Southampton, and the Isle of Wight, with Plymouth, Exeter, and all Parts of Cornwall, Devonshire, and Dorsetshire, as well as with Bristol, Bath, Devizes, Melksham, Bradford, Trowbridge, and Salisbury, will be considerably quickened and improved.

And having also been pleased to order, that the Mail betwixt Chesterfield and Manchester, shall for the future pass from Tidswell through Buxton, to Stockport, instead of passing through Chapple in Fiith, as it does at present.

Public Notice is hereby given, That these several additional Convoynances, Improvements, and Regulations, will commence on Monday the 6th of July next.

And whereas great Numbers of Letters have hitherto been privately collected and delivered, as well in these as in other Parts of the Kingdom, contrary to Law, to the great Prejudice of the Revenue of the Post-Office; Notice is likewise hereby given, That all Carriers, Coachmen, Watermen, Wherry-men, Dispensers of Country News-Papers, and all other Persons whatsoever, hereafter detected in the illegal collecting, conveying, or delivering of Letters, will be prosecuted with the utmost Severity.
