St. James's, September 8.

HER most Serene Highness the Princess Charlotte of Mecklenburg, having embarked on Board His Majesty's Yacht at Stade, the 22d past, and fallen down the Elbe to Cuxhaven, sailed from thence the 28th, and arrived in the Port of Harwich, on Sunday Evening last, the 6th Instant. Her Highness continued that Night, and dined Yesterday, on Board: After which, she set out from Harwich, and lay last Night at the Earl of Abercorn's House at Witham in Essex; from whence Her Highness set out this Morning at Eight, and arrived at a Quarter past Three, at His Majesty's Palace of St. James, where she alighted at the Garden Gate, and was received by the King and all the Royal Family. At Nine this Evening the Marriage Ceremony, between His Majesty and Her Most Serene Highness, will be solemnized by the Lord Archbishop of Canterbury, in the Royal Chapel there.

Hague, Sept. 4. We are at present without any Thing new from the Army under Prince Ferdinand of Brunswick. By the Advices from the Lower Rhine, the Cavalry of the French King's Household, which was quietly cantoned between the Rhine and Maese, and in the Dutchy of Cleves, received a sudden Order to quit their Cantonments and to march with all possible Dispatch to the Plain of Burick, behind Wezel, where they are encamped. This sudden Order is attributed to the Appearance of a Body of the Allied Army, said to be commanded by the Hereditary Prince, upon the Lippe; and to a Check a Body of the Prince of Soubize's Army had received at Dorsten, where the French were establishing a Magazine of Provision and Ammunition, for their Service during the Siege of Munster. The same Advices add, that the Prince of Soubize himself was expected with the Remains of his Army near the Rhine.

Letters from Breslaw of the 22d give an Account, that on the 19th and 20th the Russian Army marched from Fenschel near Nicolstadt towards Leignitz. The Austrians, who were at Freyburg and Sheigan, moved at the same Time to Jauer; by which Motions the Junction of the Russian and Austrian Armies was secured; and his Prussian Majesty thought proper immediately to change his Position, having decamped from Nicolstadt, and marched to Buntzelwitz, in his Way to Schweidnitz.

His Majesty's Ship the Danae, commanded by Captain Henry Martin, on the 4th Instant in the Morning, about 35 Leagues W. S. W. from Scilly, gave Chace to a Sail, which she came up with in about nine Hours, when she struck, and proved to be the Colibry, a French Privateer from Dunkirk, of 16 Guns, and 110 Men, with three Ransomers on Board, for the Britannia of Rhode Island, the Peggy of Dundee, and the General Hodgson Packet of Belleisle.
