THEREAS His Majefty was gracioufly pleafed by His Royal Proclamation bearing Date the Twenty Second Day of July last, to promife and declare, (amongit other Things) That the Bounties of Five Pounds for every able Seaman, and of Thirty Shillings for every ordinary Seam in should be paid to every fuch able and ordinary Seaman, not above the Age of Fif.y, nor under the Age of Twenty Years, who should, on or before the Twelfth of this Instant, enter themselves to serve in His Majesty's Royal Navy, either with the Captains or Lieutenants of His Majefty's Ships, or the Chief Officers on Board fuch Tenders as should be employed for raifing Men for the Service of the Royal Navy: And that a Bounty of Thirty Shillings should be paid to every able bodicd Landman not above the Age of Thirty Five, nor under the Age of Twenty Years, who should, on or before the faid Twelfth Day of this Inflant, in like Manner voluntarily enter themfelves to ferve in His Majesty's Royal Navy; and that a Reward of Two Pounds for every able, and Thirty Shillings for every ordinary Seaman, fhould be paid to any Perfon who fhould difeover any Seaman or Seamen who should feeret themfelves, fo that such Seamen or Seamen should be taken for His Majesty's fuid Service. And whereas the Time limited for paying the faid Bounties and Rewards is now near expiring : And it being judged expedient for His Majefty's Service, that the fame fhould be continued for fome longer Time ; His Majefty, with the Advice of His Privy Council, doth therefore order, and it is hereby accordingly or-dered, that the Time limited by the faid Proclamation, for Payment of the faid Bounties and Rewards, be prolonged and extended from the faid Twelfth Day of this Instant September, to the Thirty-first Day of October next inclusive. Whereof all Persons concerned are to take Notice, and govern themfelves accordingly.

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Most Gracious Sovereign;

NE your Majefty's molt dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Ministers and Elders of the Prefbyterian Churches conveened in Synod, beg I eave to embrace this Opportunity of our first Meeting, to condole with your Majefty on the Death of our late most gracious Sovereign, your Majesty's Illustrious Grandfather. An Event which has excited the tenderest Emotions in the Breasts of a grateful People, who had long experienced the ineftimable Bleffings of his mild and aufpicious Reign.

His inviolable Attachment to our excellent Conflitution, and difinterested Endeavours to promote the Felicity of all his People, rendered him a Monarch equally great and amiable. But his paternal Care of the British Colonies, his seatonable Interpo-fition, and well conducted Efforts to deliver us from favage and perfidious Enemics, his superior Regard for the facred Rights of Confcience, and utter Abhorrence of every intolerable and bigoted Measure, reflected peculiar Luttre on his Administration, and will endear his Meanory to every Subject, even in the remotest Parts of your Majesty's Dominions, who are Friends of Civil and Religious Liberty.

Though we have the greateft Reafon to deplore with your Majelty this important Lofs, yet have we at the fame Time abundant Caule to adore the Divine Goodnefs, in continuing to the Nation a Life of fuch fingular Importance, until you fajefty was capable to fway the Sceptre with equal Dignity and Wildom,

Permit us therefore, with the greateft Sincerity, to congratulate your Majefly on your happy Acceffion to the Throne of your Ancestors, and to rejoice that the most high God has granted us a Prince adorned with the most shining Accomplishments; and animated with the glorious Ambition of acquiring the only true Grandeur that can arife from Empire, the unperifhing Glory of doing Goad.

In particular we confider with unfpeakable Pleafure, your Majefty's most gracious Declaration from the Throne, in Favour of Religion and Virtue, which never fail to exalt a Nation; and for the Suppreffion of Vice and Immorality, which as conftantly entail on a People publick Infamy and indelible Reproach. Such great and exemplary Inftances of your Ma-jefty's Solicitude for the Honour of God, and the real Happiness of your People, reflect on your Roval Person a Glory superior to that of Victories and Triumphs.

May your Majefty graciously accept this fincere Tender of our most ardent Zeal and Affection for your Sacred Perfon and Government, of our inviolable Attachment to the Protestant Succession in your most Illustrious House, and of our most humble Assurances, that it shall be our constant Endeavour, (as it has ever been) to inculcate on those committed to our Charge, the Principles of Gratitude, Loyalty-and Obedience; and we shall ever in our Prayers, most fervently beleech Almighty God, that your Ma-jesty may reign with great Renown and Length of Days, the Champion of Liberty and of the Protestane Intereft, the grand Bulwark of true Religion and Virtue; and finally, be translated to a Crosyn ing corruptible that fadeth not away.
