Prince had left with Part of his Corps, to oppose him, had thereupon thought it necessary to throw a large Garrifon into Munfter.

Letters from Hamburgh of the 14th Inflant, fay, that the Ruffian Fleet, confitting of 32 Sail of Ships, were feen the 2d Inftant off Rugenwald; at about Six German Miles from Colberg ; but that, on ac-count of contraty Winds, they had only been able

as yet, to debark 500 Land Forces. Letters from Silesia of the oth fay, that General Laudohn, not having succeeded in his Views of join-ing the Ruffians, had quitted his former Position, and marched towards Lower Silefia ; and that the Ruffians too had left their Camp at Namflau, and advanced to Hunsfeldt near Breflau : Upon which his Prufian Majeffy was gone with his Army to Strehlen, where he continued when thole Letters came away, and had from thence detached a Corps to cover the City of Breflau.

## Whitehall, August 22.

The King has been gracioully pleased to restore Thomas Fowke, Efq; to his former Rank and Precedency of Lieutenant-General in His Majefty's Army, and also to constitute and appoint the faid Thomas Fowke to be a Major-General on the Establishment of Ireland, in the Room of Major-General

Archibald Douglas, who is employed in Germany. The King has been pleafed to conftitute and ap-point John Barrington, Efq; Major General of His Majesty's Forces, to be a Major-General on the Establiftment of Ireland, in the Room of Sir John Cope, Knight of the Bath, deceafed.

The King has been pleafed to order a Congé d'E-hire to the Archdeacon and Chapter of the Cathedral Church of Landaff, to elect a Bishop of that See, the fame being void by the Translation of the Right Rev. Father in God Richard late Bishop thereof, to the See of St. Afaph. And alfo a Letter recom-mending to the faid Archdeacon and Chapter, John Ewer, Doctor in Divinity, to be elected and chofen to the faid Bishoprick of Landaff.

Admiralty Office, August 22. Extrast of a Letter from Sir Charles Saunders, Vice-Admiral of the Blue, to Mr. Clevland, dated in Gibraltar Mold, on board His Majefty's Ship the Neptune, July 20, 1761. It is with the greateft Pleasure that I defire you

will acquaint their Lordships, that Captain Proby, in the Thunderer, who was cruifing off Cadiz with the Modeste, Thetis, and Favorite Sloop, in order to intercept the Achilles and Bouffon, has fallen in with and taken those Ships, and brought them into this Bay.

On looking into Cadiz on Thursday Morning, the 14th Inflant, he miffed the French Ships, and, at Two in the Afternoon of the 16th, he difcovered them, Cadiz then bearing E. N. E. 4 E. diftant 9 Leagues: About One in the Morning, of the 17th, the Thunderer came up with and began to engage the Achilles, who ftruck after an Action of about half an Hour, Cadiz then bearing E. 1 S. diftant.

19 Leagues. The Thetis came up with the Bouffon about Seven the fame Morning: They engaged also about half an Hour, when the Modeste coming up, and firing fome Guas, the Bouffon struck.

The Thunderer is pretty much damaged in her Masts, Yards, Sails, and Rigging, had 17 Men killed in Action, and 113 wounded, 17 of which are fince dead.

The Thetis had also suffered in her Masts, Rig ging, &c. but had not one Man killed or wounded.

I cannot yet afcertain the Lofs of the Enemy; we are fending their Wounded to the Hofpitals, of which I will fend a more particular Account as foon

as poffible. The Second and Third Lieutenants of the Thunderer are among the Wounded, and the former of them is in a very dangerous Way. Captain Proby also received a flight Wound in his Right-Hand.
