Dublin Castle, October 6.

This Day arrived his Excellency the Earl of Halifax, Lord Lieutenant of this Kingdom. His Excellency was received, at his Landing, by the Lord Mayor, Aldermen, and Sheriffs of Dublin. The Foot Forces in Garrison lined the Streets through which his Excellency (attended by a Squadron of Horse) proceeded, amidst the Acclamations of the People, with the usual Ceremony, to the Castle, where, in Council, his Excellency took the Oaths appointed to be taken by the Lord Lieutenant of Ireland, and received the Sword from their Excellencies the Lord Justices: After which, the Great Guns in His Majesty's Park the Phoenix were fired, and answered by Volleys from the Regiments on Duty, which were drawn out upon College Green: And his Excellency repairing to the Presence Chamber, received there the Compliments of the Nobility and other Persons of Distinction, upon his safe Arrival to take upon him the Government of this Kingdom.
